Fourteen prosperous families in the Sutton area are said to be ready to support the movement end adopt one unemployed family each so as to save them from mentel and physical deterioration tel and physical deterioration which is increasing in many places. It is proposed that a wealthy family can either take the adopted jobless persons into their home, provide a home for them on and food bill in this way, those families which have exhausted most of their "dole" benefits and cannot live on poor law relief, would be spared.

Once adopted, the jobless man and his family, for all practical surposes, would be part of the benefacting family. General outdoor work and domestic occupa-In most cases as the scheme is not intended to be outright charity.
