

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, utmeg and 1/2 cup sugar. Cut in shortening until mixure is fine. Mix together egg, milk and apple; add a at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thooughly. Fill greased 21/2 x 11/4 inch muffin tins 2/3 fill. Bake in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinamon and sugar that have been mixed together. Srve warm.
