



## **BIG TEXAS GAS** FIELD LACKS STATE CONTROL

AUSTIN. — The Texas Pan-handle, biggest gas reservoir yet discovered, is in the throes of contested claims, statutes and litiga-

Texas railroad commissioners, Texas railroad commissioners, given control of gas and oil by statute, admit they have no power over the great volumes of natural gas flowing through seven interstate pipe lines, which are reaching out to Chicago and Indianapolis, and being extended as far east as Buffalo and as far north as Minneapolis.

Hundreds of millions of cubic feet daily are moving through these pipe lines.

950 Miles Long.

A line 950 miles long and 24 inches in diameter runs from Texas to Chicago. It alone is carrying 175,000,000 cubic feet daily ing 175.000,000 cubic feet daily and can be made to carry 200,000,000 a day. Its owners are said to be planning a duplicate line and an extension to Milwaukee. The Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line company, passing through Kansas and Missouri, Illinois and Indiana, can carry 130,000,000 cubic feet a day and has 75 towns to be served. Lies of the Northern Gas & Pipe Line company have one terminus in the Texas Panhandle and the other in Minnesota, after serving other in Minnesota, after serving 61 towns in Nebraska, 27 in lowa, 15 in Kansas and one in South Da-kota. Other smaller lines leave the state.







The three days before Ash-Wednesday are called Shrovetide and are the conclusion of that 12 days' are the conclusion of that 12 days season of festivity called the Carnival which word is derived from two Latin words, caro flesh, and valere to live well: and thus Carnival means to indulge the flesh.


