It will be recalled that the total vote for Von Hinderburg for renomination was 18,661,736 out of 37,660,377 cast for all presidential candidates. Von Hindenburg fell just 167,752 short of getting a majority. He expects to be re-elected at the run-off April 10. Germany has a population of 63,000,000. It will be recalled that the population of the United States is approximately 120,000,000. In 1928 the bitterest presidential contest in American history ss than one-third of the population of the United States was drawn to the polls and yet only 36,879,414 votes were cast for all presidential candidates in that year, or 780,963 less than all the German candidates received. Suffrage is universal in Germany just as it is the United States. In Germany all men and women over 21 are permitted to vote without any property qualifications or other limits. Polling places are carefully guarded and there has been no changes of fraud in the German presidential election. Really, the German voter must look upon the franchise as a sworn duty and not a flimsy responsibility. There is direct action in Germany. 

Expert Finds New Neutrone Ray

By United Press. LONDON. — Further progress in an understanding of the struc-ture of the atom has been made through the discovery of a new ray, which gives off particles call

ed neutrons. Discovery of the new ray was recently made by Dr. J. Chadwick, of the Cavendish laboratory, Cambridge, while Dr. Chadwick was studying the effect of bombarding a metal called beryllium with alpha atticles.

"The existence of the neutrone has been suspected for 12 years," Dr. Chadwick said. "The neutrone contradicts all the accepted laws. It is without an electric charge and therefore cannot be deflected by magnesium from its mass."

The discovery of the neutrone follows earlier discoveries of the electron and the protone and their relationship to the structure of the atom.



By United Press. MILWAUKEE, Wis. - Unemoyment, improper home con-tions and lack of education were atstanding factors in the lives of 500 Milwaukee criminals studied by Dr. R. E. Bushong, psychiatric director of the county medical hy-

Bushong's survey disclosed hat at the time of committing rimes 302 of the 500 were unemloyed. The majority were in good physical condition. Mental tests howed 344 were normal, 12 in-ane. 46 feeble-minded, 13 phychpathic, 14 psychoneurotic, and 81 ad abnormal traits.

Doctor His Own By United Press.

FORT WORTH.—In saving the hands and arms of others through three decades of dangerous X-ray pioneering, Dr. I. C. Chase has lost one of his own.

The 63-year-old surgeon who operated Fort Worth's first X-ray machine in 1902, is at his home here after amputation of his left arm, destroyed by the deadly electrons of the X-ray tube.

He probably has performed his last operation. The emputation climaxed more than 50 previous operations on Dr. Chase's hand as doctors attempted to arrest the weird disintegration of tissue.

Today, physicians are aware of the lethal properties of the X-ray. They work in lead aprons, behind lead screens and wear gloves.

"Other cases similar to mine are beginning to show up," says Dr. Chase. "Scientific men are on guard today. Thirty years ago the X-ray was new. We didn't know." The 63-year-old surgeon who op

The mysterious atrophy which attacked the arm of the surgeon reached its peak 20 years ago after Dr. Chase had sold his X-ray apparatus and devoted himself almost strictly to surgery.

In 1910, he sold this equipment and went abroad. He studied in Vienna Berlin Paris, and London.
