A BILLION ADDED TO LIFE INSURANCE

Men are protecting their own. Notwithstanding the influences of economic conditions, life insurance companies of the United States added \$1,320,000,000 to their assets in 1931. This increase brought the total investment of the legal reserve life insurance companies up to \$20,200,000,-000. This represents the equities of more than 68,000,000 policy holders or an average \$297 per policy holder. It is said the life insurance companies have been enabled to continue to serve the financial needs of the nation by adding their ownership of the fundamental securities of the country; that these new investments have assisted in maintaining work and capital by financing public projects, and by making possible public work by the absorption of state and county and municipal bonds.

PIPE LINE FROM TEXAS TO THE PACIFIC

Now oil promoters who are engaged in the pipe line business are planning construction of a new pipe line from Midland, Texas, to Topolobampo, Mexico. For what purpose? To carry West Texas crude to the pipe line to connect Midland with the West Texas Pipe Line Gas company to the Amarillo gas field. An engineer has made a survey and submitted his report to the promoters. It is said that the plan contemplates piping natural gas which would supply all cities along the 660 mile trek between Midland and the west seaport of Mexico. All the promoters are said to be Californians, with James F. Sadler as chief executive and directing head.

It is said that tank steamers are now loading at San Francisco daily for Japan and other countries of the Orient. Topolobampo is the largest land locked harbor in the world and has 40 feet of water at its dock. Moreover Topolobampo is nearly as close to the Texas oil field as Houston or nearly as close as Port Arthur. There is something doing every day in the oil fields of the world.

### CIGARET SMOKERS FRIENDS OF EDUCATION

There is a federal excise tax on tobacco including cigarets. There is a state tax on cigarets. Well, the state tax has made it possible for Texas to pay its per capita apportionment of \$17.50 to Texas schools. State Supt. S. M. N. Marrs has the figures. He predicts that the per capita quota next year will be \$16. He is advocating that the burden of the ad valorem taxes on property be shifted to other sources of income. He stresses the point that the cigaret tax alone had poured approximately \$2,000,000 into the coffers of the state school fund. He classified the gasoline tax "the greatest windfall the schools have ever ad." He viewed with some anxiety an impending constitutional amendment exempting homesteads from \$3,000 in state tax regulation. He predicted that it would affect the rendition of property as well as the pension, general revenue, and 35 cents ad valorem funds for schools. This will make it necessary for the state to tax other sources of revenue for taxes for school funds.





Some interesting comparisons may be drawn. For example: If a man had deposited \$161 in the bank in July, 1914, and left it there, it would have been worth only \$84 in merchandise in 1920, \$100 in 1929 and \$125 today: This does not consider interest earnings,

The relative value of the annual return from a fixed investment is another angle for comparison. Take the man who owned \$20,000 worth of 5 per cent bonds and enjoyed an income of \$1000 therefrom in 1929. The same income would have yielded him, in retail buying power, \$1610 in 1914, \$840
