know Giles was registered under the name of Sewell and didn't know Giles' companion.

A Mr. Byers, employe of the Aguda, testified that he saw Giles there at the show recently talking with Grasianno.

Jim Ingram, chief of police of Ranger, said he didn't know Giles; that he answered the call the night of the robbery and took the description as given him by the theatre manager. Ingram went to Kermitt to return Giles after he was taken in custody there. That he was present when Grasianno saw Giles in jail at Ranger.

Here came a battle of objections between attorneys and the court ruled that the witness couldn't testify as to what was said at that time.

Mrs. Joe Harness of Ranger was placed on the stand and said that two men were in the drug store operated by her in Ranger on the day of the robbery. That she suspected the two men after the news of the robbery reached her. She said Giles, the defendant, was not either one of them she had in mind.

Both sides rested at noon. The court took time to prepare the charge to the jury and arguments in the case will be heard this afternoon. A verdict will not be likely until sometime Saturday.

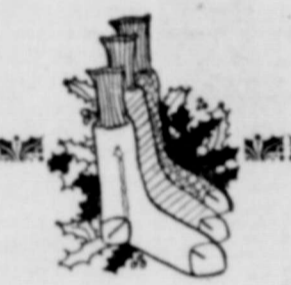

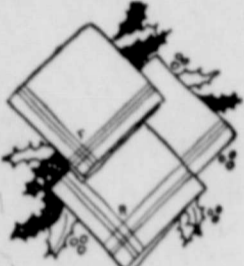

Number of High Schools in State Shows Increase

AUSTIN—Despite hard times, Texas has increased the number of its accredited high schools during the past year. A. M. Blackman, high school supervisor, and W. E. Callis, college examiner, of the Department of Education, have just returned from the annual meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, held at Montgomery, Ala. Mr. Blackman reported the list of accredited Texas high schools increased from 231 to 235. Twelve were granted recognition. Eight which did not apply for continued affiliation were dropped.

The new schools just accredited were: Seguin, San Saba, Paris, Junction, Austin and Bowie high schools of El Paso; Brownfield, Carrollton, Kaufman, Eldorado, Rankin and Winters.

The five-year programs, Moffett said, were undertaken partly to stimulate plane manufacturing concerns with the expectation that commercial orders would increase sufficiently in volume to replace the government subsidy. 'That this result has not been attained,' Moffett said, 'is primarily due to the economic depression.'

WASHINGTON—A wholesale appeal for appropriations to continue naval aircraft expansion was made recently by Rear Admiral William A. Moffett, veteran chief of naval aviation, in his annual report to the secretary of navy. Moffett urged the immediate construction of the aircraft carrier tonnage allowed the United States under the London arms treaty. 'This country,' he said, 'is far behind in the aircraft carrier category than any other nation that was a signatory to the London treaty, not only in tonnage but in the numbers of aircraft carriers.'
