We have the Philippines and the Islanders are demanding complete independence. We have Porto Rico and we promised the natives many years ago.

There should be concert of action on the part of all sepresentatives of the three oil producing states. Their government should be in behind them. Why should there be a huge over-production with oil a drug on the marest, forcing the lowest of price levels and sacrificing the interest of the producers of the black gold wealth of three American commonwealths?
