By means of a shortening of hours, the resolution affirmed, production could be adjusted to consumption, available work could be distributed over a large number of persons, and the unemployed could be reabsorbed into employ-

The European leaders have been scussing the proposal in their own countries, seeking to line up public opinion and bring about governmental action.

In Britain, the five-day week has

many advocates in laborite circles, but their approval is conditioned on a demand that the worker shall receive his full amount of wages, which economic conditions have prescribed as payable for a longer day and a larger output.

In view of this condition and the rather strong position of trade unionism in most of the major industries, the five-day week is not likely to be introduced in Britain any time soon unless it becomes widely practiced and proves successful in other countries.

With proportionate wage reductions, British employers feel, they might undertake such a proposal, but only if it succeeds elsewhere.

Not until parliament reassmbles in October, will there be much agitation in behalf of a five-day week here, but laborites are expected to champion the idea at the first opportunity.
