



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TWO CENTENNIALS

The Texas committee for the Chicago Centennial world fair will meet in Austin about March 1 to start a campaign to raise \$250,000 in Texas for the Chicago show.

It's nothing to get alarmed about, in a year like this. Texas probably will spend \$250,000 on the Chicago exposition, in the expenses of those going there, and the money spent by Texans in Chicago. All they're asking now is that Texas pay for part of the exposition so later its people can pay for the privilege of going in to see it.

Texans will remember they have an exposition of their own coming along in 1936.

We think we can imagine what we should hear if we were to ask Chicago to give us \$250,000 for it.

Texas will send large numbers, no doubt, to the Chicago fair. It really has been putting a tough job on the shoulders of Texars to ask them to make an advance campaign for \$250,000 for the exposition that essentially is competive with the Texas Centennial. If they can raise it, they're entitled to congratulations, especially in view of Texas' belief now that if it has \$250,000 to spend, some of it should go to save the lives of ricket-ridden, underfed children, to make economic conditions such as to keep half-grown boys out of the penitentiary and half-grown girls out of hungerpinched vice.

TAXES MUST BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM

The high cost of government is due for a fall, and all the king's horses and all the king's men can not hold it up. Taxpayers, who have been hard hit by the business slump, are up in arms demanding curtailment in expenditures and reductions in taxes in city, state and national governments. Taxpayers associations have been formed in all parts of he country-the move is nation-wide. Other organizations not ordinarily interested in such problems have joined in the movement for reduced taxes.

It is estimated that one dollar out of every six dollars earned goes to the cost of government. The annual tax bill has reached a staggering sum due to waste and extravagance in governmental expenditures, and has become so burdensome that the people can not carry the load. In Texas we say taxes shall be equal and uniform; yet many instances have been found where injustices have been done o individuals as well as business firms and corporations. Recently in a large Texas city a case was found where a \$9,000,000 corporation had assessed its property at \$900,-000 or 10 per cent of actual value, whereas the law requires assessment be made at 50 per cent. In another case it was found that a sulphur company valued at \$60,000,-000 is paying \$1,750,000 in taxes, while the 160 building and loan associations in Texas with recources of about \$225,503,174 pay less than \$60,000 annually in taxes. Obviously, much of this is traceable to the manner in which renditions are made. Where individuals or corporations are permitted to make their own renditions there are bound to

be inequalities. The Texas Taxpayers Association has adopted a fivepoint program calling for consolidation of state bueraus, adoption of an inexpensive system of adjusting tax assessments, adoption of an effective system for taxing property not now on tax rolls, adoption of a means by which the tax- tax brackets. Many more suggestions have been made as to the best course to follow in effecting reductions; many more will be made in the coming campaigns. This is a poltical year, and politicians, as usual, will advocate lowering of taxes. They * know the people have been awakened to action and are going to use the ballot to enforce their demands. Let us hope the people will not be "out-smarted" by irresponsible and incapable politicians .- Editorial Digest.
