## Dead Man's Body Leads To Lawsuit

NICE.—Recent outages of protests here by members of local families following the besieging of a house by a band of undertakers clamoring for the body of a dead man have resulted in one of the strangest law suits judges have been called upon to decide in years.

No sooner had the man died, it is stated, than a dozen high-powered burial salesmen, using corporation methods, descended upon the dwelling and fought among themselves for the corpse. One of the salesmen was finally arrested on charges of trying to sell his funeral racket to a Paris mortuary firm for 100,000 francs (\$4,000). Suspicions led to an inquiry which revealed that he had already sold the privileges to a local organization. The undertaker was sentenced to six months. He appealed the case through one of the most prominent lawyers in France, Deputy Henry Torres. Proving that large interests were at stake the civil party to the prosecution employed Camille Chautemps, former premier. Judgment was upheld, however, and the undertaker will serve his original sentence.

## French African Mission Acts To Save Jungle

PARIS.—A French government mission sent into Africa to study the native fauna reported that unless drastic measures are enacted immediately, elephants, horned rhinoceros, giraffes and dwarf hippopotamuses will be killed off in the French colonies within a few years.

The mission recommends a Franco-Belgian-Belgian treaty forbidding the export of rhinoceros horns—particularly sought by Chinese for their alleged medicinal value—and severe laws to curb the shooting of animals by native and white game hunters.

"The worst enemies of the native fauna of Africa are the natives who kill them for their meat, hide and tusks, and the sportsmen of Europe and America who organize great expeditions for the sole purpose of acquiring hunting trophies for the decoration of their smoking rooms," the report says.

The report points out that Belgian Congo soon will be without elephants except those kept in national parks. Each battalion of natives working on government building projects is allowed to kill

## Huge American Planes Will Open Turkish Air Route

PARIS.—American multi-motor airplanes in the hands of Turkish fliers, who have yet to be taught the rudiments of flying high-powered planes, will cut shorter by five days the route to India and the East within a year. At the same time, Turkey will open up through airmail and the aerial transportation of passengers and freight, the whole of Eastern Turkey—a backward region cut off from the world for centuries.

Major William Robertson—former employer of Charles Lindbergh on the St. Louis to Chicago night airmail and one of his financial angels on the trans-Atlantic flight as vice president of the

Curtis-Wright corporation—has made a survey of Turkey with a complete network of commercial lines.

These lines would begin at Constantinople, where the French air line from Paris, via Vienna, Belgrade and Bucharest, ends. At present the British and Dutch airlines to India skirt Turkey, for they are forbidden to fly over the country, which is without facilities for landing and fueling planes.

The British India bound planes cross the Mediterranean from Athens to Cairo, then over the Syrian desert to Bagdad, and on to the east. When Turkey opens up her national air lines, the passengers for India and the east can change from a French to a Turkish plane at Constantinople, and fly by direct line to Bagdad, saving three days.

The Turkish network for through planes would carry passengers to Angora, thence over the Tuz Göl salt lake and the Cilician Taurus mountains to Adana, on the Gulf of Iskandarun; thence to Diarbakir and on to Bagdad. Three-ringed American planes will be used. They will be built in America and more than 100 will be needed to complete the scheme of aerial development.

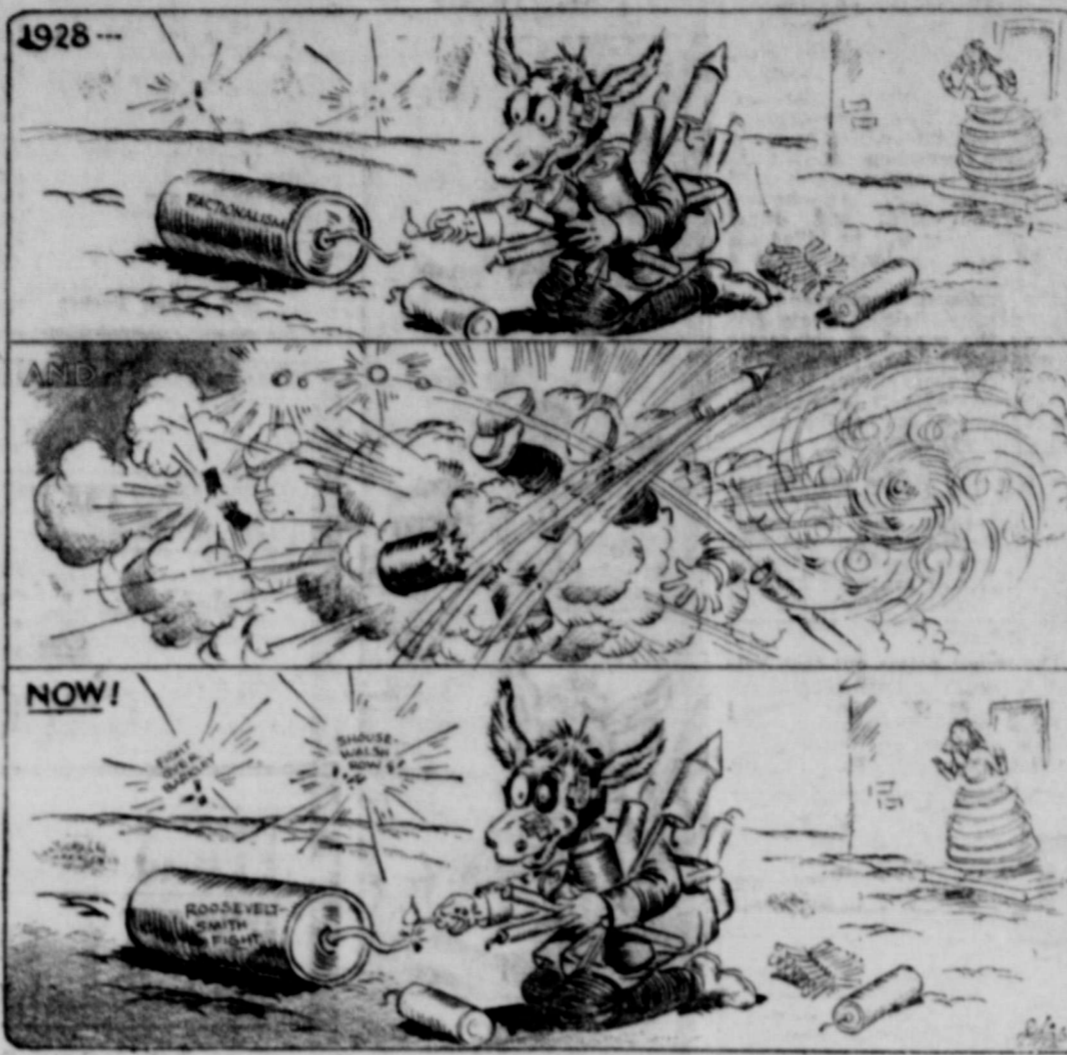

Political Follies of 1932

CHICAGO—The position of permanent chairman at a national political convention, which will provide the first floor fight between the Chairman Joseph Shouse, Roosevelt and Al Smith at the Democratic meeting, is one of dignity, conspicuousness and importance.

"Hard-boiled Bert" Snell demonstrated as much when he ably filled the job for the Republicans. Either Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana and Democratic Executive Chairman Joseph Shouse, Roosevelt and Smith's choice, respectively, probably will have a much more exciting time presiding over the Democrats. Their battle will probably usher in the convention.

The Chairman's Chance
ALTHOUGH the temporary chairman delivers the party's keynote speech and the keynote speech is theoretically the convention's prize gem of partisan oratory, it is quite possible for the permanent chairman to take the honors away from the keynote when he subsequently delivers his own speech before many thought Snell outdid Senator Dickinson of Iowa, the Republican keynote.

After the Roosevelt faction had supported Shouse for permanent chairman in a deal which closed on Senator Barkley of Kentucky for keynote, they learned that he was working on a speech which he refused to submit to the governor and his men. Realizing Shouse's anti-Roosevelt leanings they were partly influenced by that fact when they declared war on him and announced their support of Walsh.

Recognition Important
KEEPING the convention and galleries in order is another job of the chairman which either Shouse or Walsh can do as well as anyone. Each can affect an impressive Prussian manner with a gavel in his hand.

So can Snell, who showed it when he handled the galleries during the whole-hearted boing of James R. Garfield's speech against the repeal plank. Snell almost had the gallery wot's going out of his hand for McAdoo.

Recognition of delegates who want the floor occasionally becomes of enormous importance. It did in 1912, when Chairman Ollie James recognized William Jennings Bryan, berating improperly, in the middle

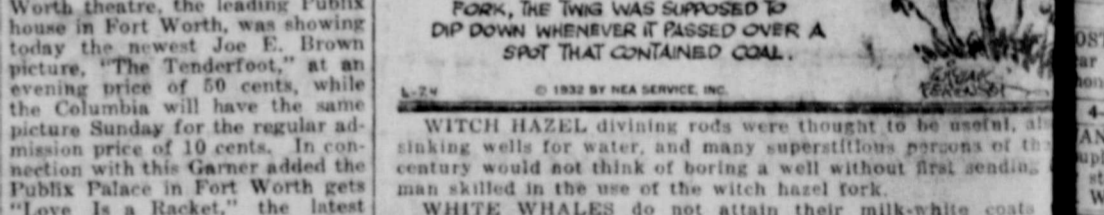
