#### LIVESTOCK PRODUCES ARE VERY HOPEFUL

Livestock producers are coming out of the cave of gloom. Recent substantial gains in the price of cattle and ogs are being received throughout the entire agricultural belt from the Northwest to the Southwestern border. At Omaha, where the Union Stockyards are among the largest in America choice beeves commanded \$9.25, said to be a startling contrast to the meager prices of three months ago. Market observers estimated the rise of the past two veeks had hoisted the value of cattle and hogs on Nebraska farms more than \$37,000,000.

Ralph Budd is president of the Burlington railroad. He is quoted as having said "no other thing has happened ince the depression began has heartened me so much than the continued rise in livestock prices." A high purchasing power carries its own story. President Budd remarked to an interviewer "unquestionably the rise in commodity prices would be the surest way out of the depression. #### Fergusons File **Petitions On Taxes** For Four Years

WASHINGTON. - "Former Governors James E. and Miriam A. Ferguson of Texas have filed petitions with the United States board of tax appeals denying alleged deficiencies in their income tax returns for 1924 to 1928 and asking for a redetermination of their taxes for those years.

"James E. Ferguson is alleged to owe the government \$1,053 in taxes and his wife \$1,737.

"Principal items disputed are withdrawals of funds from the Forum Company, a publishing concern in Austin, which James E. Ferguson managed while 'Ma' was governor. The government con-tends that these withdrawals which were over and above the \$5,000 a year salary drawn by James E. Ferguson, were 'dividends' but which the Fergusons say were only 'reimbursements' for funds advanced the Forum in its lean

"The combined net income of James E. and Miriam A. Fergu-son in 1924, according to their return, was \$1,577. The governent has adjusted this to \$40,168. Of this latter amount, \$30,765 represents withdrawals from the Among other sources of James

E. Ferguson's 1924 income was a salary of \$600 which the government says was paid by the Texas Light and Power company but was not listed in his income tax return.
"The following year, 1924,
James E. Ferguson reported a net
income of \$1,750 while his wife says she sustained a net loss of \$990, making their income \$760. Again the government has adjusted their figures. Drawings from the Forum amounted to \$37,218, according to the bureau of internal revenue, and should have been counted as income. A deduction of \$25,000 which James E. Fergu-son said he lost through a "friend-ly foreclosure' on a Liberty county ranch was disallowed, increased his alleged income that much more. As finally adjusted, the Fergusons

net income for 1925 was \$61,122.

"James E. Ferguson also had an earned income of \$17,800 for 1925 the government said. This included \$1,050 from his newspaper writings a select of \$10. paper writings, a salary of \$10,-000 from W. T. Eldridge, another \$750 from the Sugar Land rail-road and a third of \$6,000 from the Forum.

"Another item of income listed for the same year was a check for \$2,746 by the Southern Pacific railroad for subscriptions to the

"In 1926, the Fergusons reported a net income of \$15,717. But the government says it should be adjusted to \$47,322. In 1927, their reported net income was \$5,-369 and adjusted, \$13,935. Their reported net income in 1928 was \$2,891, aand adjusted \$4,608.
