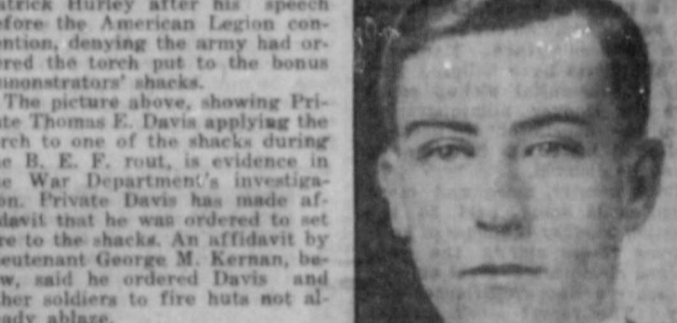
## Bonus Fire Scorches Army

## COUNTY TAX RATE WILL BE REDUCED SOON

AUSTIN, Sept. 19.—With only 54 hours of the session remaining, the house and senate of the Texas legislature were deadlocked early this afternoon on a new ad valorem tax penalty remission bill.

Adjournment of the special session today was set for Wednesday at 6 p. m.

Just before noon the house voted by a majority of 18 not to proceed from its declaration that the penalty remission shall apply to city and town taxes as well as county, district and state taxes.

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WHOLESALE THEFT OF OIL IN EAST TEXAS FIELD

East Texas is in the big picture again. Now Col. J. Lewis Thompson of Kilgore, speaking for a large number of producers, has requested the governor and the lawmakers for a legislative hearing on charges of wholesale theft of oil in the East Texas field. This is the allegation of Colonel Thompson: "This field in the hands of racketeers who would put Al Capone of Chicago to shame."

"Yes, where there is oil there is hell. It is in the record that Gov. Ross S. Sterling saved the day by drastic measures in the not remote past. He made use of his rangers and national guardsmen in his famous cleanup and law enforcement act. He sent oil from a dime to a dollar a barrel. He placed increased compensation in the pockets of the landowners and lease owners. He caused to pour into the pockets of all concerned a million dollars a day or \$345,000,000 a year. He swelled the revenues of the commonwealth.

Then what happened? He was damned by many of the people he saved as a usurper of power. He was branded as a despot and the accusation was made that he placed the military law above the law of civil authority. He was charged with being the tool of the giants of the petroleum trade and all the time he was helping the little fellows, producers as well as land owners and lease holders.

All this may be ancient history but the facts are placed in the records and they cannot be displaced or expunged from the record in the years to come. But why drag Al Capone into the picture? He is doing time behind prison bars for evasion of the federal income tax laws. He wasn't a usurper of power to first save and then stabilize one of the greatest and most important industries of the American world.

ARE WOMEN FUNDAMENTALLY HONEST?

Troy is a town in Illinois. Years and years ago a pioneer founded a bank. He passed on and two daughters inherited his fortune. Not long since there was a run on the bank. It was threatened with closed doors and financial loss to the depositors. Then what happened? Why the two daughters of the founder of the bank went to the rescue. They turned in voluntarily \$80,000 to protect the depositors. There was a liquidation. All the depositors received dollar for dollar. Then the bank closed its doors and was as dead as the founder of the institution. There are millions of honest men and honest women in this land of ours. There are two in the town of Troy, in the State of Illinois, who build a monument to a father and his daughters that will endure for years and years to come. They had no interest in the bank. They were not officers or stockholders but they saved the day when the crash came and they saw to it that the name of their honored sire was protected. Why not a large place in the picture for doers of good as well as doers of evil?

WHAT HAPPENED TO A GOVERNOR'S SON

Otis Seligman of Albuquerque, N. M., was sentenced to five years in a federal penitentiary and was fined \$10,000 when he pleaded guilty to charges of violating national banking laws. He had been the assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Santa Fe. Eight other former employees of the bank were given lesser sentences and fines when they pleaded guilty to similar charges. All in all the bank was short 70,000 in their accounts. Gov. Arthur Seligman of New Mexico is the president of the bank. Otis is his son. Governor Seligman is one of the outstanding democratic leaders of the Rocky Mountain country. Indeed he has been one of the builders of New Mexico. Now the son has tarred the brilliant achievements of a father who has won high place in the confidence as well as the affection of the people of his commonwealth. There is a road called Straight. Many of those who desert the road, in the long run, find themselves behind prison bars, disgraced and dishonored. Flesh is weak and the perfect man appears to be a myth.

AND NOW TEXAS HAS A BANK LOAN LAW FEDERAL AID FOR THE NEEDY IS ASKED

Gov. Ross S. Sterling will ask for a loan of \$3,000,000 unemployment relief fund from the federal relief laws enacted by congress. Dallas needs \$819,000; Tarrant asks for \$625,000; Wichita \$75,000. Blanks were furnished all county judges by State Labor Commissioner Gragg. Preparedness is the thing. Winter is almost here. Those who are hungry through no fault of their own should be fed and housed until there are jobs, part time or all time, for all men and women who are not only able, but willing to toil for a livelihood. Is this to be a dole or borrowed aid and wherein is there a difference. There is one thing certain, an unemployed person who receives aid under the skies of Texas will not be disfranchised by courts or relief distribution agencies.

RELIEF LAW FOR TAXPAYERS

Texas lawmakers enacted the measure for the relief of delinquent taxpayers through remission of their penalties and interest. Its outstanding provision is that penalties and interest is charged off on all delinquent taxes paid by Dec. 31, this year, no matter how long the taxes have been delinquent. Moreover the proposal applied to all state, county and school district taxes, leaving it optional with cities as to whether they will adopt the plan. Many of the advocates of the tax relief law admitted that it was wrong in principle but that something had to be done for the relief of those who are having a hard road to travel in these years of federal republican rule and the prosperity that was promised four years ago by the third Moses of history, the Lone Eagle of Idaho.
