Lone Star Gas Reduction Are Effective By Agreed Order

Agreed judgment entered in four courts at Austin Friday brought an end to nine years litigation and a reduction from 40 to 30 cents per thousand feet of natural gas in the gate rate charged by the Lone Star Gas Company in some 275 Texas cities and towns.

The comany sells gas at wholesale reduction in the whole sale rate to the ultimate consumer as of May 15, 1942, and the railroad commission which originally order ed a rate reduction, accepted it. The company sells gas wholesale to Dallas, Fort Worth, Waco, Sher man, Denison, Denton, Wichita Falls, Sweetwater, Abilene, Temple, Bryan and Georgetown among other cities and towns.

The Lone Star Company has already announced they will pass reduction on to the consumer in the 175 towns which they are furnishing with gas.

H. J. R. No. 1 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fix ing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on Sep tember 1, 1943; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State: prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submis sion of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49. a section to be known as Section 49-a, to read as follows:

"Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Reg ular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Govern or and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.

"From and after January 1, 19-45, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be val id. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the af fected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) per cent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submit ted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words

"For the Amendment to the Con stitution of the State of Texas, requiring all appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Com ptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment there of, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas. requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstand ing September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclama tion for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments there

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thous and Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriat ed, to pay the expenses of such pub lication and election.

METHODS FOR FIGHTING INCENDIARY BOMBS

New instructions in fighting fire, bombs have been announced as a result of extensive research by technicians in the United States and England, it is reported by Mar vin Hall, State Fire Defense Coor-

In a communication to Fire Chief Gilbert Hinds, Mr. Hall [stated: 'All civilians should be come familiar with the new and safer method of fighting incendiary bombs described in the latest instructions released by OCD. These are the result of extensive experiments by OCD technicians and the Chemical Warfare Service! of the U.S. Army. The new meth od has already been adopted in England and New Zealand."

Chief Gilbert Hinds said that the most important change in

technique is that which calls for the use of a jet of water instead of a spray. A speedy attack on the bomb with a jet of water will knock the bomb out in less than one minute, thus saving valuable time which can be used in attacking other bombs nearby before they can start serious fires. Sand is not to be used except where wa ter is not available or where the glare of the bomb can be seen by

enemy flyers, he said. Briefly, the latest instructions

- 1. Bring your fire fighting equip ment to the scene at once.
- 2. Shoot a jet of water directly at the bomb without delay, to put it out of action quickly.
- 3. Then use the jet, quickly, to quench the fragments and the remains of the bombs, and any fires that might have been started.
- 4. Be absolutely sure all fire is out before you leave the scene.
- 5. Use a course spray where scattering of metal must be avoid-

6. Use sand only if a bomb falls where it is not likely to start a fire, or if water is not available. Chief Gilbert Hinds cointed out

that the desirable jet of water can be obtained from a garden hose, any type of water fire extinguish er, a pump-tank extinguisher or a stirrup pump.

1941 Cotton Loans Have Been Extended .

All 1941 cotton loans have been extended for an indefinite period. Maturity date previously was July 31, 1942.

The new plan, under which Com modity Credit Corporation will continue to carry the loans, permits producers to repay their loans and obtain possession of the pledg ed cotton or sell their equity after July 31, 1942, in the same man ner as prior to the maturity date of the notes.

Lending agencies holding Certificates of Interest in 1941 cotton producers' loans will be permitted to carry certificates after July 31. 1942, under terms of agreement with CCC. The certificates will bear interest at 1 percent per an-

Cooperative marketing associations also will be permitted to continue loans held for their members under 1941 CCC cotton Form G. after July 31, and the rate of interest to the associations on advances made to members will be the same as for lending agencies, according to P. C. Colgin, state AAA commodity loan specialist.

The new agreement for leading agencies and amended cotton Form G will be forwarded to lending agencies and cooperative marketing associations by Commodity Credit Corporation, Colgin said.

Restrictions On New Tires And Tubes **Tightened**

Mr. Ralph Ashlock, Chairman of the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board, announced today that new rationing restrictions have tightened the list of eligibles for new tires, tubes andrecapping. "This revision was an obvious necessity," he said, "and it will help to relieve the critical rubber tire situation."

The new amendment to the tire rationing regulations, Mr. Ashlock said, makes it plain that only vehicles engaged in service essential directly to the war effort to the public health and safety are to be eligible. This will cut off from eligibility for tires all privately operated trucks carrying alcoholic beverages, soft drinks and similar beverages, tobacco products, confections, candy, flowers, toys, novelties, jewelry, furs, radios, phonographs, musical instruments or other luxury goods, unless the transportation of such things is only incidental to the main service performed by the vehicle.

Also dropped from the eligibility List A are private carriers providing transportation for incidental maintenance services such as the cleaning of office buildings, or for repairing portable household effects, or providing materials or services solely for landscaping or beautification of any construction project or establishment.

"The new amendment to the regulation gives our board the responsibility of sifting applications with this vardstick: Does that truck or vehicle contribute directly to the war effort, or to the public health and safety," Mr. Ashlock said. "We know that vehicles. working on war projects must be served first. All others will have to wait."

TIME EXTENDED TO FILE INVENTORY OF TIRES AND TUBES WITH BOARD

Mr. Ralph Ashlock, Chairman of the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board, announced today that automobile tire and tube sellers have been granted an extension of time from July 25 to August 1, in which to file with the local board an inventory of all tires and tubes, both new and used. that were on hand as of June 30.

"This is the second extension of time granted for this report," Mr. Ashlock explained, "because of the late arrival of the necessary forms.

These reports must be filed by all persons who sell new or used tires and tubes and retreaded or recapped tires of whatever kind. not mounted on a vehicle. The purpose of the inventory is to provide a fund of information to assist in charting the future course of rationing.

"Similar reports must be made by each tire seller in each calendar quarter hereafter," Mr. Ashlock explained, "but in the future, the reporting forms will have to be obtained from our local board office by the tire dealer. They will not be mailed to the dealer hereafter, as they were for this first

THE \$5.00 AUTO-MOBILE STAMP

Reports reaching the office of Collector of Internal Revenue indicate that most persons subject to the \$5.00 automobile tax due July 1, 1942, have already purchased the required stamp but that in some sections many automobile owners have failed to purchase this stamp. Beginning Aug ust 1, 1942, a concerted drive by Deputy Collectors in every section will be undertaken, and all persons subject to the tax, using their cars without the Stamp affixed, will be vigorously prosecuted. Such tax evaders will be subject to a \$25.00 fine and thirty days imprisonment in addition to payment of the tax. This automobile use tax is a war measure, and all patriotic people should respond without delay.

The most important thing to remember is that the \$5.00 automobile tax Stamp cannot be purchased from Post Offices after July 31, 1942, and purchases will have to be made from the Collector of Internal Revenue; and late purchasers will be required to establish the fact under oath that they have not used their cars prior to the purchase date of the Stamp, in order to avoid penalty.

This is a final notice, and further leniency cannot be extended. This statement is made by direc tion of the Bureau of Internal Revenue in Washington.

MRS. PAUL SHANKS MODERNIZES CELLAR

Enterprise Home Demonstration Club Home Food Supply Demonstrator, Mrs. Paul Shanks, has had an old cellar repaired for her ventilated food storage space.

According to Mrs. Shanks, this cellar was constructed about 25 years ago, with the top made of cross ties and the walls finished with a mixture of gravel and ce ment. Now the top has been taken off, the cellar built up about 2 feet above the ground with rock and a concrete table top made, which the son, James Paul, uses as a watermelon table, since it is under the grape arbor. The steps have been rebuilt, the walls, ceiling and floor concreted, a light connection made (Delco lights are used) and two ventilators added. ne for intake of cool air and the other as outlet with the space in square inches of the ventilators equaling the space in square feet of the cellar. The inlet ventilator coming within six inches of the floor. Ventilated storage shelves are being added that will permit free circulation of air between the containers of canned foods.

Mrs. Shanks reports that thus far this season she has canned: thirty quarts of snap beans, thirty six quarts of peaches, twenty two quarts of betries, twelve pints of pineapple and six quarts of berry juice. This brings her total number of containers, counting the ones left over from last year, to approximately four hundred and

This demonstrator plans her home food supply for the family of three and one hired hand.

Rent Regulations

Landlords renting houses, apartment or rooms, and tenants who have sublet rooms in Baird area will have the opportunity to register their dwelling units at Baird in the office of the Callahan Abstract Company, on August 4th and 5th, between the hours of 9 A. M. and 5 P. M. Registration will be supervised by Mr. Hugh Ross. If not registered at this time, it will be necessary that landlords either make their registrations in Abilene or by mail. All registrations close at midnight August 14; 1942, after which time landlerds are liable for a penalty for failure to register.

Every person who has rented a house, apartment or room during the period between February 1, 1941 and, but not including July 1, 1942, should register the unit or units notwithstanding that these units are not now being rented An owner, living in a house that has been previously rented during that period, should register, irrespective of whether or not he ever intends to rent the house again. To aid in registration, each landlord is requested to bring with him data covering the rents received on April 1, 1941, the date and amount of any change of rent since that time, the date of any changes or major capital improvements made the amount of rent received on the first month after such changes were made, and the name and initials of the present tenant. If the dwelling unit was not rented at any time during the period above stated, an application to establish the Maximum Legal Rent must be made on Form DD-112 and filed with Russell S. Stephens, Area Rent Director.

Business property does not come under this regulation and will not be rigistered. Housing accomodations situated on a farm and occupied by a tenant who is engaged for a substantial part of his time in farming operations thereon are not registered, nor is dwelling space occupied by domestic servants to whom the space is provided as part of their compensation.

The Rent Regulation became effective on July 1, 1942 and in most respects froze the rents as they prevailed on April 1, 1941. It is net intended as a fair rent act, but it is an emergency war measure designed to prevent inflation.
