PROSPERITY SPOTS UNDER SKIES OF TEXAS.

President L. H. Hubbard of the state College for Women, Denton, is responsible for the following prosperity cloud ng in Denton county. "Our farmers were taught a valuable lesson last year. Of course, the drouth had something to do with it. More than 500,000 containers were used by the housewives in the rural districts of our county this season. They canned everything from yearling steers and chickens to all the surplus products of orchards and gardens. It is a record never before established in our section. Neighbor counties make reports of canning and preserving just as flattering as the showing made by the farmers and their families in Denton county. East Texas counties established a new high record. One farmer on the fringe of the East Texas oil field reports his wife and daughters with the assistance of the men folks put away 1800 containers. This covered meat supply as well as vegetables and fruits and berries, and take the work of the head of the family as chief provider, the supply will last for two years, instead of the coming winter and coming months." President Hubbard is a native Texan. He knows every old cow trail in the state. He knows ranch life as well as farm life. His prediction is that never before in its history has rural Texas been in a position to supply the needs of rural tables as this year, and he places a lot of the credit for the education of the people along canning lines on the busy workers of A. & M. college. Texas, rural Texas, promises to feed its own hungry this winter. Adversity may be a hard task to master but its apostle teaches many valuable lessons.

## A PROGRAM TO UTILIZE LAND.

C. A. Moser is vice president of the American Cotton Co-operative association. He attended a conference at New Orleans. He said the conference showed the urgent need for providing a program to utilize land formerly planted in cotton which will be forced into other uses next season or left idle. He insists that the whole system of realizations between landlords and tenants must be revised. According to Mr. Moser, millions of acres usually planted to cotton will go into other crops, and these crops, as far as possible, should yield a cash income. This means, he said, in most cases, live-He predicted the farmer must produce livestock on a greatly increased scale—a scale that probably will exceed the fighting and tossing each other from ds of local markets and may also exceed the local territorg's ability to supply feeder stock. At a meeting in Birmingham this week, directors of extension service and agricultural commissioners of cotton states will meet with cotton co-operatives, representative cotton seed crushers, and others. One object will be an understanding between cotton seed oil mills and farmers for exchanging cotton seed meal for cottonseed, thus providing the best feed and fertilizer at equitable exchange rates without cash outlay.



formally announced to vote formally announced, to vote against RCA. This man's sudden change of attitude came as a complete surprise to the members who unexpectedly found themselves in theminority, it is stated on good authority.

The commission's action caused no end of gossip as to the influence that was brought to bear. Many who claim to know the facts say that a high government official intervened, one reason for his alleged action being that it was an effort to save the present radio setup from the upheaval and chaos which he feared would result if RCA and its subsidiaries were suddenly deprived of their use of the air.

There are others here who say that no such high purpose enter-ed into the influence which is al-leged to have been exerted. They openly claim that politics had something to do with it. The radio something to do with it. The radio monopoly is active in promoting its interests with both parties. Owen D. Young, RCA's organizer, is being talked of as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for 'resident, while Major-General James G. Harbord, chairman of the board of RCA, is being mentioned as an ideal man for chairman of the Republican National committee.






