W. H. Hawkins
Is Speaker At
Valley Mills

VALLEY MILLS, Texas, July 18.—W. H. Hawkins of Stephenville, speaking here Saturday afternoon in behalf of his candidacy for congressman-at-large said: "In the more than 8,000 miles of my travel over Texas not one solitary farmer have I met who has said he had been benefited by the federal farm board, so I am more against it than when entering this race.

"My main business if sent to Washington is going to be to try to locate ways and means by which better market conditions may be established for products of the farm and the elimination of a board that has cost so many millions and accomplished so little ought to help along the program. "It is my contention the law of supply and demand is not alone responsible for the fact that prices have fallen so low as all products of the farm, and that it is up to congress to leave no stone unturned in doing everything in its power to create a more wholesome state of affairs for agriculture and its natural sidelines, cattle raising, poultry production, fruit culture and the raising of hogs, sheep and goats, as well as more pay for milk and eggs."

"If sent to congress no measure which in my judgment would interfere with remunerative farming will receive my support, but I shall gladly favor every measure which seems to me would prove helpful. "As I see it, and as it appears to me everyone in other walks of life than farming should see it, we are all going to continue to be losers just exactly as long as the farmers are not making money, and the depression will rapidly fade away when farming becomes remunerative, and there is no doubt in my mind that a democratic victory in November will be a wonderfully long stride in that direction.

"I have been a dry all my life and also a democrat. I am on record as being personally against repeal, but if the people of Texas honor me with a seat in congress, the will of the majority of my constituency will actuate me in whatever I shall do, if I am able to determine what the majority desires.

"I am opposed to nepotism; to government participation in private business; to the cancellation of war debts that are due this country. I am in favor of ex-service men being paid their bonuses at the earliest moment our nation can do it with safety, and I think that will also be hurried by President Roosevelt."

Eight detectives and a patrolman were injured before the crowd, estimated at 1000, was dispersed. Forty alleged rioters were arrested. An order prohibiting public Communist meetings was issued by police following the riot.
