FIELD UNITIZATION.

A new conception of equitable oil production was crystalized at the annual meeting of the American Petroleum Institute at Chicago this week. Present extravagant methods of competitive production based upon the time-honored conception of a property-holder's right to exploit his own lands independently of his neighbor's benefit or lack of benefit, were condemned as responsible for the 1931 disasters which have not only undermined the public's confidence in the efficiency of the industry, but have resulted in martial law action to conserve resources indiscriminately sacrificed to individual aggressiveness.

Oil, moving about in underground reservoirs, is no respector of property lines. Its character, consequently, does not conform to application of property rights and privileges as conceived for exploitation of surface or immobile underground resources. The oil which one property-holder may extract from his acres may originally lie under the surface of his neighbor's acres. Consequently there is ground for the argument that because the oil is vented at a particular point does not mean that the person upon whose land the well is located is entitled exclusively to it.

The new conception of production control contemplates unitization of the oil fields with all holders in a pool sharing equally in the production, no matter where the various wells are located.

This plan recognizes community equity and provides assurance of equitable returns from the various tracts in an orderly manner, whereas the present system demands matching well for well in a race to obtain as much oil as possible before the neighboring producer drains it all away. With each landholder assured of production commensurate with his interest in the field, its exploitation may be carried out in conformity with market demands and the greatest ulti-mate recovery. No such burdensome flood of oil as that spouting from the east Texas fields would be allowed.

If some such plan, equitable alike to independent, majors and landholders could be worked out there is little doubt but what it would effectually prevent another recurrence of the 1931 fiasco, with its reign of waste, over-production and low prices. There are some legislative difficulties to be overcome, the application of some new principles of law and inbe a definite and trustworthy formula for determining pool change in the Texas law in boundaries and the respective equities of holders within or adjacent to production. Only the more advanced and welldefined areas of production lend themselves readily to unitization. 
