PLANE STRUCK MOUNTAIN IN HEAVY CLOUDS

Injured Man Found Two Miles From Scene of Accident.

EL PASO, Sept. 9.—The bodies of three men, killed in an American Airways plane crash, were found today near the foot of El Capitan Pass, in the Guadalupe Mountains.

The plane crashed and burned 7 1/2 miles east of El Paso, killing three of its four occupants and injuring the other.

Victims were:

PILOT W. J. ROBBINS, 32, of Fort Worth, cousin of Reg Robbins, noted endurance flier.

CO-PILOT FRANCIS W. BRIGGS, of Dallas.

VICTOR ELLMAN, 18, passenger, of Los Angeles.

The other passenger, G. A. Davidson, 40, of Richland, Calif., escaped with painful injuries. He was found two miles from the wreckage, trying to reach a house.

Davidson described his escape to members of the rescue party. The ship was 45 minutes out of El Paso, he said. The plane was flying through clouds. There was a crash. The plane had flown, head on, into the mountainside.

"I unfastened my belt," Davidson said, "and crawled out. The ship was on fire as I got away."

Davidson was near death in an El Paso hospital today. He was suffering from exposure, burns on the face and hands and broken ribs.

Several men are attempting to reach the plane wreckage on a trail over which they hope to be able to bring out the remains of the dead men in rubber bags.

TESTIMONY IN MURDER TRIAL IS PRESENTED

Efforts to show that Frank Gregory might have been acting in defense of the honor of his girl sweetheart were made by the prosecution in the trial of L. H. Forrester during the taking of testimony in the 88th district court Thursday.

The girl was put on the stand but her testimony was ruled inadmissible by Judge Ben. The jury was removed from the courtroom during her testimony.

The prosecution attempted to show that Forrester had made advances to the girl, one of the students, and that she had told Gregory about his trying to put his arm around her. She also reported the matter to her father and a special meeting of the school board was called to investigate the charge.

The school board refused to discharge Forrester and he was to have continued his duties as principal of the Desdemona school.

E. S. Hoover, principal of the ward schools there, testified that Gregory had threatened to "get" Forrester. He also said that he went into Forrester's office on Thursday afternoon preceding the shooting and warned Forrester that Gregory was waiting for him on the outside of the building. Gregory left, however, and made no trouble that day.

The following Sunday, the testimony indicated a threatening note was found by Forrester on the front porch of his home. The note was shown to several people at the church.

The same night Gregory called at the Forrester home, used threatening language, according to Forrester, whereupon Forrester shot him, thinking his own life was in danger.

Several substantial citizens from the Desdemona community testified that Forrester has a good reputation for being a peaceful, law-abiding citizen.

A night session of court was held.

Forrester took the stand in his own defense this morning.

The jury will probably reach a verdict late this afternoon.

DEATH TOLL MAY REACH NEAR HUNDRED

Bodies Scattered Over Harbor By Force of the Blast.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—The harbor steamship "Observation," carrying approximately 120 workmen, blew up in the East River today, scattering dead and dying over the water.

Thirty-six dead had been identified early this afternoon.

Father Philip Degnon said he had administered last sacraments to 50 victims in Lincoln Hospital. Several died while he was administering them and he estimated 30 others would die.

Wives and mothers hastened to the pier to look for their dead. Several collapsed as they identified bodies. As each was identified a tag was wired to the wrist. Some of the bodies were mutilated almost beyond identification.

The terrible explosion, which literally ripped the steamer into bits, occurred just as the boat was leaving the pier to carry laborers to their jobs on Riker's Island, a city penal colony. It was almost at the same spot where the steamer General Slocum caught fire in 1904, with a loss of 1,021 lives.

It may be some time before the exact number of casualties in today's tragedy is determined.

DEATH OF TWO BOYS CALLED AN ACCIDENT

AUSTIN, Sept. 9.—Adjutant General W. W. Sterling received a report today from Texas rangers on the death of the two sons of Arthur Morton, near San Marcos.

"We are convinced from the investigation that the local officials were entirely right in their decision that the double shooting was accidental," General Sterling said.

There were no eye-witnesses to the shooting. Three shots had been fired from an automatic pistol found near the bodies of the two boys. It was believed the younger boy had loaned it to his older brother and wanted to take it back and give it to his father. The pistol is one that will continue to discharge rapidly as long as there is pressure on the trigger.

Justice of the Peace R. M. Ramsey said it was believed the gun started firing during a scuffle between the two boys.

RESOLUTION ON VOTE PROBE IS UP AGAIN

AUSTIN, Sept. 9.—The battle to investigate the recent primary election was re-opened in the senate today when Representative J. C. Duval of Fort Worth again brought up his resolution calling for an investigation of alleged election irregularities.

His action came as a surprise as he had said he would not push the motion. A similar motion in the senate was killed.

Today's action followed by a few hours Gov. Ross Sterling's plea for contributions from citizens with which to fight the return of "Fergusonism" to power in Texas.

Former Wife of Bern Missing

SAO FRANCISCO, Sept. 9.—Dorothy Millette of New York, reported to be the first wife of Paul Bern, Hollywood screen producer and husband of Jean Harlow, who killed himself in Los Angeles last Monday, was missing today, police announced.

Miss Millette was registered at the Plaza Hotel here until Monday, the day Bern shot himself, police said. She boarded a Riverline boat that night and when it docked the next morning all her clothes and baggage were in her stateroom, but she could not be found. Officers expressed the belief she committed suicide by leaping overboard.

Hunt Started For Dry Crusader Feared Kidnaped

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—A nationwide hunt was under way today for Col. Raymond Robins, colorful campaigning crusader for peace, prohibition and political purity, believed kidnaped and murdered while en route to visit President Hoover.

Secret service and police were co-operating in the hunt. No trace of him had been found.

The vigorous, bitter, 69-year-old campaigner had received hundreds of threats against his life. Mrs. Robins said that the persistence of the threats had led the colonel to prepare for dislocation of his property in case of death.

Prohibition leaders were inclined to believe he was the victim of a revenge plot by persons who had been the object of Robins' law-enforcement crusade.

Thieves Enter Eastland School

The office of W. P. Palm, principal of the Eastland high school, was thoroughly ransacked between Thursday night and Friday morning.

There was nothing of value taken but a great deal of confusion was left in the wake of the search. It is presumed the intruders were hunting for the registration fees, which the principal stated had been taken from the office, as there was never any money left in the office after the officials had gone.

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Texas Cotton Is Placed At Four Million Bales

AUSTIN, Sept. 9.—The state department of agriculture today estimated the Texas cotton crop for this year at 4,052,000 bales as compared with 5,320,000 bales last year.

The report was compiled before torrential rains which fell in Texas since the first of September. The excessive rainfall is expected to reduce the estimated yield substantially.

Large quantities of cotton were beaten off the plants by heavy downpours and the wet weather probably will increase the destructiveness of boll-worm infestation.

Cotton Goes Up On Renewed Buying

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Professional buying on the theory that the government crop report had been minimized, sent the cotton market up 50 cents a bale today and prices held firm at their highs.

Singing Will Be Held Sunday At Church in Ranger

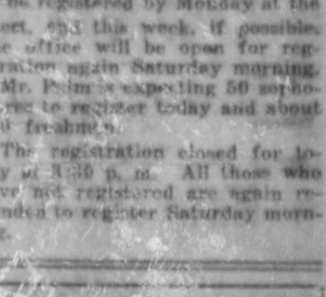

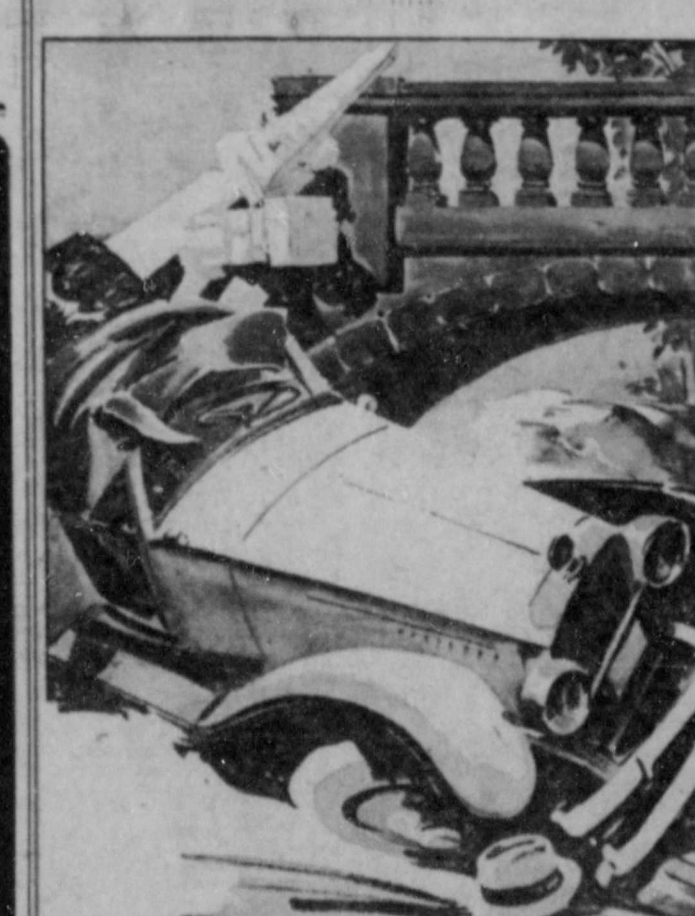

It is at least true that in the world's quest of peace we are still wandering in the wilderness. May God and God's prophets lead us surely and securely to the Promised Land.

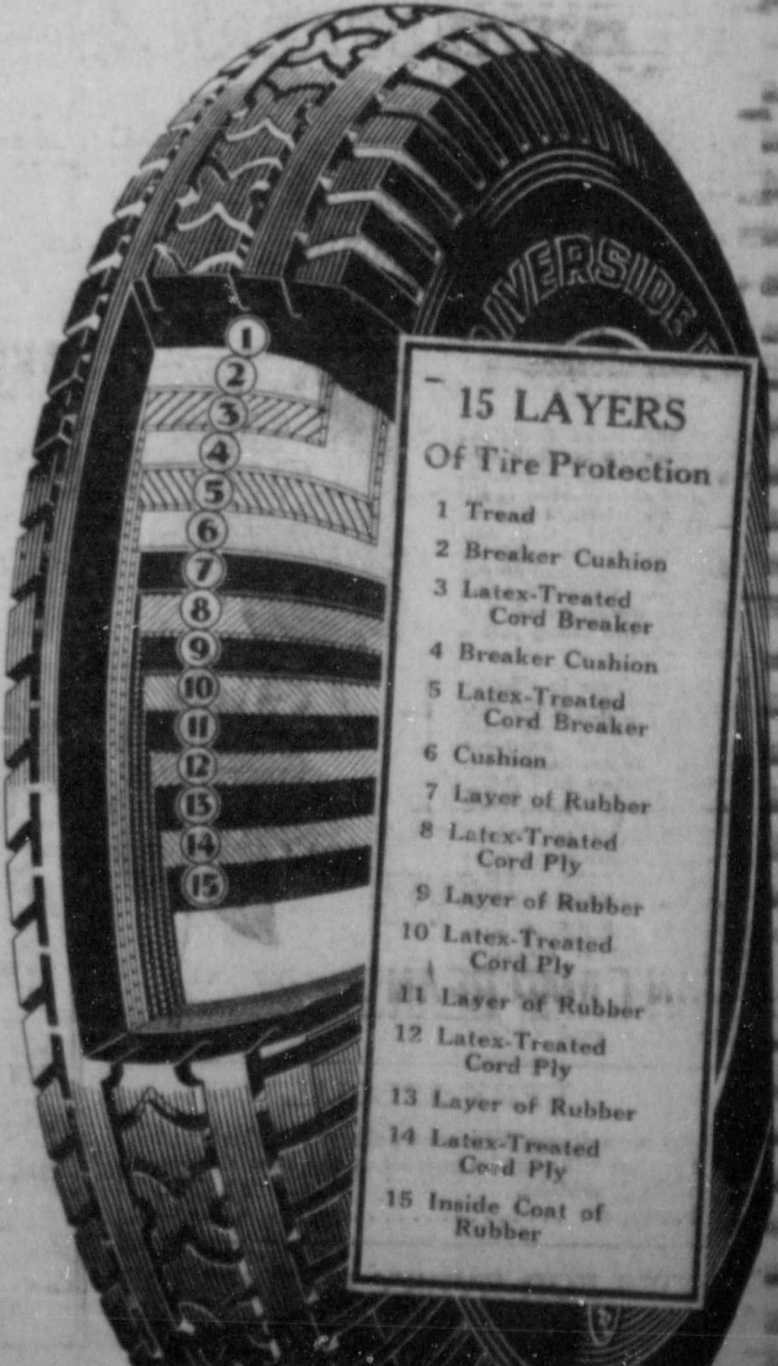

NATIONAL LEADERS STRONG FOR ROOSEVELT

Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt faced the largest audience in the history of any candidate for office at Seagert, N. J. It was a state-wide rally planned by Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City and Gov. Arthur Harry Moore and the minor leaders of the Jersey democracy. It was a huge crowd to say the least. Gov. Moore said that more than 800,000 greeted the national standard-bearer and gave vociferous approval to his opening speech of the campaign. Mayor Hague has ever been the loyal supporter of Alfred E. Smith but he is a regular and always espouses the cause of the standard-bearer of the party and the platform on which they stand. All the Jersey leaders predicted a tremendous majority for Roosevelt and Garner on the part of the Jersey voters in November.

Gov. Joseph B. Ely of Massachusetts, another of the outstanding Smith leaders, in his opening speech pledged the electoral votes of Massachusetts in November to the democratic standard-bearer while other leaders predicted that Connecticut and Rhode Island and New Hampshire would land in the democratic column. As for the happy warrior, he is a magazine editor now and as the director general of the Outlook he is ambitious to make it a power the nation over as the mouthpiece of conservative action and in molding legislation in state and nation. Four years ago William Gibbs McAdoo maintained his silence until the day before election and then declared he was "going to vote a straight democratic ticket." Alfred E. Smith declared in advance that he is a democrat and would give his support to the national standard-bearer and the platform. He did not wait to declare himself until the campaign was over and then on the eve of the most important election make the announcement that he was a regular and would vote the straight ticket on the morrow.

Roy Miller has been named as the state manager of the Roosevelt-Garner forces in Texas. Senator Margie Neal will direct the organization of the Roosevelt-Garner women voters of Texas. She was a newspaper woman before she became a politician. She was a delegate-at-large to the San Francisco convention where the McAdoo flag went down. She is the only woman ever elected to the state senate. She is a native Texan and she knows Texas and Texans. In addition to all this she knows politics and she has ever been a regular. State Chairman Miller is for a precinct organization and precinct clubs the state over. He favors beginning in the precincts and then marching to the top. For years and years he was a very successful newspaper publisher and editor, and he has been on the sidelines in Texas and under the big dome at Washington in recent years and knows politics as only a seasoned campaigner is able to know the political game. Now he is preparing for a real organization of the said democracy.

LAWMAKER HUGHES A MARATHON WINNER

Dallas county returns to the legislature or will in November, Mrs. Sarah Hughes. She has served in two legislatures and is on the job for the special session. She has established a new high record in the balloting in Dallas county for women runners. She led a large field of entrants for the legislative place in July. She faced a run-off. Her runner-up was a he-man. Lawmaker Sarah put him out of the running by a majority of 10,000. And this for a third term. She made a record as a lawmaker under the big dome. She faced her constituents in the recent primary election and sent a straight message that did not go over their head. She not only made a remarkable race but she won a remarkable victory. She will be the only woman elected to the house in November. She has youth. She has a lot of common sense. She is well equipped. She knows the fundamentals of government and the needs of people. She never pulls political bones and knows where to find her hat without blinking an eye. Dallas county voters are very proud of their faming representative. In the recent election in that county it was a fight of the outs against the ins. Now it is in the record that the Dallas county courthouse was cleaned of the old gang but when it came to ousting the legislative representative, Lawmaker Hughes displayed talking and sprinting capacity of a high order and sent the outs to the political cemetery.

LEGIONNAIRES PLEDGED TO DEMAND BONUS

Congressman Wright Patman of Texas continues in the picture. A generous two-thirds of the voting strength of the American Legion's national convention is shown by Washington headquarters records to be pledged for cash payment of the soldiers' bonus. Thirty-five state and territorial organizations have instructed their delegates to vote for cash payment at the Portland, Ore., convention scheduled for Sept. 12. This was a reversal of the instructions given by 21 states and territorial organizations a year ago. A majority will govern and Washington predicts that the national convention will change its stand of a year ago opposing cash payment. Texas is one of the 36 states that have instructed delegates to demand cash payment. It is a matter of history that following in the wake of the war between the states those who wore the blue captured the republican organization of the North, dictated the politics and the legislation of the republican party and this continued for many years. As for the Southland after reconstruction days were over, those who wore the gray dominated the Southern wing of the democratic party. They dominated the politics of the Southland and they filled the major and minor offices for years and years. Will war history repeat itself?

The danger in American politics is that polite fictions are apt to develop into well established facts. Half truths are unrebuked. Perhaps because there are more floating about than there is time to deal with and they are likely to become the basis of splendid structures whose inherent unsoundness of foundation are easily overlooked.

Every community has its builders. They also have the fellows who lay down on the job and those who always call things up. Then again, they have a few who will try to hog everything in sight, and if they can't do it they won't stop.

WASHINGTON.—Trying to figure out at this time of year which presidential candidate is going to win just which electoral votes is a rather silly performance, but what of it?

There is even some perfectly good evidence that it is a relatively silly business almost any old time. One recalls that in the last year or so of the 1928 campaign some of the most expert and experienced Democratic politicians were talking very seriously about not merely suggesting the possibility of carrying for Al Smith such Republican states as Iowa and Pennsylvania.

As a matter of fact, Dr. Hubert Work himself, chairman of the Republican national committee, who publicly conceded the loss of Texas and other southern states which Hoover subsequently won?

The "Surge of Hope"

THE party which is going to lose the election almost invariably experiences a surge of hope in the last two or three weeks before election. Possibly you remember the big "swing to Cox" just before the terrific Republican landslide of 1920.

Even after the votes are counted the realities are not always plain to the defeated faction. As a state politician as he is—of the wall—Al Smith has been reminding us since 1925 that a few hundred thousand votes, "properly distributed," would have changed his defeat into victory.

He did not appear to remember or realize that the same had been said by him or might have been said by most other defeated Democratic standard-bearers of the past and that two of three of them had lost out on the electoral vote even after winning popular vote pluralities.

With these evidences of the fallibility of politicians and the fact that their predictions are never likely to be completely unerringly correct, one is at least justified in asserting that state-by-state, precinct-by-precinct and the study of them

Here's the Way to Do It

THE more essey political observers, consequently, confine themselves to stating certain very obvious facts and reporting the estimates others in or on the sidelines of the political business who are willing to compute. That's one way to keep readers from arguing with you now or giving you the raspberry later on.

Unfortunately, your correspondent cannot at this time report any obvious facts that have only recently become obvious and which may be described as brand new. The old ones, which still persist, are chiefly:

There are more states generally regarded as "doubtful" than in any recent campaign. The Democrats have opened their campaign with more assurance than usual and the Republicans with less, although the Democrats are not as cockily confident as they were several months ago and the Republicans are not as depressed.

Much depends as you have doubtless heard until you wish people would stop bothering to mention it, on the extent, if any, to which business improved. The Democrats are rather certain of carrying the 113 electoral votes of the solid south and Hoover undoubtedly will carry such recognized Republican states as Pennsylvania, Maine, Vermont, Michigan, Wyoming and Delaware.

Majority in Doubt

A MAJORITY of electoral votes, although some may now seem more likely to go one way than the other, can be regarded as doubtful until more evidence is available.

How great the doubt sometimes becomes among the master minds is indicated by the instance when, after Democratic Manager Jim Farley had publicly conceded Hoover's home state of California to the Republican, Candidate Hoover allowed that it was real fighting ground and that he was going out there with the intent of putting it in the bag.
