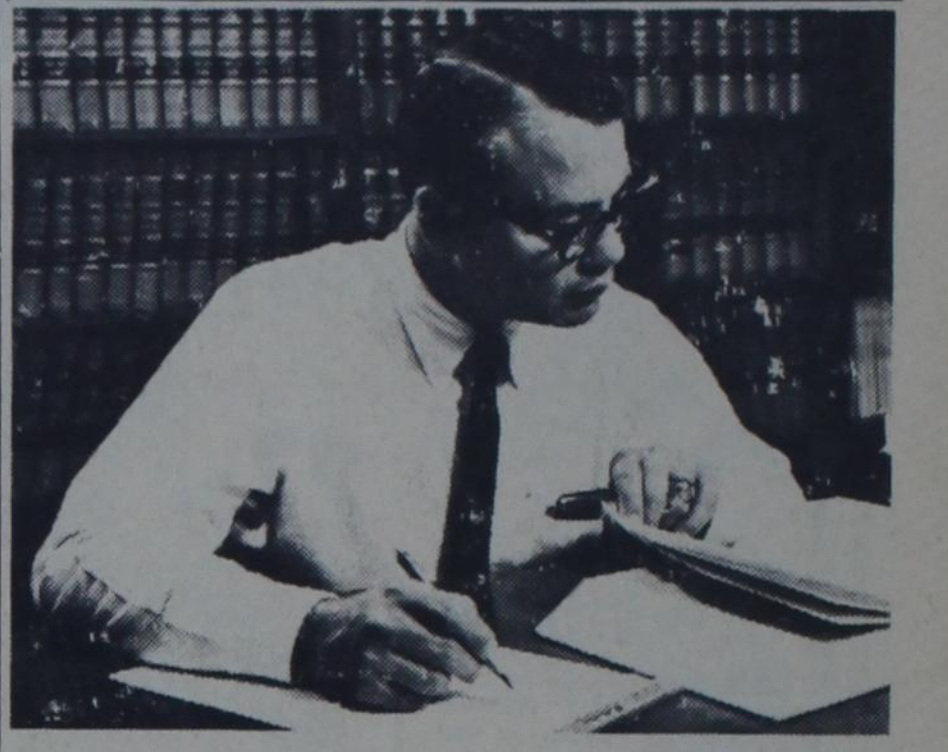

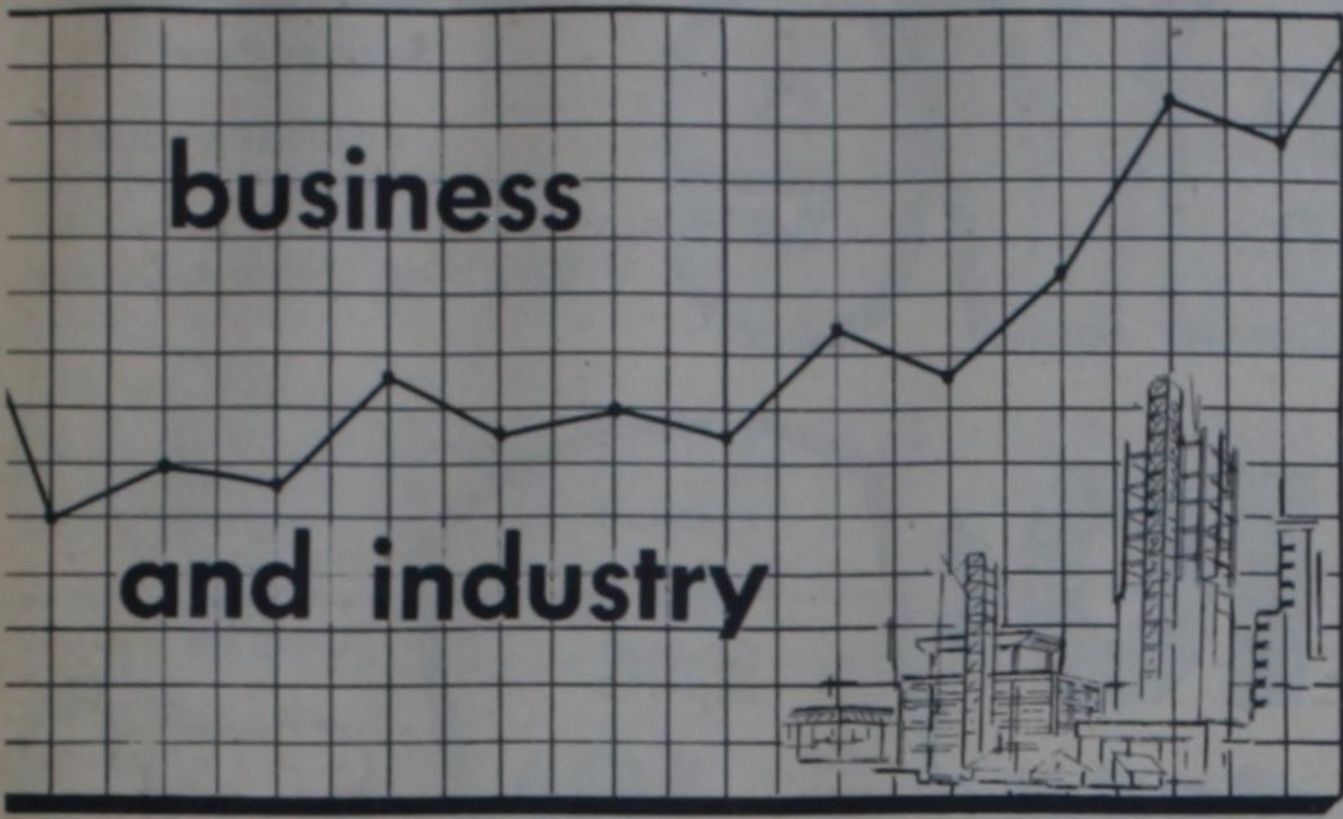












## Miles Laboratories Buy Union Starch Co.

Miles Laboratories, Inc., Elkhart, Ind., pharmaceutical and chemical manufacturer, has purchased Union Starch and Refining Co., Inc., Columbus, Indiana, corn wet-milling firm.

**THE ANNOUNCEMENT** was made jointly by Walter R. Beardsley, Miles board chairman, and Irwin Miller, Union chairman and head of Union Equities Corp., which owned more than 90 percent of the corn starch firm.

Theodore R. Reed, president of Union Starch since 1961, will remain as head of the company, now a Miles subsidiary. Commenting on the transaction, he said:

"This is a natural partnership that will strengthen both companies. It will give Union greater growth potential by adding Miles' research and technological capabilities to our own. This combination of technical resources with Union's production facilities and experience will place our company in a stronger competitive position. This will, of course, benefit both Union employees and the communities in which our plants are located."

UNION has signed agreements to operate the Dimmitt Wheat Growers' proposed \$20 million wet grain milling plant here, and to market the mill's products.

Reed stated that all Union Starch's operations are to be continued intact at its Columbus headquarters and plants at Granite City, Ill., and Edinburg, Ind., with present personnel and management.

Union sales in 1965 were approximately \$26 million, and are expected to be in the same range this year. At its Granite City, Ill., plant, this wet milling company grinds and converts corn into many products including corn syrups and sugars, starches, caramel color, corn oil, gluten meal and feed, and other corn by-products.

At the Edinburg, Ind., plant, it also manufactures cyclamates (artificial sweeteners). The firm also has manufacturing interests in Mexico, Colombia, Peru and the Philippine Islands.

MILES Chemicals Division is a leading supplier of citric acid and also manufactures enzymes and organic chemicals. The Miles Consumer Products Division includes such brand name items as Alka-Seltzer, One-A-Day Vitamins and Bactine. In the professional field, the Ames Company Division manufactures simplified diagnostic tests, electronic instruments and laboratory supplies, and Dome Laboratories Division produces dermatologicals, allergens and the therapeutic drugs.

## Judge to Head Spelling Bee; All Winners Will Get Prizes

Some time before April 1, the Castro County Bee will be held and the champion will go to Amarillo April 22 for the regional elimination for the National Spelling Bee.

LAST YEAR, Harold Bob Bennett, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Ed Bennett, was the Castro County spelling champ. He was an eighth grader in Hart Junior High School.

The '67 Golden Spread Bee will be co-sponsored by West Texas State University and the Amarillo Globe-News.

Again this year, there will be a unique secondary contest — a Junior Spelling Bee, open only to contestants from the sixth and lower grades. The National Spelling Bee is open to all students from first to eighth grades.

Last year's Castro County junior champion was Steve Birdwell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kent Birdwell and a sixth grader in Dimmitt Elementary School.

**WINNER OF THE Golden Spread Bee** will go to Washington during the first week of June 1967 to compete in the National Spelling Bee. The regional champ will win a wealth of personal prizes, plus two for his school — a full year's use of the Britannica Film service and the Bee's traveling plaque.

Last year's prizes for other top contestants included a stereo phonograph, 24-volume encyclopedia, Lincoln Library, pen and pencil set, seven-language dictionary, world atlas and cash prizes. Virtually the same prize list will be available this year.

The county champion will receive an engraved plaque and gold pen; the junior champ will get a silver pin and trophy; and school winners will receive pens inscribed "school champion."

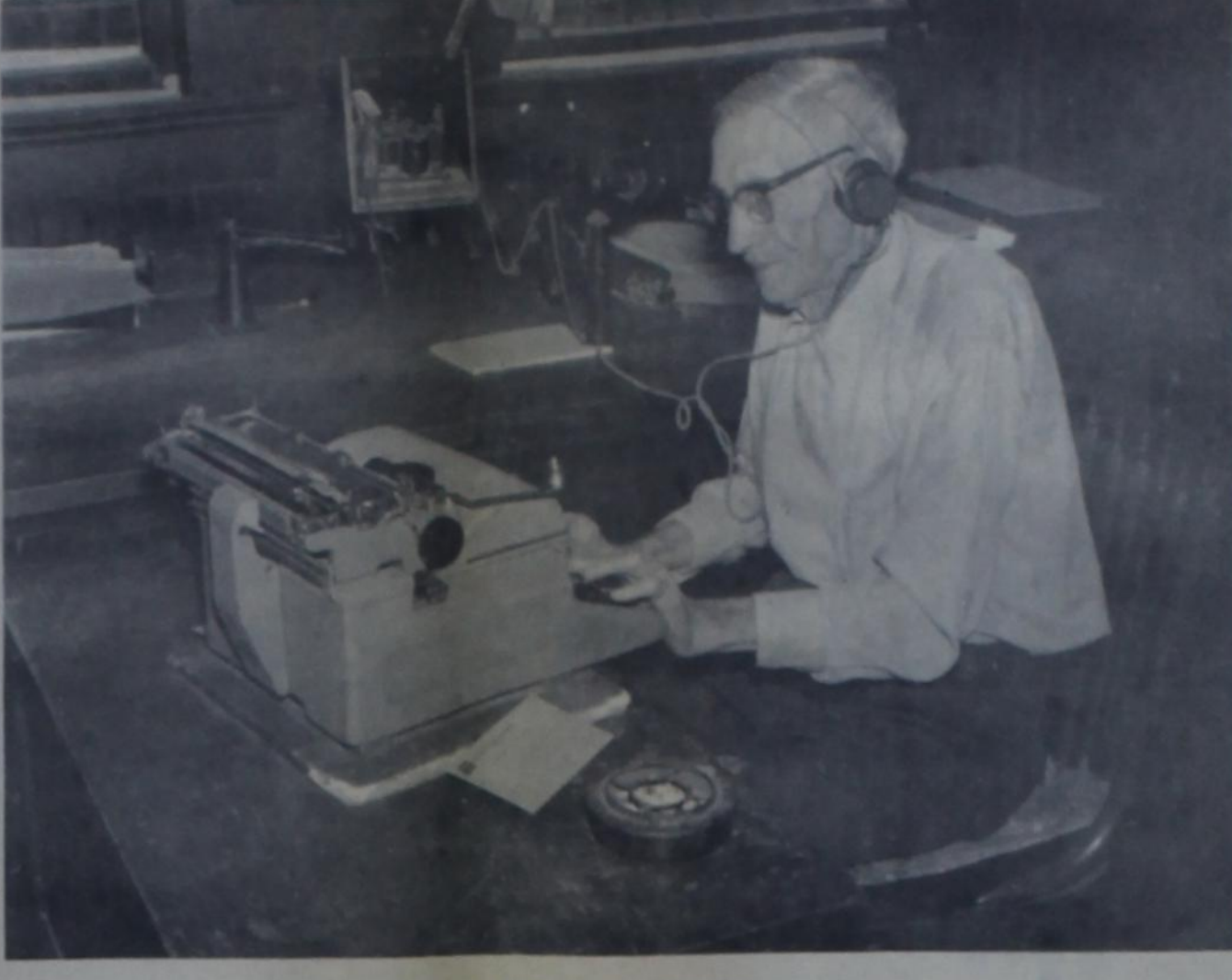

## Hart RR Agent Retires

After 38 years and five months at the telegraph key and station desk, H. E. Loman of Hart retired Monday from the Fort Worth & Denver Railroad.

LOMAN, who'll be 78 Dec. 1, has been the Hart agent for the FW&D line since Christmas day, 1942. Known as "Pappy" by the folks of his community, he's been a reliable part of Hart for 24 years, and has seen the local branch line grow to be the best business branch of the widespread FW&D network.

Grain is the reason for the big railroad business here. It has become a huge responsibility, shipping the thousands of cars of payload from this rich irrigated county.

"We started our first grain movement out of storage back in February," he said. "We kept that up until May, then the wheat harvest started. As soon as things started slowing down from the wheat harvest, they started shipping cotton and grain storage again. Now it's time to start shipping new grain."

THE GRAIN-CAR order he got last Feb. 26 for 470 cars — the biggest single-day order of his career — would have made a train four miles long. All up and down the branch line, telegraphs clicked for more cars as orders poured in from elevators holding stored grain for the Commodity Credit Corp.

"We ran out of cars pretty fast — it was up in May before we could finally clear up all those February orders," he said.

Irrigation, he noted, "has been the making of the Fort Worth & Denver Railroad in this country." Where in the dryland days there was a train every other day, as needed, there are now trains whistling up and down the branch line daily with freight cars and huge new grain hoppers.

Loman, who is known up and down the line by his telegraph call of "HF," hung his hat in quite a few stations before he settled in Hart 24 years ago.

ALTHOUGH he's spent more than 38 years with the Fort Worth & Denver, Loman has actually been railroading for 49 years. He got his start in 1904 in his home state of Illinois when, at age 15, he went to work as agent and telegrapher for the Chicago & Eastern Illinois Line. He worked 12 hours a day, seven days a week, for \$37.50 a month, "which wasn't bad pay at that time," he said.

"In my days with CE&I, we heard that money grew on trees out west," he said. He joined the Fort Worth & Denver at Estelline, and later worked for the Rock Island Line at Wellsford and Plains, Kan., the Santa Fe in Lubbock, and the Wichita Falls & Northwestern.

He quit railroading in 1914 and farmed at Hartley until 1927, when his first wife died. He sold his farm and went back to the station and telegraph key in 1928.

WHILE HE was an agent in Lelia Lake, he met and married Miss Myrtle Pistole of McLean on Aug. 1, 1930. His wife, "Myrtle," is one of the best-known ladies of Hart. She is a former editor of the Hart Beat and is now the Hart correspondent for the News and for daily papers in Plainview, Lubbock and Amarillo.

One of the most gratifying things Loman can remember about his years with the railroad is that no railway tragedy has ever marred his career. There were rough times — especially during the war — but he has weathered them and has built an enviable record as an efficient resident agent.

When he first came to Hart, the town had only two stores, 10 houses, the depot and three tin elevators. It's now an incorporated city, a growing agricultural center that's getting its share of the county's progress.

LOMAN HAS helped create the spirit that's so prevalent at Hart. He was one of the charter members of the Hart Lions Club, and is active in the modern First Methodist Church there.

And besides being Hart's resident agent, he's also the Western Union operator and the official US Weather Bureau observer for the town.

His decision to retire "was one of the hardest decisions I've ever made," he said. "In the summer I can piddle around the house and garden, but in the winter there's nothing to do."

But his retirement is his first time off in 20 months, so he'll try to get used to it, he grinned.

### Senior Citizens Are Target Of Amendment 7

State Senator Franklin Spears of San Antonio has called on Texas voters to defeat Constitutional Amendment 7 at the polls Nov. 8.

The amendment, if passed, is supposed to repeal the poll tax, but actually it creates a confusing and misleading voter registration system.

Spears said he favors defeat of Proposition Seven because:

"1. It is no longer necessary to repeal the Texas poll tax. The courts have already done so.

"2. Proposition Seven is misleading because its language does not reflect what passage would actually mean."

Spears said passage of the amendment would mean:

"1. That all voters must register—even those over 65 [who] do not now have to register.

"2. That all voters must register each year—thus not allowing the Legislature the chance to decide whether registration should be annual, biennial or permanent."

"If Proposition 7 passes," said Spears, "Texas would be the only state in the nation with annual registration. Annual registration is bad because it has no protection against voting fraud. Re-registration by voting is far more preferable." Re-registration by voting is sometimes called permanent registration.

Under such a system, said Spears, "voter lists are available the year 'round and can thus be purged of those not qualified."

Also, he pointed out, no dead persons would be listed, nor can convicts or other ineligible voters—"because these names are automatically furnished to the voter registrar who removes them."

Persons who move from one county to another under permanent registration must re-register and are automatically removed in the county of their former residence.

"Finally," said Spears, "the cost of re-registration by voting is only one-tenth as costly as would be the system set up by Proposition Seven—25 cents per voter as opposed to 2.5 cents.

"The strongest democracies in the history of man are those where citizen participation is greatest," said Spears. He added: "Proposition 7 would drastically limit participation by people in their government.

"Texas is already low in citizenship participation — in the last two Presidential elections we ranked in the bottom seven of the 50 states in the percentage of eligible voters who actually voted.

"Under Proposition 7 the Legislature is given no chance to provide for greater participation."
