A SENATOR WHO HOLDS BALANCE OF POWER.

Senator Henrik Shipstead of Minnesota is said to hold the balance of power, in a voting sense. His vote may determine control of the senate organization. He moved down from Minnesota to Washington. In an important interview given to the press he declared that "the west is in a state of political and economic revolt and is looking for new leadership; that public sentiment in that part of the country is strongly in favor of enactment of new legislation along economic lines of an important and far reaching character. Senator Shipstead is not an ardent champion of the 18th amendment. He does not believe that prohibition is an important issue. His viewpoint is that the west demands lower interest rates on farm mortgages and that in order to bring such lower rates about he will propose an amendment to the banking laws when the question of banking legislation omes up in the senate.

Avowed purpose of his amendment will be to compel anks to continue their business to legitimate banking and to do away with banking affiliates. This is his dictum: banks should not be allowed to speculate." He added that this meant they should not be allowed to speculate either in domestic securities or foreign bonds and securities

His viewpoint is that it will be necessary to let down the tariff rates or to stop foreign loans. He declared that the west demanded and he favored lower freight rates and immediate improvement of inland waterways and that President Hoover should carry into effect his promises of 1928 with respect to inland waterway development. 
