



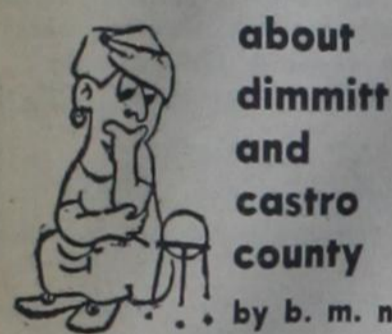

59 DHS Grads Begin College

Fifty-nine of Dimmitt High School's 91 spring graduates are entering colleges and universities as freshmen this week and next. **AND one nearby school** — West Texas State University — is getting almost half of them. Dimmitt graduates are continuing to run far ahead of the national average in college attendance, with 65 percent of the Class of '68 college-bound. Nationally, 40 percent of high school graduates go on to college today, according to DHS Principal Ike Moore. Dimmitt students will be freshmen at colleges and universities in three states this fall — Texas, Oklahoma and Arizona — although the majority of them are signing in at WTSU (26) and Texas Tech (12).

It's Field Day At Foundation

That leaves it up to the ordinary Texas Democrats to carry the ticket for the party in this election year. If democratic party leaders in Texas refuse to work for and carry the party for the national ticket, then the voters should be consistent and elect a republican governor.

Easter to Host Sky-Diving Meet Saturday, Sunday

Easter will host a big sky-diving meet Saturday and Sunday, with hundreds of jumps, free falls and specialty acts by professional and semi-pro sky-divers. **THE MEET**, sponsored by the Easter Lions Club, will be held at the Easter International Airport on the Frye Farms, at the intersection of Farm Roads 1055 and 1057. The meet will be staged from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and from 1 to 7 p.m. Sunday. Admission will be \$1 per car. Commercially rated pilots also will be on hand to provide plane rides, and the Easter Lions hope to have a helicopter demonstration Sunday afternoon.

A group of Hart football fans have called a public meeting for Monday night to organize a booster club. The meeting is scheduled for 8 p.m. in the Hart school cafeteria.

A West Texas "Farm Fair" will be held today (Thursday) at High Plains Research Foundation as members and trustees present the 12th Annual Field Day.

An event hosting more than 4,000 area residents annually, the field day offers farmers, businessmen and industry officials a first-hand opportunity to see results of the foundation's work in more than 50 areas of research study.

Other features will include product and agricultural improvement displays showing the latest advancements in producing, harvesting and utilization of the area's agriculture products. New displays will be an exhibit of cotton wardrobes arranged by the Hale County Cotton Promotion Association and a plan of water importation for the West Texas area by Water, Inc.

OTHER exhibits will be on oil seed crops, grain sorghum, cotton and agricultural chemicals. County, state and federal agriculture agencies are planning additional educational exhibits.

A special attraction of the field day is the farm machinery display. Exhibits in this display are furnished by area and national manufacturers and distributors to show field day visitors the latest advancements in farm machinery technology. Activities begin at 1 p.m. with guided tours through foundation research plots, with members of the research staff describing results and programs of work under way at four stops during the tour.

THE HIGH Plains Research Foundation is a public's supported, private enterprise research farm to test and develop new solutions to agriculture problems facing West Texas and High Plains farmers. The field day activities are open to all who are interested.

Farm Bureau Slates Annual Meet Saturday

An ice cream supper, adoption of new bylaws, election of directors, an opinion survey on national issues and a program by youth leaders are on tap Saturday night when the Castro County Farm Bureau holds its annual convention. **THE MEETING** will be in Dimmitt's South Elementary School cafeteria, and will begin at 7 p.m. with the serving of ice cream and cookies.

The three students who were sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar by the local chapter will report at Saturday night's convention. They are Durward Strickland of Dimmitt, Angela Conrad of Nazareth and Harold Bennett of Hart.

Also, Wolfgang Buschard, American Field Service exchange student at Dimmitt High School this year, will be introduced.

FOLLOWING the program, Farm Bureau members will adopt new bylaws for the county organization, elect new directors and consider resolutions to be submitted to the state and national conventions.

The county Farm Bureau's 500 members this week were mailed questionnaires concerning 19 current issues that could affect American farmers. The questionnaire, drawn up at the recent district policy development meeting, is likely to provide the basis for most resolutions adopted Saturday night.

The questionnaire concerns such issues as the welfare program, gun control legislation, traffic laws, water importation costs, farm programs, unemployment compensation for farm laborers, marketing, public schools, teacher salaries, foreign trade and trucking.

County Farm Bureau President Rayphard Smithson of Dimmitt will conduct Saturday night's convention.

It's 'Go-Team-Go' Time

The conflict and pageantry of high school football will explode Friday night when Castro County's three teams open their 1968 seasons with fresh hopes.

THE DIMMITT Bobcats and the Nazareth Swifts will open on their home fields, while Hart's Longhorns will travel to Ropesville.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. for all of Friday night's contests. Later in the season, the teams will all switch to 7:30 kickoffs for conference games.

The Bobcats, in their home opener, will take on their traditional first-game rival, the Muleshoe Mules of District 2-AAA, and Coach Brown L. Smith will be looking for his first victory over the Bailey County squad.

AFTER ALL the angles are

figured, the game can only be rated as a toss-up at this point.

The Bobcats will uncoil a new offense for Dimmitt fans Friday night — the Slot I, a pro-type formation intended to open up the game with more passing. There'll be a "lonesome end" split away from the rest of the lineup on every play.

In addition to the new faces on the team, there'll be new faces in the big Bobcat Marching Band, the twirling corps, the cheerleaders and all the other practiced units that contribute to the colorful fall pageantry.

AT NAZARETH, Coach R. B. Christian's Swifts will host the Frio B squad in their opening encounter, and the Swifts rank as the favorites.

The Swifts will operate from refined variations of the T formation, and are expected to keep the ball in the air much of the time.

THE HART Longhorns, with a new coaching staff, will go to Ropesville to test their new offense against a new opponent.

Coach Don Seymour's Herd will use the pro-set offense — basically an "I" backfield formation with flankers likely to camp out in any direction.

Since the Longhorns and the Ropesville Eagles are meeting for the first time, and since both teams are unknown quantities at

this point, only a fool or a new-comer would try to pick a favorite in this opener.

All three of the county's teams posted respectable records last year, with an aggregate total of 17 wins, 11 losses and a tie. Dimmitt finished the year with a 6-3-1 mark, Nazareth was 6-3 and Hart ended with a 5-5 record.

They'll all be out to make those records even better this year — starting Friday night.

Swifts To Host Friona B

"The greatest football team in history was Brown University, with only 12 men. And that substitute never got to play."

COACH R. B. Christian keeps telling himself that as he prepares his Nazareth Swifts for their opening game against Friona B — and the rugged season that will follow.

The Christian's way of being optimistic. He isn't like most coaches — he WANTS to be optimistic.

And he has reason to be. He has nine starters back from the team that posted a 6-3 record last year. He has an experienced player at nearly every position, and only three of his squadmen are seniors.

BUT WHEN he looks at his bench, he keeps referring back to Brown University's great 12-man squad, for consolation.

"We're very short on depth," he explains. "When we get past our first 11 or 12 players, then we're down to our 98-pounders."

As his 28-man squad runs its field maneuvers, you see a fly-my-ish tribe of freshmen whose numbers reach below their belts, gamely hitting the bigger guys and bouncing off.

That worries Coach Christian a little. But still, he and his assistants are more optimistic than worried.

"**WE'VE GOT** good anchors at tackle and center, and good linemen altogether," says Assistant Coach Clayton Neal, without any hesitation. "And I think we've got two of the best ends in the district (senior Bernie Wethington and junior J. C. Pohlmeier). And Bobby Schulte is looking good at quarterback."

Schulte was an all-district guard last year as a junior, and is one of the team's most experienced linemen. But when asked to take over the key post this season, he stepped in like a natural — and has become the team's sparkplug.

Schulte will shift gears this season from the Slot T formation mainly, but the Swifts will also vary their attack with the Wing T, Straight T and I patterns.

CARRYING the freight Friday night when the Swifts host Friona B in the season lid-lifter will be right halfback Harold Schacher, left halfback David Olvera and fullback Gene Schmucker.

Clearing the path for them will be right end J. C. Pohlmeier, right tackle Ralph Pohlmeier, center Francis Acker, left guard Tom Jones, left tackle Melvin Wethington, and left end Bernie Wethington.

On defense, the Swifts will work basically from a 5-4-2 pattern. Up front will be ends Carroll Gerber and Bernie Wethington, tackles Raymond Huseman and Tom Jones, and middle guard Francis Acker. Starting linebackers will be J. C. Pohlmeier, Bobby Schulte, Sidney Birkenfeld and Gene Schmucker. Back-up men will be halfbacks David Olvera and Harold Schacher.

"**IT'S GETTING** hard sitting here holding them," Christian said of his squad. "They're ready to go mentally. They're enthusiastic."

Looking at his season's schedule, he thought out loud: "The first two games (Friona B and New Home) will give us enough experience to know where we need the most work. Then we've got an open date on the 27th. I am going to keep it open — we've got five killers after that (Bovina, Happy, Alamo of Amarillo, Hart, Lazbuddie)."

Horns to Open At Ropesville

Hart's Longhorns will face a new opponent on their slate Friday night when they travel to Ropesville to battle the Eagles for the first time.

Kickoff time for the season opener will be 8 p.m.

IT'LL BE the first official outing with the Longhorns for new Head Coach Don Seymour and his three assistants. But it won't be the first acid test for the Herd's new pro-set offense.

Friday night the 'Horns hosted Class AAA Boys Ranch in a full-game scrimmage — and they moved the ball well against the Wranglers, fighting to a draw with the larger squad.

The Herd's foreman may have found an answer Friday night to the lack of speed that's been bothering him. Running back Jimmy Robinson, who joined the squad just last week, consistently broke loose for long yardage on quick-openers against Boys Ranch. The short, stocky Robinson didn't seem as fast as he was quick — he started in high gear and stayed there until someone, or two or three, finally rode him down in the secondary. He's likely to see plenty of action at Ropesville.

GUIDING the Longhorns from the key post Friday night will be little Gary Rambo, a senior. He'll be spelled by Harold Bennett, a converted center who's turning out to be the team's all-round utility man at offensive quarterback and end and in the middle of the defensive line.

Other ball-toters who are expected to see a lot of action Friday night are junior fullback Danny Smith, senior halfback Joe Quiroz and sophomore halfback Landria Bruington.

The Longhorn line will be full of returning lettermen, including ends Ronnie Barham and Quincy Hawkins, tackles Ricky Mitchell and Andy Rogers, guard Richard Murray and center Ralph Bell.

COACH Sonny Arthur's Ropesville Eagles have seven starters back, including their entire 1967 backfield. They posted a 4-6 record last year.

Heading the Ropes runners is Russ Arp, a 180-pound senior fullback. He'll be flanked most of the time by 155-pound Dave Bradshaw and 140-pound Rosie Lara.

Guiding the Eagles from the quarterback position most of the right will be Ted Lowrie, 160-pound senior who's rated as one of the finest passers in the South Plains. Coach Arthur will also

shift Lowrie to halfback occasionally to take advantage of his excellent running ability.

Lowrie's aerial targets will be ends Rick Braden, a 185-pounder, Larry Parchman (165) and Dennis Baxter (160). All are tall and glue-fingered.

Waterfowl Seasons Set

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in a special called meeting last week, set the waterfowl seasons and bag limits for the 1968-69 season.

THE DUCK and **COOT** season will begin one-half hour before sunrise Dec. 14 and extend through sunset each day through Jan. 12. Daily bag limit is four and may not include more than two wood ducks, one canvasback or redhead, and two mallards. Possession limit and ducks is eight, and may not include more mallards. The daily bag limit on canvasback or redhead, and four mallards. The daily bag limit on coots is 10, with a possession limit of 20.

The hunting season for geese and brant will begin one-half hour before sunrise Oct. 30 and continue until sunset Jan. 12, with a bag and possession limit of five.

In that portion of Texas lying west of US Highway 81, daily bag and possession limit may not include more of the following species than: one Ross's goose and in the alternative one white-fronted goose, or one white-fronted goose and one Canada goose, or two Canada geese.

East of US Highway 81 the daily bag limit may not include more than one Ross's goose and in the alternative not more than one Canada goose or one white-fronted goose, and the possession limit not more than one Ross's goose and in the alternative not more than two Canada geese or one Canada and one white-fronted.

Bobcat-Mule Game Is a Toss-Up

In the last two season openers, there's been only one point's total difference between Muleshoe and Dimmitt on the scoreboard.

AND IT isn't likely to be any different Friday night, when the Bobcats host the Class AAA Mules at 8 p.m. The game is rated as a toss-up.

"Our boys have a real good attitude," Coach Brown L. Smith says, "but they're going to be in for a surprise against Muleshoe if they're not ready to play."

Smith would like nothing better than a victory over the Mules. That's something that has eluded him since he came here as head coach three years ago.

IN SMITH'S first season here, the Mules dominated the Bobcats,

20-6. In 1966 the two teams played to a 6-6 tie. Last year Muleshoe won a 14-13 squeaker.

Surprisingly enough, both teams have already played a common opponent. They both met Morton in pre-season scrimmages, and both came out on top.

"Our boys seemed to think they ran better against Morton than Muleshoe did," Smith said, "but the Morton boys told us that Muleshoe hit them harder."

HE ADDED: "Ben Grambling, the Dimmitt High School counselor last year, who has moved to Muleshoe, saw both of our squads scrimmage Morton. He told me that Dimmitt and Muleshoe looked about equal to him, and that it looks like the team that wants

it the most is the one that's going to win Friday night."

Coach Dick Stafford's Mules will outweigh the Bobcats a bit, with a team average of 169 to Dimmitt's 162½. The Mules have seven starters back, compared with Dimmitt's six — but those returns include the Mules' entire starting backfield last year.

Muleshoe runners to watch Friday night are junior quarterback Rennie Barrett (16); senior fullback Reger Swint (31), a 180-pounder; and senior halfbacks Charles Beamon (60), who checks in at 175, and Eddy Burge (46), a 140-pound sprinter.

ALSO, KEEP an eye downfield for senior end Trevor Ford (87), and in the line for senior tackle

Terry Reasoner (78), a 194-pounder who's an experienced starter on both offense and defense.

When the Bobcats have the ball, you'll see a more wide-open offense than you've seen here in years, with Bill Sanders guiding the team from a Slot I formation. One of the main passing targets will be split end Jerry Brady, a 6-4, 191-pound senior.

ASCS Notes

How to Compute Barley Acreage

By CHARLEY E. HILL
Barley is now included in the feed grain program for 1969, just like corn and grain sorghum. You may substitute between these three feed grains within your feed grain permitted acreage, and you may substitute between wheat and feed grains within the limit of your total permitted acreage for all of these crops.

EARLIER information in pamphlets mailed with 1969 wheat allotment notices and publicized through news items stated barley would not be included in the feed grain program for 1969, but that the barley base could be requested and approved for purposes of substituting wheat for barley provided 15 percent of the approved barley base was diverted. These statements are no longer correct.

Producers may still substitute wheat for barley just as they can substitute wheat for corn and grain sorghum. The required grains under the 1969 program has not been determined at this time.

BARLEY planted on any farm in 1969, which is participating in the feed grain program, will count against the feed grain permitted.

Planting barley in excess of the feed grain base on a non-

participating farm will have the same effect as planting corn or grain sorghum in excess of the feed grain base for offsetting compliance purposes and will make the producer ineligible for payment on any farm under the 1969 feed grain program.

Ballots were mailed to all known eligible producers on Sept. 6, and must be returned no later than Sept. 18. Both husband and wife are eligible to vote.

1968 COMPLIANCE

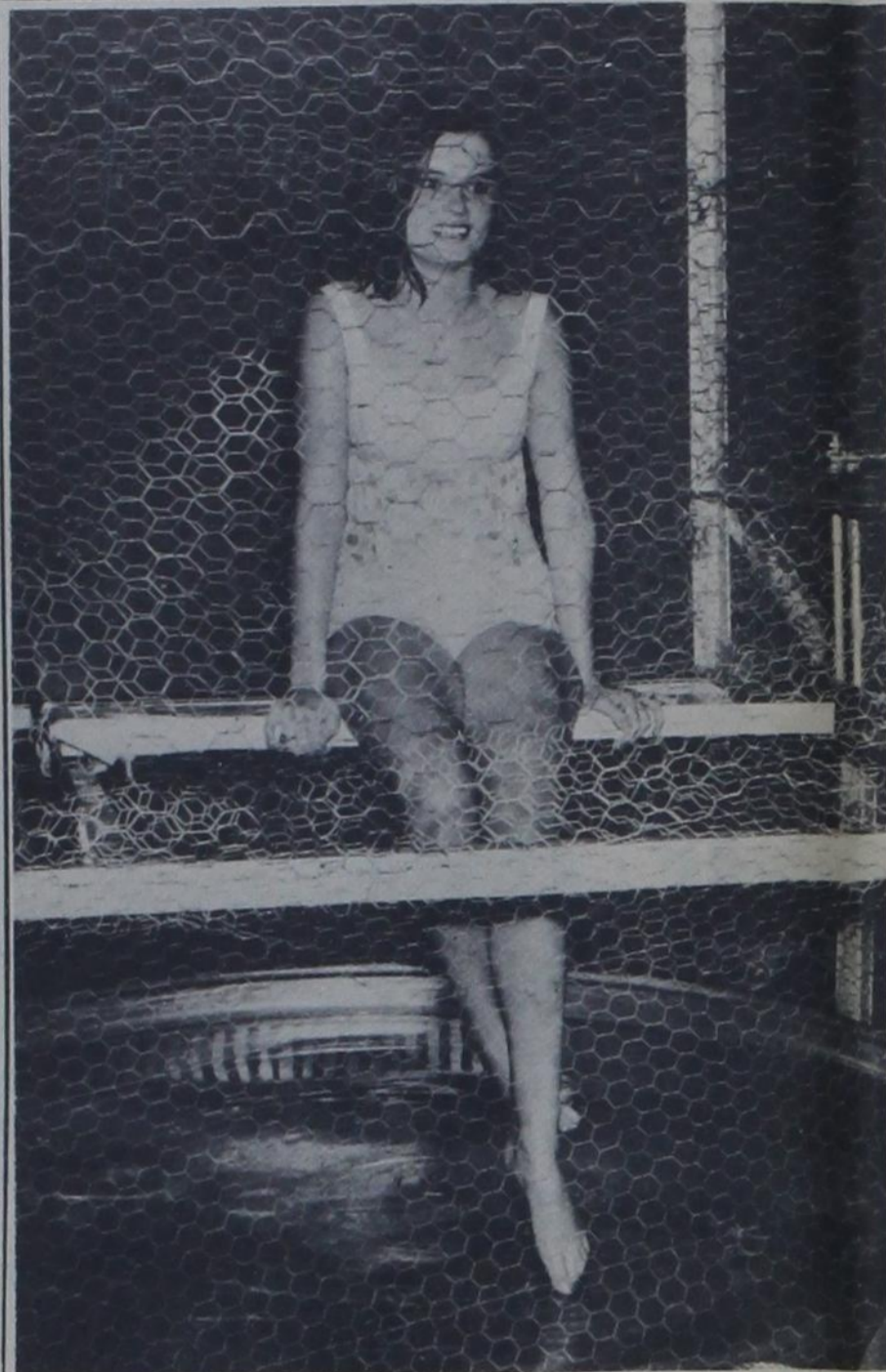
We are now in the process of making field spot-checks for compliance with 1968 feed grain, cotton and wheat programs.

Diverted acres that were reported as summer fallowed must be kept free of weeds. Soybeans on diverted acres must be incorporated into the soil, and the ASCS office notified no later than Sept. 30.

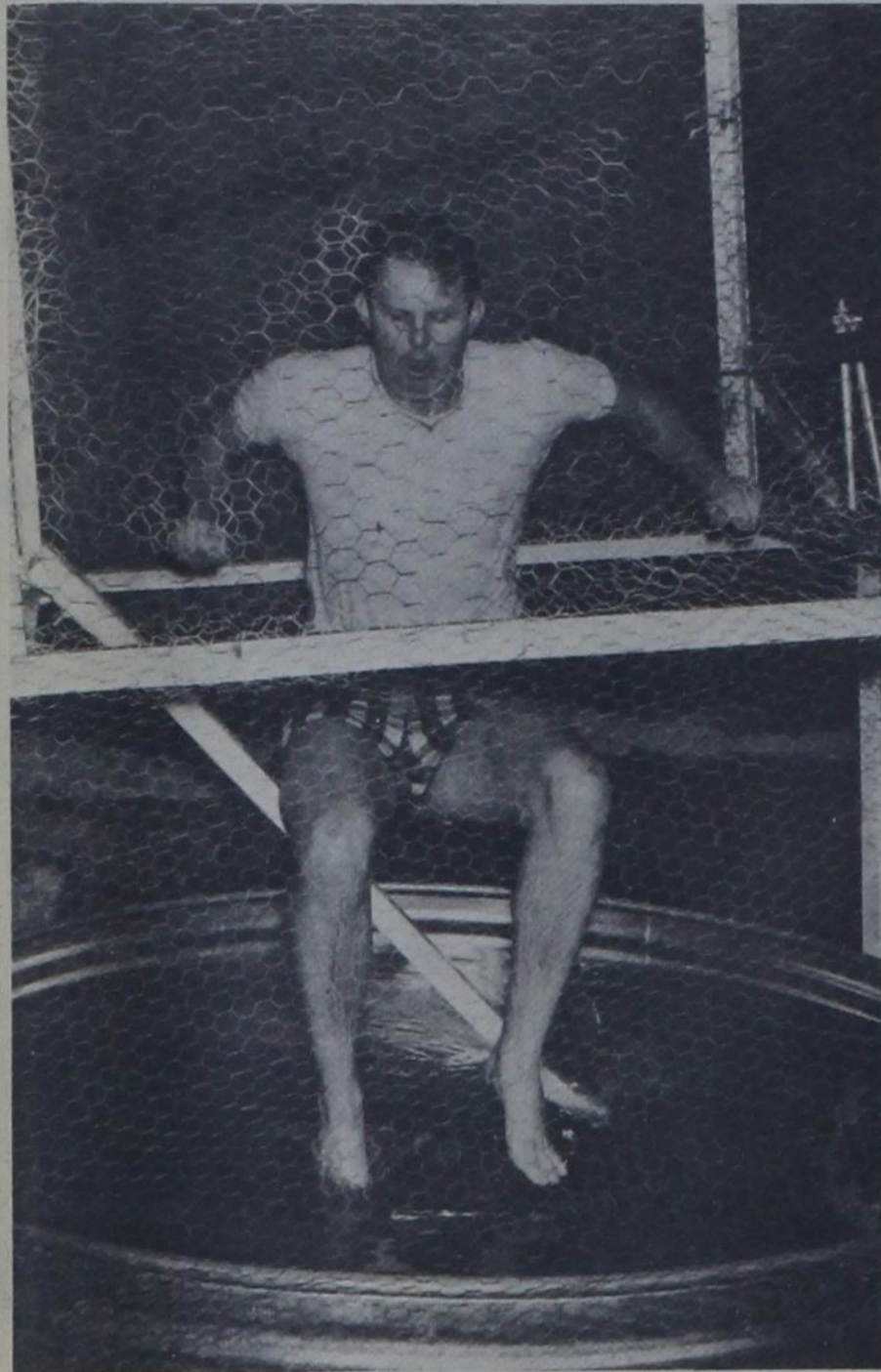
Diverted acres may be grazed beginning Oct. 1.

A MORE professional job may be obtained when painting interior walls if care is taken to prepare the wall surface prior to the application of the paint. All small cracks and nail holes should be filled with spackling compound and sanded smooth. 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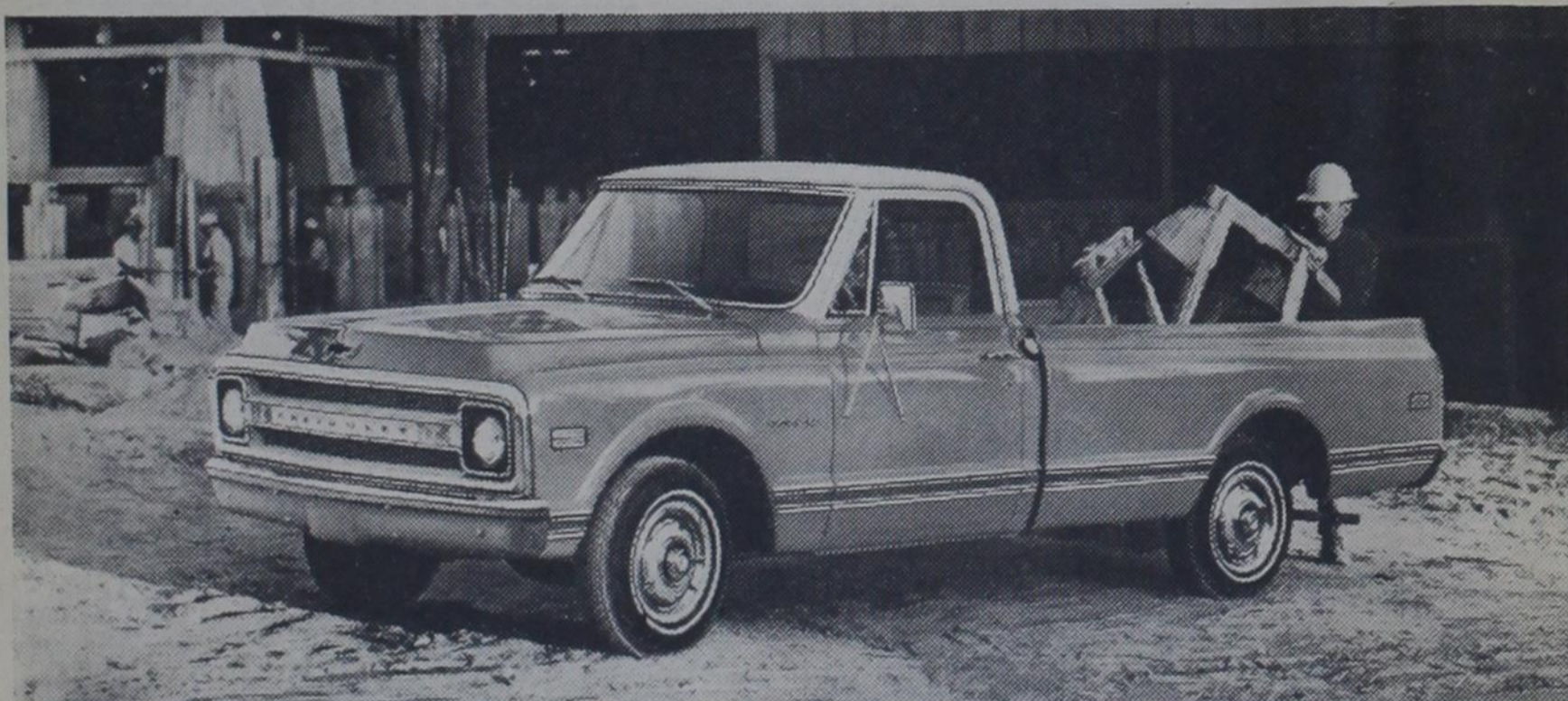

New State Residents May Vote, But Must Register by Sept. 21

County Clerk Zonell Maples issued a reminder this week that new residents of Texas who wish to vote in the presidential election this year must apply for a ballot at her office by noon Saturday, Sept. 21.
THE REMINDER is for voters who will have lived in the state more than 60 days but less than a year by next Nov. 5, general election day.
This is the first time that residents of less than a year will be

able to vote in a presidential election in Texas. A law passed last year allows a new resident to vote if he has lived in Texas for at least 60 days by election day, possesses all qualifications required for voting in Texas elections except the normal residence requirements, and was either a qualified voter in another state immediately prior to moving to Texas or would have been eligible to vote in the presidential election in the state of his former residence.
Mrs. Maples said that if the voter was registered in the state of his former residence and has a voter registration certificate or other document to prove his registration, he should have the document with him when he applies at their office. Otherwise, it will be necessary for her to contact the appropriate election official in the state of the voter's former residence to verify whether he would



Clayton Named to Study Group On Liquor Servers, Suppliers

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake has been named to a special committee to study Texas liquor laws pertaining to the financial involvement between establishments that serve alcoholic beverages and their suppliers.
CLAYTON was a member of the State Affairs Committee panel that recommended reforms to the State Liquor Control Act to the special session of the legislature in June. The measures were approved in the House of Representatives, but failed to pass in the Senate.
Clayton's appointment was announced in Austin by House Speaker Ben Barnes and Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, chairman of the House State Affairs Committee.
Clayton said he hopes the study will result in recommendations to the 61st Legislature, which meets in January, of liquor control laws that will provide much stronger controls on the consumption of alcoholic beverages, particularly pertaining to sales to minors, and that will prohibit organized crime from entering the liquor and beer industry in Texas.

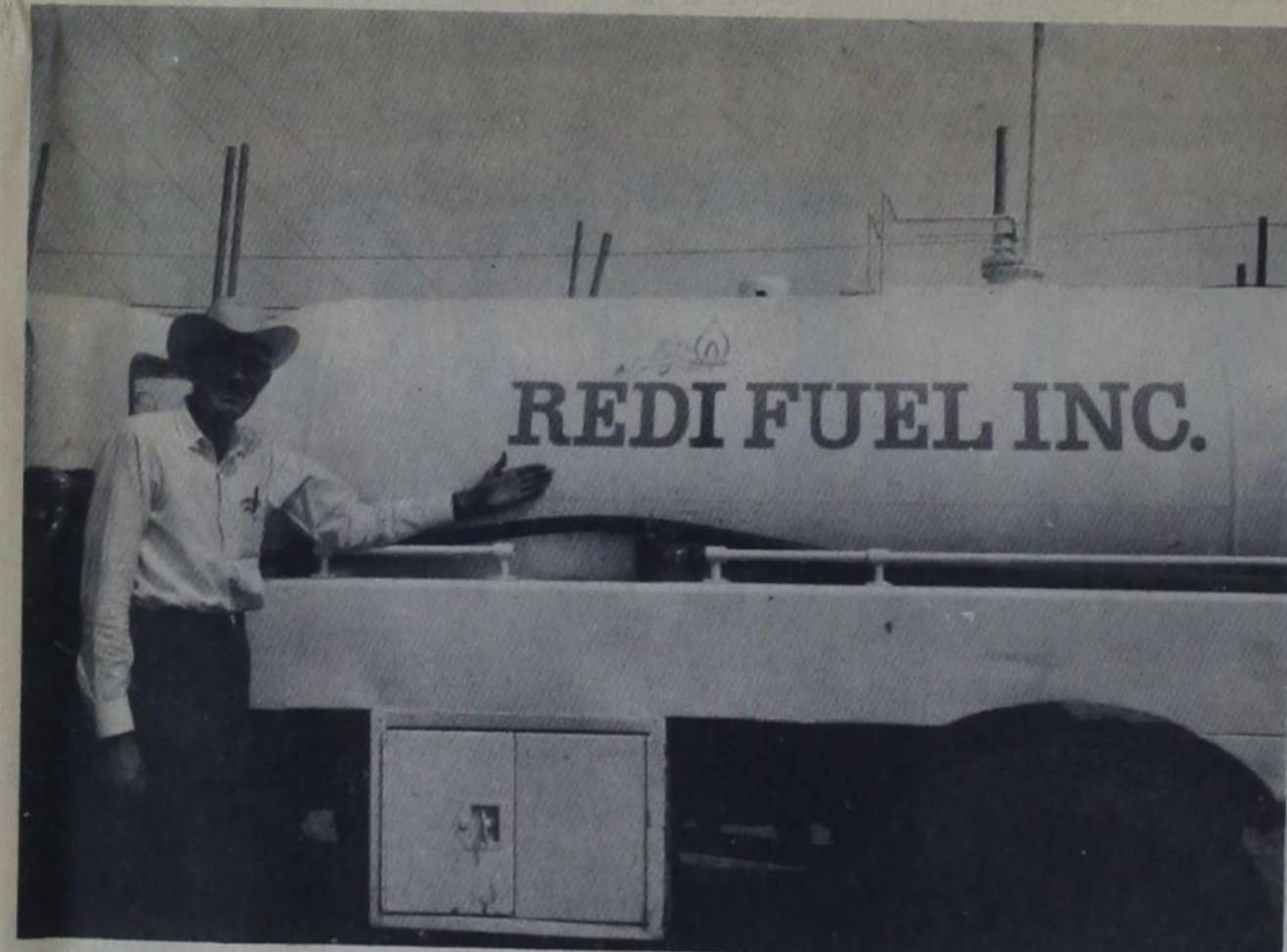

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
Combine biscuit mix, two-thirds cup cereal crumbs and raisins. Toss lightly, add honey, milk, and four tablespoons butter or margarine; stir just until dry ingredients are moistened. Spread evenly over bottom of greased nine-inch cake pan. Combine remaining cereal crumbs, butter or margarine, sugar and nutmeg; mix to coat crumbs. Sprinkle over top of dough, pressing crumbs lightly into dough. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F) until done, 30 to 35 minutes. Yield: One nine-inch round coffee cake.

Voters who will have lived in Texas more than a year on election day must be registered with the tax assessor-collector in order to vote, Mrs. Maples said. Persons who became residents of the state on or before Oct. 1, 1967, had to register by last Jan. 1, the regular registration deadline, but those who became residents after Oct. 1, 1967, may register any time up to 31 days before the election, (by Oct. 31).
If a registered voter will have lived in the state more than a year and in Castro County more than six months on election day, he will vote a full ballot in the ordinary manner on election day at the polling place for the voting precinct in which he lives. If he will have lived in the county less than six months, he will be able to vote on statewide offices and issues, including President and Vice-President, but not on local offices and issues, by applying to the county clerk for a ballot from Oct. 16 through Nov. 1.

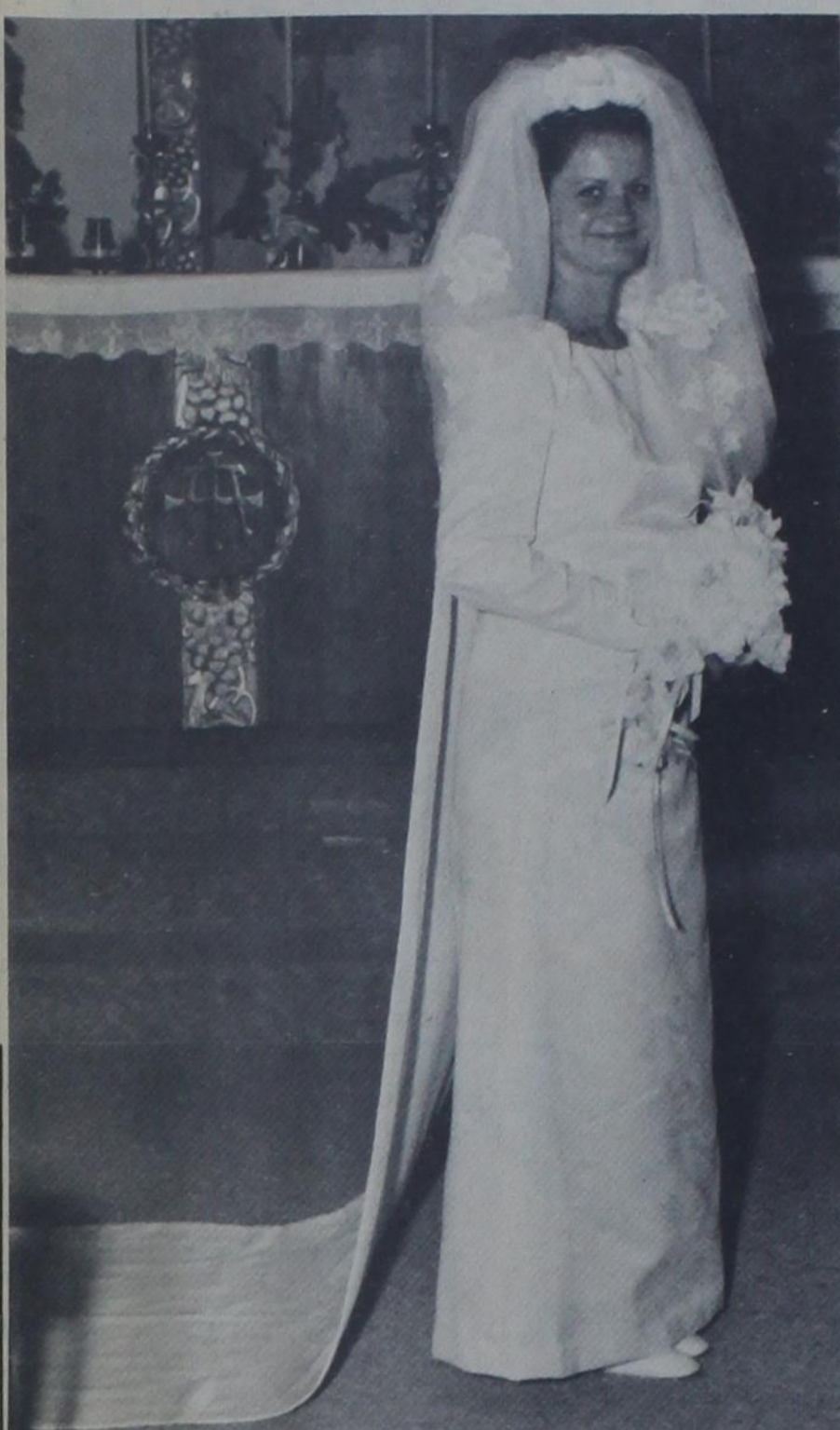
