ENGLAND FACES GREATEST STRIKE IN HISTORY

There is gloom in the industrial circles in England. There is a grave reason for it. More than 200,000 weavers and spinners walked out of the mills and factories as a protest against wage reduction. More than 500,000 members of the allied trades are affected, and the strike promises to be the most costly ever waged in the textile centers of the Isles. For years and years Great Britain has been face to face with tremendous competition in the making and the selling of textile goods. Competitors have sprung up everywhere the world over. Of course, the United States, Germany, and Japan have made tremendous inroads everywhere in the Orient as well as in the Occident. Now the show-down has come between the manufacturers and the operatives.

Foremost statesmen and financiers predict that many of the factories and mills will be closed down, perhaps forever, and that in the finals many thousands will never regain the jobs they have deserted. All this had to happen st as cotton was climbing to the 10-cent mark, and in the textile centers of America the manufacturers were taking on thousands of workers to meet the ever increasing demands of the domestic trade as well as to supply the demand of foreign nations. Regardless of all this, Great Britain blunders through.

This is the history of its marvelous leaders of trade and finance who ever direct, or rather shape, the destiny of the greatest of world empires.

Now it is said that Norman Montagu, the head of the Bank of England and perhaps its most adroit financier, has a plan for the flating of a \$5,000,000 bond issue, these bonds to be taken by the nations of the earth in order that the war debts may be cancelled and the commerce of the world restored to the normal basis which existed prior to the outbreak of the World War. This was the real objectives of his mission to the United States and while here he conferred with the kings of Wall Street and the heads of the Hoover administration. Ambassador Mellon played a part in the coming of Montagu and in the conferences held after his arrival on these shores. Incidentally, the strike of England weavers and spinners should make manufacturing boom in the industrial centers of the American world.
