

Grandi says that disarmament is the main or important issue before the civilized leaders of civilized nations. There can be no peace or prosperity without it, according to this trusted agent of a ruler who is greater than any of the Caesars.

Speaking of Rome and the modern Romans, Dino Grandi is here on a mission. He is said to be as clever as Prime Minister Laval of France. There are millions of Italian-Americans. Between 1876 and 1930 the number of Italians who moved away from Italy was 17,702,235. Of this total more than 8,000,000 deserted north Italy against 6,500,000 from the southern provinces. The largest number, 5,056,776, came to the United States, while Argentina alone absorbed nearly 3,000,000.
