

As the beans ripen, this covering grows hard and difficult to digest and the cream can be substituted. Two ta-

One-half cup cream seasoned with salt and pepper and added to two cups of cooked lima beans makes the addition of butter quite unnecessary. Heat cream in the forty minutes for half the coking period. Allow thirty to forty minutes for beans to cook and form the habit of shaking the pan in which they are cooking.
