Are You Heating The Great Out-doors?

Save Gas by Weather-stripping Doors and Windows!


It is estimated by heating experts that from 10 to 25 per cent of the heat produced in the average home is lost through cracks around uninsulated doors and windows. When freezing northers are blowing this percentage may run even higher.






