





G. L. DAVENPORT REPLIES TO ALLEN DABNEY'S BRIEF ON HABEAS CORPUS

Mr. Dabney has undertaken to present to the people the law relating to habeas corpus, citing a number of authorities. It is not expected that the general public is familiar with the law governing such matters, and it is unfortunate that a person seeking the high position of District Judge would say anything that would mislead or misinform the public concerning such matters.

Mr. Dabney charges the present incumbent with wrongfully granting writs of habeas corpus, and cites a number of cases to support his assertion. Let us see what some of the cases he cited say. In the case of Click vs. State, 39 S. W. (2nd) 39, it is said: "It may be stated as a general rule that while a writ of habeas corpus is a writ of right, it is not a writ of course, and the rule is that probable cause must first be shown to obtain the writ, whether it be granted at common law or under the statute. Where one entitled to a writ of habeas corpus makes proper application for it to the proper court having jursidiction said application conforming to all statutory requirements and probable cause being shown, the writ of habeas corpus cannot be denied, for it then becomes a constitutional right. Neither can it be denied where the granting of it is made an imperative duty by statute. It should be granted without unreasonable delay."

Mr. Dabney did not tell the citizens the full holding of that decision, and his statements concerning the law are therefore misleading. Mr. Dabney does not tell the voters that there ever was presented to me an APPLICATION THAT DID NOT CONFORM TO THE STATUTE AND SHOW ON ITS FACE probable cause. When the application was sufficient it became my BOUNDEN DUTY TO GRANT THE SAME, AND IT WAS THE CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHT OF EVERY DEFEND-ANT to have the benefits of the law accorded him. Dabney, from what he says, would either violate his oath of office, or he is not fully advised as to what the law is.

The case of Commonwealth vs. Lawton, 247 S. W. 45, is a Kentucky case and did not involve the habeas corpus, but involved a writ of prohibition. The case of Ex Parte Turbell, 256 S. W. 463, is a Missouri case, and involved the release of a man confined in the penitentiary, and against whom two unserved judgments of conviction had been entered. A hearing was accorded but the discharge of the prisoner was denied. The case of Ex Parte Kuehne, 12 S. W. (2nd) 790, was a direct application made to the Court of Criminal Appeals and was denied because no proof was offered in support of the application. Defendant in that case had judgments of conviction against him.

There is not a single decision cited by Mr. Dabney that supports his assertions. There are but few crimes under our law that are not bailable, and even then it is the duty of a district judge when an application in proper form is presented for a writ of habeas corpus to hear the same, and either grant or deny the writ. Any lawyer in Eastland county, except Dabney, will tell you that what I have said is correct, and that the district judge has nothing to do with originating an appli-

I have tried to pronounce the law as I find it and have never undertaken to assume the position of both law maker and judge; nor to over-ride the constitution, the safeguard of the people. I have tried to be fair and just, and dispatch the business of my court with energy, but have never tried to arbitrarily over-ride the wishes of litigants with reference to an adjustment of their own rights.

If you believe me to have been faithful, honest, fair and a just judge, I would appreciate deeply your support and vote.


