



Number of High Schools in State Shows Increase


AUSTIN.-Despite hard times, Texas has increased the number of its accredited high schools during the past year. A. M. Blackman, the past year. A. M. Blackman, high school supervisor, and W. E. Cattis, coffege examiner, of the department of education, have just returned from the annual meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, held at Montgomery, Ala. Mr. Blackman reported the list of accredited Texas high schools increased from 231 to 235. Twelve were granted recognition. Eight which did not apply for continued affiliation were dropped.

The new schools just accredited were: Seguin, San Saba, Paris, Junction, Austin and Bowie high schools of El Paso; Brownfield, Carrolton, Kaufman, Eldorado, Rankin and Winters.


