## COUNTY FARM TOUR TO BE HELD NEXT THURSDAY

### National 4-H Week To Be Observed By Local Clubs

Texas' 87,000 4-H Club members and Castro County's 140 members from Mulkey, Nazareth, Dimmitt, Jumbo, Flagg, Frio, Hart 4-H Clubs will join other 4-H'ers throughout the nation in observance of National 4-H Week, September 25 — October 2, reports R. L. Hunt, Jr., assistant state 4-H leader, Texas A & M University.

Local clubs are participating in various projects this week to advertise the worth and enjoyment of the 4-H program.

Hunt notes that some 2,250,000 boys and girls in the 50 states and Puerto Rico are 4-H members; that they range in age from 10 to 19 years of age; that they live in both rural and urban areas and that each conducts one or more projects involving personal responsibilities and "learning to do by doing." Along with their project or demonstration work, 4-H training also emphasizes the development of leadership and citizenship talents.

Theme for the upcoming week

Annual Castro County farm tour sponsored by Extension Service and Running Water Soil Conservation District will be held Thursday, September 30 announces officials.

The tour will start at the Dale Maxwell farm, six miles north of Dimmitt on Highway 385 at 9:30 am. Several stops will be made at farms between Maxwell's and Flagg Community Hall.

At the Maxwell farm, the tour will include grain sorghum variety demonstration field and several acres of carrots.

Noon luncheon will be held at the Flagg Community Hall courtesy of First State Bank, Dimmitt.

An afternoon program featuring several guest speakers will follow the luncheon.

Attending the tour and program will be Bill Clayton, State representative for this area; Don Johnson, Plains Cotton Growers executive vice-president; Harvey Walker, agronomist with Extension Service; and Robert Berry, plant pathologist with Extension Service.

These individuals will be heard either on the tour or at the noon program.

Election of county representatives for the Plains Cotton Growers will be held during the afternoon. Also to be elected at this meeting will be a Soil Conservation District supervisor.

Everyone is urged to attend.

### P-TA Convenes For Fall Term

Dimmitt Parent-Teachers Association met for the first meeting Tuesday night with approximately 95 present at the High School cafeteria.

First meeting introductions included new teachers, P-TA officers and new families in the community. Committee reports were given by Mrs. Bob Huckabay and Mrs. Burr Morris.

In the business discussion, the P-TA considered setting up working shops for parents which would introduce the new methods of teaching in the public schools.

Recommended program schedule was adopted by the group. Programs include: October 19 — Open House, Junior High Building; November 9 — Open House — South Grade Building; January 18 — Open House — North Grade Building; February 15 — "Together We Help Our Children By Strengthening Our Heritage"; March 15 — Open House — High School Building; and April — Teacher Appreciation Week.

Executive Committee moved the adoption of revision of by-laws, book, and adoption of program schedule.

Panel discussion of "What's New in the Dimmitt Schools" concluded the program. Panel members included: Mrs. Woodrow Kittingworth, moderator; M. E. Cleavinger, School Board member; Paul Hilburn, superintendent of schools; Alvis Fuquay, High School principal; Bill Reisdorph, Junior High principal; Weldon Skinner, North Grade principal; and Helen Richardson, South Grade principal.

New programs in operation at local schools are Operation Head Start, NYC program, Vocational Education introduced in 7th and 8th grades and on-the-job training.

According to Mr. Hilburn, the South Grade lunchroom will be opened during first part of October. Kitchen equipment is being installed at the present.

Approximately 1800 students are enrolled in Dimmitt Schools and space is at a premium Hilburn told the parents. Breakdown of enrollment follows: 346 in High School; 305 in Junior High with 39 of these coming over to High School building; 520 in North Grade; and 621 in South Grade. The first three grades contain 26 teachers.

Parents and teachers enjoyed visitation following the meeting.

### 'Cats To Face Tough Hornets

The fighting Bobcats will be facing one of the toughest teams in Triple A schools Friday night when they tackle the Tulia Hornets in Bobcat Stadium at 8 p.m.

A team of long-time rivalry, the Hornets will be seeking another win Friday night to add number three to their list of victories.

Tulia stung the Olton Mustangs, 32-6, in the opening of football season. Olton is the predicted winner of District 2-AA. Standouts in the Olton game were Dennis Harvee, quarterback and Darrell Smith who scampered for two touchdowns and three conversions.

Both offense and defense for Tulia have plenty of power. Tulia defeated the powerful Phillips team last week. The Hornets were the first team to score against Phillips. Tulia achieved its first victory in four tries over Phillips, 12-6.

Defensive standouts for the Hornets are Joe Childers, Happy Cole and Cook.

The Hornets have a strong passing team. Quarterback Harvee will be using his passing arm against the Bobcats. Against Phillips, Tulia hit six of eight passes for 95 yards.

Coach Jim Keeling and Coach Brown L. Smith attended Howard Payne College at the same time.

Hornets will be the smallest team the Bobcats have met on the field. The Hornets have two all-State potentials in Gary Gruben, guard and Darrell Smith, fullback.

Hornets had a 7-3 record last year while Dimmitt chalked up a 2-6-2 record. Present record for the Hornets is 2-0. Dimmitt stands at 0-3.

The Bobcats will give the Hornets a good game. Although the 'Cats will be facing one of the best Triple A Clubs in the area, they will be fighting for a victory.

### Dimmitt FFA Plan Magazine Sale Campaign

Mr. James Hobbs, Abilene, Representative for Curtis Circulation Company of Philadelphia Pennsylvania, met with the Dimmitt Vo-Ag classes on Friday, September 17, to explain details for this year's magazine sales campaign.

Proceeds from the sales campaign will be used to send chapter delegates to the State FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, to pay for hotel and meal expenses for FFA members participating in judging contests, and to purchase FFA supplies. **RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF CASTRO CITY OF DIMMITT**

ON THIS the 18th day of September, 1965, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, convened in Special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

G. W. BRADFORD MAYOR  
CHARLES VANDIVER COMMISSIONER  
ELMER YOUTS COMMISSIONER

and with the following absent: None, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Mayor Bradford introduced a resolution and order. Commissioner Vandiver moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Youts. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote: AYES: Mayor Bradford and Commissioners Vandiver and Youts.

NOES: None.

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election

be held on the 12th day of October, 1965, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the Board of Commissioners of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (100,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of providing money to acquire or improve, or both, land for park purposes, to-wit: golf course and little league ball park; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FIFTEEN (15) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5 percent) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

RAY BEARDEN Presiding Judge  
SID SHEFFY Alternate Presiding Judge

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than one (1) additional Clerk, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Clerk's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$100,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PARK BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$100,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PARK BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO THE FOREGOING PROPOSITION, the voter shall mark out the statement FOR the proposition or the statement AGAINST the proposition so that the statement remaining shall indicate the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Clerk, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS", shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

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### Nazareth Stops Christ The King 18-0 On Rainy Saturday Night

Nazareth took advantage of a bad pass from center and a blocked punt last Saturday night and then shut out Christ The King High School of Lubbock 18-0.

A heavy downpour failed to dampen the spirits of the football players or the fans as play continued throughout the rain. Nazareth used primarily a ground attack as passing was impossible until the last half, resulting from the wet pigskin. The Swifts managed to pile up 188 yards of net rushing while the Trojans had minus rushing yardage. Quarterback Marvin Hoelting of the Swifts fired eleven passes, but only one was caught and that one was

fumbled after an eight yard gain. Christ The King was somewhat more successful in the air where they gained all their yardage. The Swifts' pass defense allowed the Trojans 32 yards on 4 completions in eleven attempts.

The Trojans completed the four passes all in the second half after throwing a pair incomplete in the first half. Quarterback Jim Gray of Christ The King along with fullback Stephen Rookard supplied the only running threats by finding room for short yardage against the tough Nazareth rush.

The Swifts scored their first tally late in the second quarter after recovering a high center by the Trojans at the Christ The King seven yard line. On first and goal, Hoelting followed good blocking over right tackle and fired into the end zone for the six-pointer. Nazareth then missed its first of three conversion attempts although Hoelting scrambled into the end zone, however a penalty nullified the two points. A second attempt failed, as the score remained 6-0 just as the first half ended.

On its' second possession of the final half, the Swifts racked up their second touchdown of the game. Hoelting rambled 37 yards on a fourth down and four yard situation at the Trojans' 37. The touchdown jaunt began as the Swifts' quarterback cut the left corner and then found running room with blockers out in front. The conversion failed but the Nazareth team had a 12-0 lead mid-

way through the third quarter.

After taking the Nazareth kick-off, the Trojans began to move the ball. A short kick-off return placed the ball at Christ The King's 35-yard line. From that point, the Trojans quickly piled up two first downs on three pass plays, two of which were successful. Christ The King then bogged down with a first down at the Nazareth 44-yard line. A fifteen yard penalty on a personal foul forced the Trojans to go into punt formation on a fourth and 25 predicament. Christ The King then elected to fake a punt and pass. Nazareth took possession when the pass went incomplete at the Trojan 39. The Swifts moved close to another score after picking up a first down only to have a fumbled pass reception, recovered by Christ The King at the 17. The teams exchanged punts on the next two possessions but on the Trojans' third possession, Tommy Pohlmeier blocked a Christ The King punt setting up the final Swift marker. Hoelting quickly hit Gerald Brockman with an 8-yard scoring strike. The touchdown increased Nazareth's lead to the final score of 18-0.

Christ The King made a last ditch effort to get on the scoreboard but middle linebacker Donald Braddock intercepted a Trojan pass to wreck any scoring plans. Time ran out before the Swifts could move toward another tally but that made little difference. Nazareth now stands 2-0 for the 1965 football season and have one week to prepare for Class A Sudan.

Braddock, along with lineman Tony Birkenfeld, Larren Jones, Clyde Schulte and Claude Annen turned in outstanding defensive games. Brockman made several grinding tackles, one of which completely upset a Trojan receiver. Nazareth was slapped with 98 yards in penalties with most of the yardage on 15-yarders. Nazareth totaled five first downs to four for the Trojans. Individually, Hoelting ran for 110 yards

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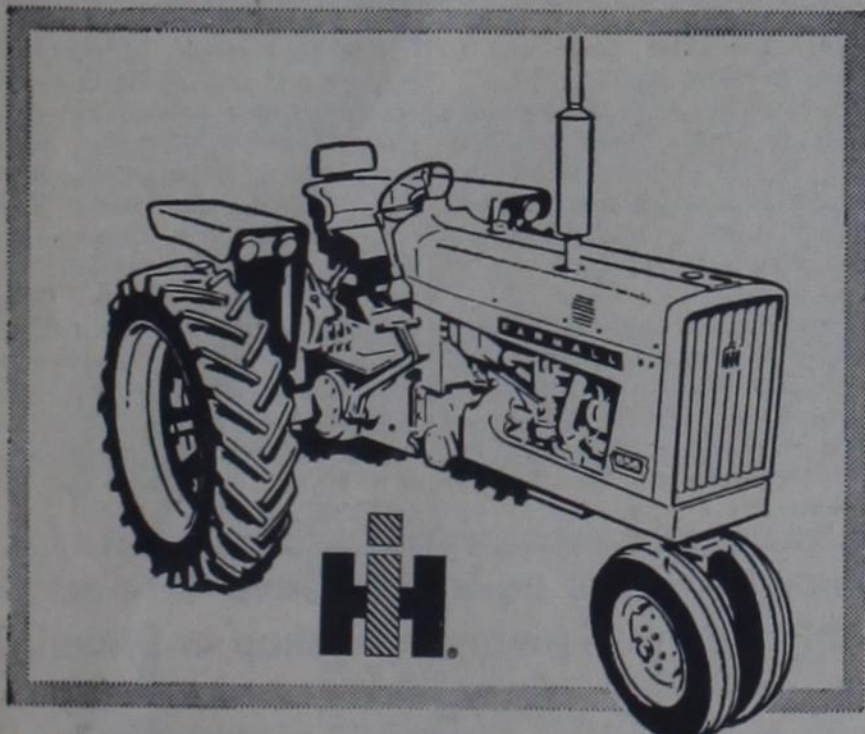

Your pre-schooler might enjoy trying this idea: take leftover soap chips from a soap carving class, or prepare your own soap chips. Mix the chips with warm paraffin and then add a few drops of food coloring. From this mixture, your child can create his own kind of plastic marble. It's easy to handle, just as easy to mold as ordinary modeling clay, and about twice as much fun.

**PROTECT MEATS FOR FREEZER WITH A GOOD WRAPPING**  
If meat from your freezer has a brownish discoloration on the surface, don't panic. The meat is not spoiled, although it may not be as flavorful as it should be. This off-color is called "freezer burn."

Food specialists at the U. S. Department of Agriculture say it's caused by a loss of moisture from the surface of the meat. It's an indication that the wrapping has been torn or that the material used to wrap the frozen meat was not moisture-vapor proof.

A good wrap is one of the best means of protecting the meat quality in your freezer. When you prepare meats for your freezer, be sure the wrap you select is both moisture and vapor resistant. Then seal the package tightly to insure meat quality.

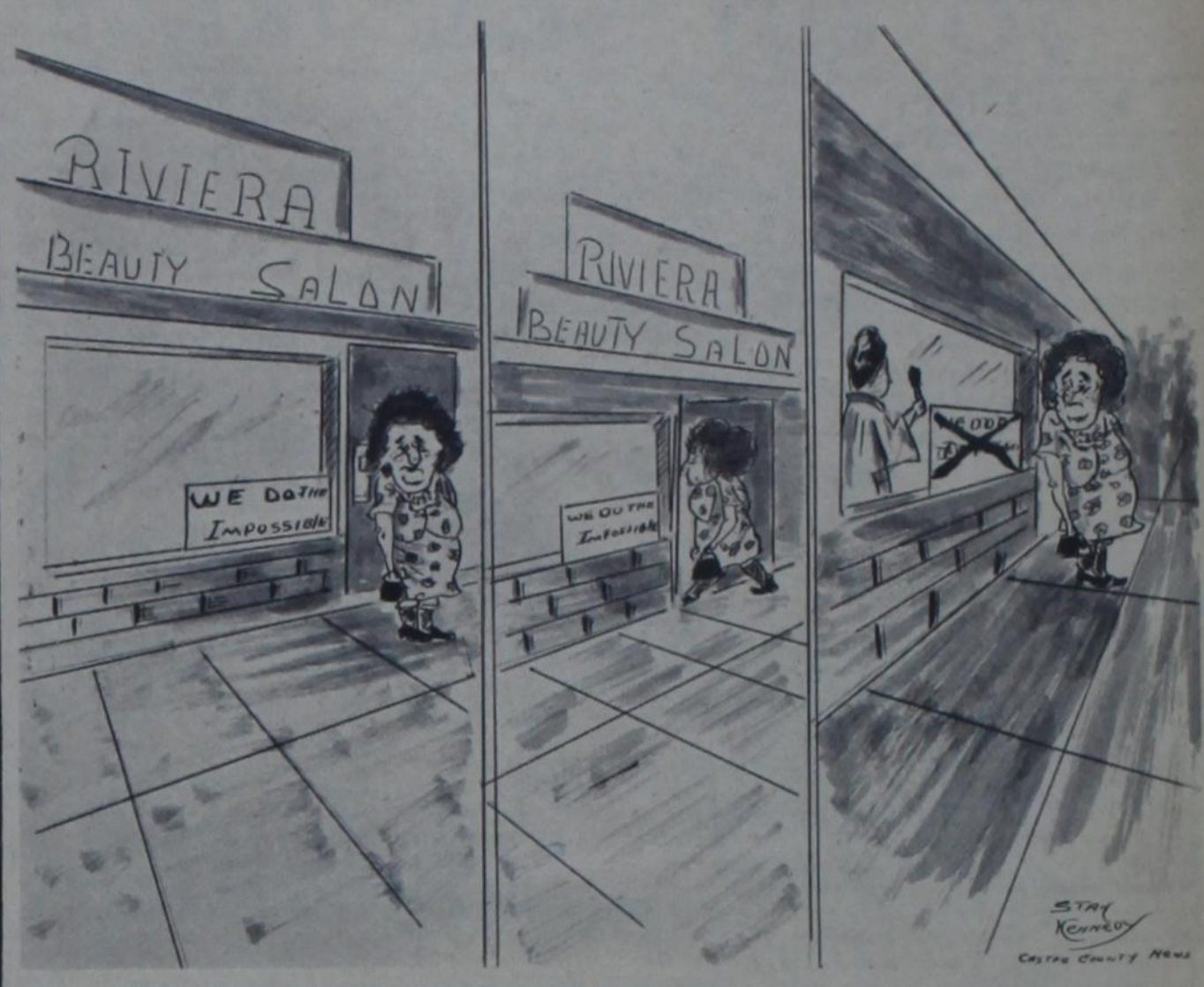

**CARING FOR NON-STICK COOKING UTENSILS**  
The new non-stick cookware utensils are a joy to clean and use.

All non-stick utensils should be conditioned the first time they are used by applying thin coat of cooking oil or shortening. If they appear dry from repeated use, an occasional oiling will improve them.

Non-stick utensils may become stained if high heat is used to fry foods. This causes fat splatters to burn on the surface of the pan. These stains can be



easily removed by boiling one cup of water, one half cup of liquid laundry bleach, and two tablespoons of baking soda in the pan. Wash the pan and treat it with cooking oil to recondition. This formula removes the stain and eliminates sticking, a common complaint after food has burned in the pan. Avoid extreme high heat, as this may crack the non-stick coating. And remember to use nylon coated, rubber, wood, all non-stick and plastic coated metal spoons and spatulas with non-stick coated cookware.

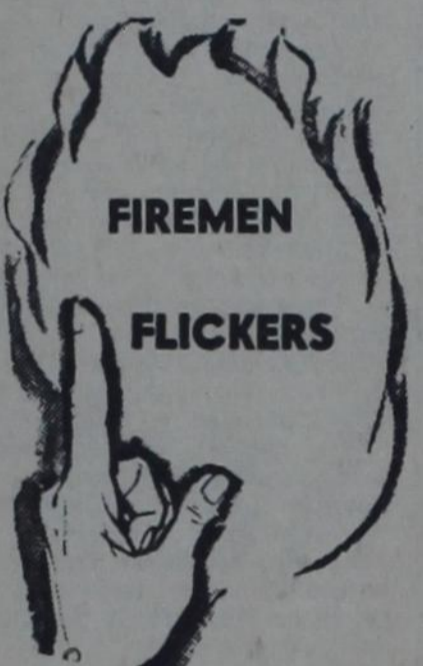
**Dimmitt Garden Club Starts Fall Meetings**

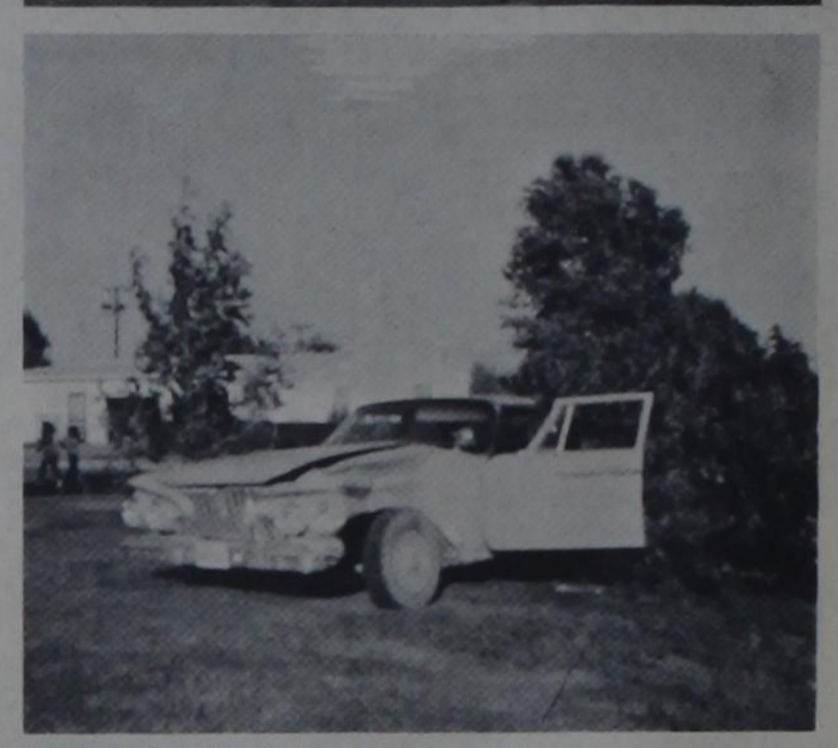
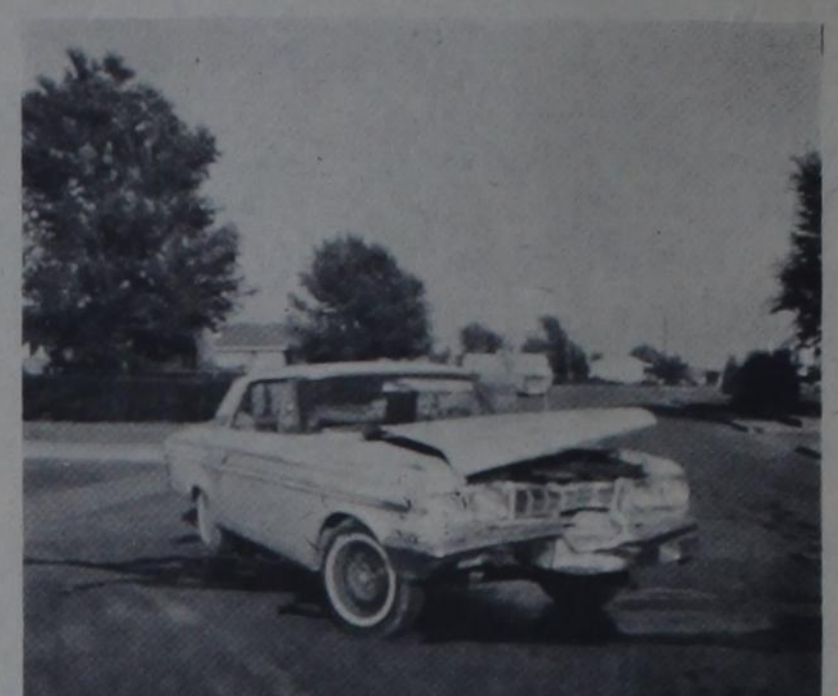

Banks was among notable speakers informing city officials of the state's water planning efforts. "Unless Texas is willing to put up a stack of cash, the state will not have any control over water policy decisions," he said. Joe G. Moore Jr., new executive director of the Water Development Board, and Frank Booth, new executive director of the Texas Water Rights Commission, said Texas' projects call for moving surplus water to areas where it is needed. Moore's group will formulate plans for meeting water needs to the year 2020. Hearings will be held by the six-member board next summer in all river basin areas. OIL PRODUCTION UP — For the first time in 10 years the Texas Railroad Commission hiked the October oil production allowable over September. Commission ordered October production at 28.8 per cent of potential. That fixes allowable at 2,944,109 barrels a day. September allowable was 2,864,660 barrels daily or 28 per cent of potential formula. Last year's formula for October was 27.9 per cent. EMPLOYMENT GROWING — As summer ends decreasing unemployment insurance claims reflect a growing economy. August claims reported by the Texas Employment Commission 218,942 for the same month a year ago — a 10 per cent decrease. TEC said the total amount paid dropped by \$480,388. Job placements (non-farm) increased from 45,054 to 50,399 during the month. Job orders placed by employers increased from 55,109 in August of 1964 to 62,585 last month. Applications jumped from 56,182 to 64,337. Farm job openings filled increased from 63,673 to 11,095 despite expanding mechanization of farm work. However much of the increase was due to demands in other states. ILLITERATE PROGRAM — Governor Connally reports a total of 12,732 students enrolled in the state's adult education program for illiterates in 30 Texas counties. Texas initiated its program before the Economic Opportunity Act was passed by congress. But nearly 90 per cent of funds now are provided by the Office of Economic Opportunity. Cost of the approved programs is \$784,447. Of this sum \$690,364 represents federal money. Texas has more functional illiterates than any state except one. Adult education programs for grownups now are functioning in El Paso, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Victor, Donna, Rio Hondo, Ben Bolt, Greenville, Gregory, Brownsville, Santa Rosa, Ysleta, Premont, McAllen, Alice, Eagle Pass, Edcouch, Huntsville, Sah Benito, Mercedes, Mission, Taft, Edinburg, Los Fresnos, La Feria, La J OYA, Goliad, San Saba and La Villa. APPOINTMENTS — In a surprise move, Gov. John Connally appointed himself Commissioner General of HemisFair in an attempt to certify the project as an international exposition. Connally said if the job interferes with other official duties, he will relinquish the post and appoint someone else. He said he wants to help insure the success of the fair scheduled for 1968 in San Antonio. STRINGS ATTACHED — Recreation income has been excluded from that dedicated to repayment of the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority's \$10,000,000 loan from the Water Development Board. But there is a small string attached. Green Belt must submit an annual budget. Then Board will decide how much will be applied to the note, and how much for the maintenance and construction of recreational facilities. This authority is building a dam near Childress. ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES County Clerks and their deputies do not automatically have to increase their bonds during their present term of office in order to meet the new minimum requirements set by the last legislature. Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr says. In another opinion arising out of the same act of the 59th Legislature, Carr held it is unnecessary for clerks to obtain an "errors and omissions" insurance policy. Also it's unconstitutional for the county to pay for it. Carr, in other recent opinions, ruled that: Presence of a sheriff or court reporter in grand jury room during interrogation of witnesses, but not during deliberations of jurors, does not invalidate indictments returned. No employee of school under jurisdiction of Board of Regents of State Teachers Colleges can be holder in a depository bank selected by the board — unless the employee does not transact any business in his official capacity with the depository bank. Comptroller must furnish attorneys general copies of special rules and regulations (drawn by comptroller). Sheriffs or constables should serve administrative subpoenas for witnesses called before the Texas Employment Commission. Punishment provided for failure to appear is constitutional. There is no conflict in acts which make thallium subject to sale by prescription and which prohibit sale of mixtures containing more than one per cent thallium in containers suitable for household use. Dallas County must pay court reporters the salary fixed by judges (\$,000 - \$11,500). MORE THAN 12,000 ILLITERATES ENROLLED — Classes in 30 Texas cities now are being held for 12,732 illiterates with the cost of the program totalling \$784,447. Of this sum \$690,364 are from Fed-

eral aid. Programs were initiated to educational illiterates. Texas has more illiterates over 25 than all other states but one. YOUTH CORPS PROJECTS APPROVED — Governor Connally approved Neighborhood Youth Corps projects sponsored by the San Diego Independent School District and Southwest Texas State College in San Marcos. San Diego project covers 200 students at a cost of \$109,990 in federal funds and \$28,660 in local support. It calls for \$1.25 an hour pay. Southwest Texas State College project calls for employment of 577 youths in 11 cities and towns of Blanco, Caldwell, Comal, Guadalupe and Hays Counties. Youths will be paid \$1.25 an hour. More than 319.0 in federal funds goes into the SWTC project, with local support of \$47,230. COLLEGE BOARD MEETS — The powerful new Coordinating Board of Texas Colleges and Universities had received its work orders from Governor Connally. Board immediately named key study committees and reviewed applications for new junior colleges serving Scurry, Jefferson, Wood, Rains and Van Zandt Counties. ALMANAC AND GUIDE HAS NEW LOOK — The 1965 edition of Texas Government Almanac and Business Guide, published by the Texas Republican Finance Committee, this year will be characterized by fewer pages, more information and added sparkle. Volume includes facts about the mechanics of government and Texas parties with carefully documented political and industrial statistics on the 254 counties. Both the new and the old representative districts are included in the new volume, as are the contrasting senate and congressional districts as revised by the last legislative session. HOSPITAL HEARINGS HELD — Applicants for an anticipated \$14,000,000 or more in federal Hill-Burton hospital building funds have completed their last formal pleas in special hearings before the State Board of Health. Sixty-five applicants have been warned it will be impossible to get all the \$38,000,000 in help they are seeking. Funds have been appropriated. But due to a priority change, taking into consideration actual use to which existing hospital beds are being put in each community and other factors, state authorities will not allocate them for another month or six weeks. SHORT SNORTS — Acreage yield for Texas cotton, sorghum, rice, corn and hay crops should reach a record high in 1965, according to Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service — Office of Civil Defense figures indicate there are for about 47 per cent of the Texans, or more than 4,500,000 persons — State Banking Board set hearings for September 24 on applications for Owenton State Bank, Citizens State Bank of Wilbourn, and Lawndale State Bank of Amarillo; then served notice it will take action on application of Texas Bank of Commerce, Longview — Department of Public Safety announced it has jobs in uniformed services for more than 70 men. Services include highway patrol, license and weight drivers licensing and motor vehicle inspection. 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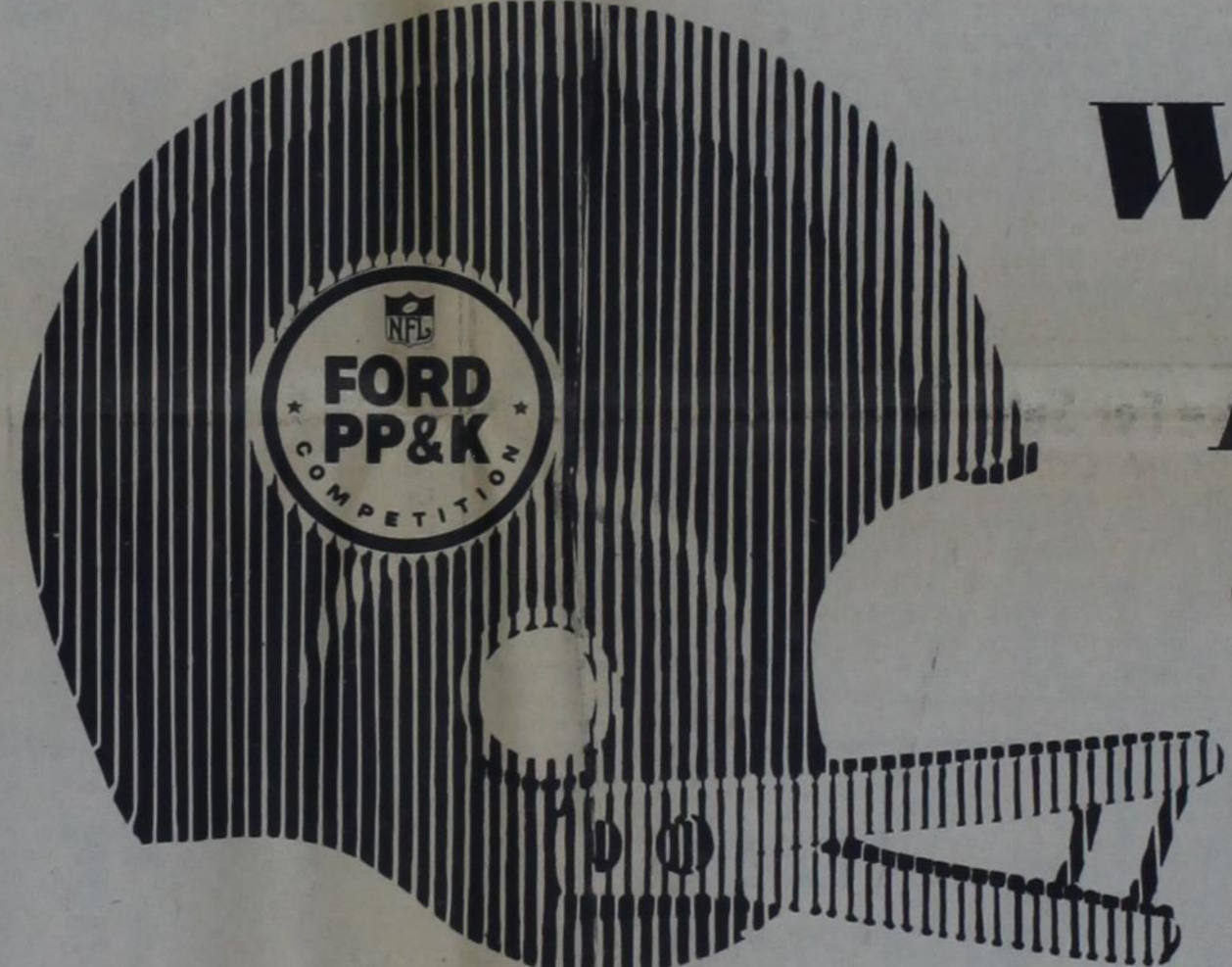

**Home Economic Briefs**

The non-stick utensils now on the market are a joy for the homemaker to use, yet they do require special care, reminds Mrs. Elsie P. Short, Texas A&M University Extension home management specialist. Except for the tubed cake pan, all non-stick utensils should be conditioned the first time they are used by wiping with cooking oil or shortening. An occasional oiling thereafter will improve their use when they appear dry. And remember to use nylon coated, rubber or wood spatulas or spoons with these utensils.

It's important not to scratch the chrome plating when cleaning chrome-lined ovens, as this exposes the metal underneath to corrosion, cautions Mrs. Wanda Meyer, Texas A&M University Extension specialist in home management. The most satisfactory way to remove grease film is by

washing with a sponge or soft brush dipped into hot soap or detergent.

Large and medium size eggs are about equal in value this week, says Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, A&M Extension consumer marketing specialist. Both Grade AA and Grade A quality eggs are good buys.

Wash-wear performance in lightweight fabrics for sheer blouses, handkerchiefs, print dresses and sleepwear is now possible for the first time, thanks to a new mechanical process in producing all-cotton fabrics. This process, says Mrs. Lynn Parks Stiles, Texas A&M University Extension consumer education specialist reduces the amount of tensile and tear strength loss in resin-treated and crosslinked cottons. Cottons are now able to withstand chemical treatments when manufactured the new way.

# HERD DUMPS BOBCATS, 38-8

The Hereford Whitefaces started a stampede of their own early Friday night under cover of a heavy fog which made visibility for the Bobcats defense and passing attack almost impossible.

Dimmitt failed to move the ball any distance after receiving the opening kickoff on their own 12

yard line and after a penalty moved them back to their own 8 yard line, the Bobcats punted out but the ball only went to the Dimmitt 31 yard line and it looked as though Hereford was in good field position the first time they got their hands on the ball.

After three ground plays gained the Whitefaces 9 yards, Robbie Lindsey jumped up to intercept a pass from Hereford Quarterback Steve Hodges on the Dimmitt 25 yard line and ran it back to the 34 yard marker. Dimmitt still could not move the ball and was forced to punt and again Lady Luck was on Dimmitt's side as Steve Hodges fumbled Ronnie Kenmore's punt and Emilio Nono recovered on the Hereford 42 yard line.

It was the same old story for Dimmitt and again they had to punt and this time Kenmore got off a beauty to the Hereford nine yard line. This is where Hereford started their first TD drive and with Halfback Gene Drummond and Steve Hodges carrying the brunt of the drive the Whitefaces moved down to the Dimmitt 14 yard line with only seconds left in the first quarter. With only 45 seconds left on the clock in the first quarter, Gene Drummond went around left end for the 11 yards and a touchdown with a key block being thrown by Guard Wayne Miller who was the outstanding lineman of the game. Halfback Greg Richards kicked

the extra points and the score at the end of the first quarter was 7-0 Hereford leading.

Dimmitt could not move the ball again after receiving the kickoff and was forced to punt. Hereford took over on their own 20 yard line and after this taking over Hereford scored every time they got their hands on the ball until halftime. This 80 yard scoring drive was again featured by Quarterback Steve Hodges running around his left guard and tackle hole when the necessary yardage was needed for a first down.

Walt Williams and Steve Hodges moved the ball the last 30 yards on left end sweeps and then Gene Drummond went the final six yards for the touchdown. Greg Richards' try for the points failed and the score was 13-0 early in the second period.

Dimmitt managed to gain only four yards the next time they got the ball this being on a keeper by Quarterback Kent Lindsey and again they were forced to punt. Kenmore booted it out on the Hereford 48 yard line. From here it took Hereford only six plays to score with the touchdown being on a 30 yard pass play from Hodges to Roger Owen for the TD. Williams tried to run for the extra points but was stopped at the right guard hole.

The next time Hereford got the ball, it took only one play for them to go 61 yards and a touchdown. Hodges dropped back and shot a pass to Drummond who had gotten behind the defensive man on the left side and went all the way for the score. Richards kicked the points and Hereford held a 26-0 lead at halftime.

Hereford scored again midway in the third period climaxing another 80 yard drive with Quarterback Gary Victor going over from the 1 yard line. This time Mark Hicks tried for the extra points but could not make them. This made the scoreboard read 32-0 with the Whitefaces leading.

Dimmitt managed to pick up a couple of first downs the next time they got their hands on the ball but again was forced to punt. Ronnie Kenmore put it to the Hereford one yard line and the Whitefaces were in business again. Fullback Keith Henderson went all the way for Hereford on the first play over the left side of the Hereford line but the play was called back for holding and Hereford was still on their one foot line. Hereford tried a double reverse on the next play and Robbie Lindsey broke through to knock Gary Tucker out of bounds in the end zone for a safety and Dimmitt got it's first 2 points on the scoreboard.

Dimmitt tried an onside kick and they recovered the ball on their own 49 yard line after it bounced off of a Whiteface lineman. From there the Bobcats started their best sustained drive of the evening with Lindsey, Danny Land and Tony Young pounding away at the line they went all the way to the Hereford 17 yard line before Hereford recovered a fumble on a handoff into the middle of the line.

The Whitefaces started their 83 yard march to paydirt with Victor and Williams leading the way on the ground. It took them 11 plays to put the ball on the Dimmitt 12 yard line. Second string Fullback Billy Franks smashed over for the touchdown. The try for points was no good and the score was 38-2.

Dimmitt started their best drive of the night after receiving the kickoff and drove 85 yards to paydirt with the aid of only one penalty. With Bossett, Land, Ray Bradley and Jack Bradford lead-

ing the way the Bobcats put the ball on the Hereford 11 yard line with only 20 seconds left to play. Young passed to end Don Moore who made the "catch of the night" in the right side of the end zone for the score. Bossett tried for the points but to no avail.

The game ended a few seconds later after Hereford gained 65 yards to the Dimmitt 1 yard line on a pass play but the play was called back and the Whitefaces were penalized 15 yards.

Standing out for Hereford were Halfback Gene Drummond and Guard Wayne Miller. Outstanding

for the Bobcats were Young and Bradford and the punting of Ronnie Kenmore. The Bobcats lost the services of guard Emilio Nino early in the game with a dislocated elbow.

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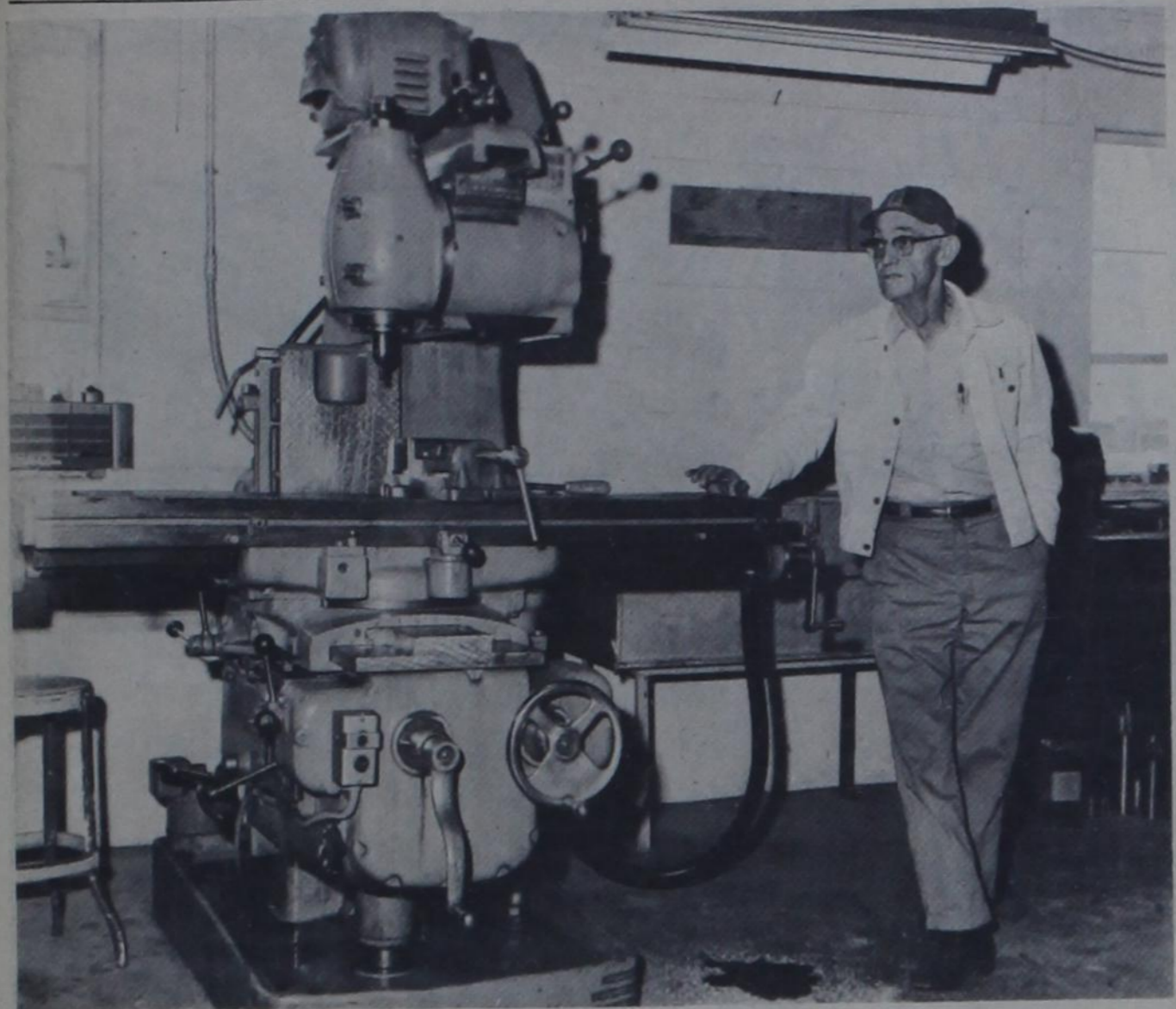

## County Driver License Denials Made Known

A total of 50 citizens of Castro County had their driver's license either suspended or were denied a license during the year 1964. Of this total, 33 persons had their licenses suspended and 17 persons were denied a license.

The number and causes for suspensions and denials of licenses were: 42 drinking while driving; 2 habitual violators; 2 violation of restrictions; 0 fraudulent use of licenses; 1 committed automatic suspension offense without conviction; 0 automatic suspension in other states; 1 driving while license suspended; 0 mental incompetence; 0 incapable; 0 driving while under the influence of drugs; 0 habitual drunkard or narcotic; 1 aggravated assault with a motor vehicle; 0 failure to stop and render aid; 1 negligent homicide; 0 responsible for accident; 0 authority withdrawn; 0 false affidavit; and 0 inimical to public safety; 0murder with a motor vehicle.

During the year 23,958 licenses were suspended with 10,069 licenses being denied over the state. The 20 year-old driver had the most licenses suspended with 1,348. The 19 year-olds ran a close second with 1,313. The oldest driver who had his license suspended was 87 years of age, with one driver 92 years of age being denied a license.

The above information was obtained from the records of the Texas Department of Public Safety. The D.P.S. is required by law to file every application for a driver's license received by it. These records include the name of every licensee to whom licenses are granted, and the name of every licensee whose driver's license or driving privilege has been cancelled, denied, suspended or revoked, and after each such name note the reasons for such action.

The Department shall also file all accident reports and abstracts of court records of convictions received by it under the laws of this state in connection therewith to maintain convenient records or make suitable notations in order that an individual record of each licensee showing the convictions of such licensee and the traffic accidents in which he has been involved shall be readily ascertainable and available for the consideration of the Department upon any application for the renewal of a driver's license and at other suitable times.
