

## Visitors to 'Sky Ride' Over Chicago World's Fair




Look at Chicago in 1933. D The Ferris Wheel of the World's Columbian Exposition of 1893 and the Eiffel Tower of the Paris Exposition of 1900 will have their counterpart in the "Sky Ride" of Chicago's Century of Progress Exposition in 1933.

Contracts have just been signed for construction of two steel towers, 600 feet high, 2,000 feet apart and connected by cables on which rocket-shaped glass-and-aluminum cars will shoot over the exposition grounds 200 feet in air. High speed elevators will carry

passengers to observation platforms on top of the towers, which will be the highest structures east of New York. From this eminence, visitors will be able to see three states-Indiana, Michigan and Illinois. Spread beneath them like an animated map will be the city of Chicago and the exposition.

The towers will be triangular in section, gayly painted and ornavators will transform the glass colored light.


