JOSEPHUS DANIELS TRIBUTE TO F. D.

Josephus Daniels has been one of the outstanding leaders and editors of North Carolina for 40 years. He has attended every national convention of the democratic party since the crown of thorns and cross of gold speech of Bryan in 1896. He was an adviser and right hand man of Woodrow Wilson for eight years. He was the secretary of the navy who made history in the dark days of the World War. He contributes to the current number of the Saturday Evening Post a remarkable story of the life and public services of Franklin D. Roosevelt. It is really the best contribution to the democratic cause that has appeared since the nomination of Roosevelt by the Chicago convention. It should be read by all democrats as well as all voters of independent minds. It is worth while for foreigners to finish. It tells the story of the protection of the naval oil reserves by outstanding personages and the looting of the oil reserve after Woodrow Wilson had been retired to private life. It tells of Roosevelt, the man of sterling qualities high American patriotism and his love for justice for all men, his sincere sympathy for those who need a helping hand and his ideals and policies of government from his entrance into public service until the present hour. It is not being cynical; it is only facing the facts to observe that the recent results have been the results of compulsion rather than conciliation.

It will not be the first occasion in which men and people have been bludgeoned into a sense of loving kindness and mutual necessities.

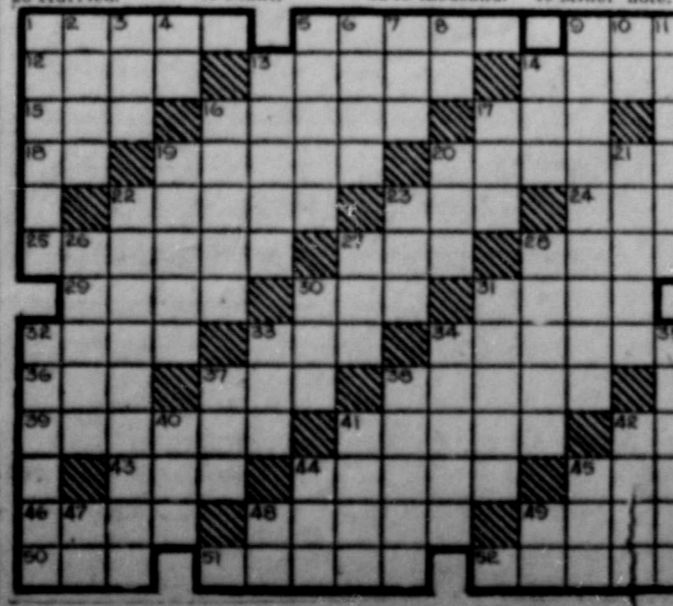
THIS CURIOUS WORLD

the bond at that figure, based on a report from Cisco showing that its football receipts last season were approximately \$5,000.
It is the opinion of the district attorneys that bond should be only a nominal amount to cover court costs in event the appeal is not sustained.
The state interscholastic committee already has filed an appeal. It is possible that the district board will follow the same procedure, not filing the supercedes bond.
The district officers have taken no steps toward inclusion of Cisco in its conference schedule. If bond is filed, the committee will be relieved of including Cisco, at least until there is a decision. Otherwise, the district will "play ball" with the Lobos, according to the court's order.

The rebellion began July 29. Rebel and federal soldiers in the field exceeded 150,000. Commerce of Sao Paulo, richest state in the union, was paralyzed and the world's greatest coffee port was blockaded, causing an enormous increase in coffee prices throughout the world.

Survey Shows Texas Business On the Upgrade

AUSTIN.—While the business horizon is still far from clear, cheerful news bearing on a variety of business items and covering many sections of the country is becoming more and more common. Dr. F. A. Buechel, statistician of the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas, pointed out in his monthly business summary, The bureau is engaged in making monthly surveys of some score or more industries, trades and utilities, and Dr. Buechel's observations are based on the results of these compilations, data for which are obtained directly from the basic source.

"For example, railway carloadings have shown more than seasonal gain for three successive weeks," Dr. Buechel said. "Electric power production is making an increasingly favorable showing compared with last year, and the textile industry has been showing marked improvement."

"In New York State, factories have run counter to the August seasonal down trend with a gain of 3.7 per cent in payroll and 2.9 per cent in employment. Further substantial decline has occurred in the seasonally adjusted daily average of money in circulation. The trend of bank failures continues downward, and the downward trend of total deposits of closed banks is even more pronounced.

"Under normal conditions, quoting from Standard Statistics corporation, the improvement thus far witnessed could confidently be expected to broaden out and build up. This, however, is a presidential year when not only personalities but fundamental policies hang in balance. The tariff has been injected into the situation. A powerful bloc of ex-soldier citizens in demanding a bonus of \$2,300,000,000 from the federal treasury which is already running at a deficit of more than \$200,000,000 monthly."

"A number of other disquieting problems still await solution on a fundamental basis; among them are those relating to transportation, finance, labor and agriculture. So far only palliatives have been applied for tiding over immediate emergencies and providing breathing spells for inaugurating more permanent policies."

"A widening circle of public opinion in each of the industrial countries of the world is coming to realize that what appears at first sight to be local or at most national problems, are in reality international problems and must be attacked from that angle. The full significance of the disruption during the war of the delicate mechanism of international trade and finance which has gradually evolved during many decades, is just now becoming apparent. It is also becoming more clear that although international trade constitutes only 10 per cent of our total business, its significance to industry is far greater than this percentage would imply. If there are profits at all in industry it is the final sales that determine the amount of that profit. Moreover, staple commodity prices are determined on the world market.

"In August, 1931, following the financial crisis in Europe and

Hoover's announcement of a one year moratorium on European political debts to this country, a committee of financiers and economists headed by Albert H. Wiggin made the following statement, "In recent years the world has been endeavoring to pursue two contradictory policies in permitting the development of an international financial system which involves the annual payment of large sums by debtor to creditor countries while at the same time putting obstacles in the way of free movement of goods. So long as these obstacles remain such movements of capital must necessarily throw the world's financial balance out of equilibrium. Financial remedies alone will be powerless to restore the world's economic prosperity until there is a

radical change in this policy of abstraction and international commerce—on which depends the progress of civilization—is allowed to resume its natural development. We therefore conclude by urging most earnestly upon all governments concerned that they lose no time in taking the necessary measures."

"The diagnosis made by the Wiggins committee was confirmed by the special advisory committee convened by the Bank of International Settlements December, 1931. A most emphatic warning of danger, unless immediate steps were taken, was also given in this report.

"Last June at Lausanne a great forward step was taken in that a new reparations settlement was arrived at, bringing in sight at last the end of that tragic problem which has worked untold mischief during the post-war years. In the final act of this conference it was decided unanimously that much more comprehensive action was imperatively needed.

Out of this decision has grown the forthcoming world economic financial and monetary conference in London. This conference will undertake to solve two sets of problems. First, monetary and credit policy, foreign exchange difficulties, the level of prices and movement of capital. Second, improved conditions of production

Sing Sing Grid Games Cut Down Rule Violations

ALBANY, N. Y.—While Sing Sing prison's "steam-roller" football team toiled in preparation for its second season, Corrections Commissioner Walter N. Thayer explained today he approves the sport because it has created a higher morale among the inmates.

Football was introduced provisionally in the prison in Ossining last year. The experiment, which aroused nation-wide interest, proved highly popular so Warden Lewis E. Lawes decided to extend it.

"As an example," Thayer cited,

"This is why group activities in the prison recreational program are helpful in preparing the prisoners for their return to life outside. The attitude of the criminal toward society is essentially the attitude of a poor sport. He hasn't played the rules of the game."

Somerville's Victory Good for U. S. Golf.
Victory by Ross (Sandy) Somerville, dour Canadian in the United States amateur golf championship generally has been hailed as a good thing for golf in America.

Even before the final match had been started many golf writers expressed the opinion that interest in the game generally would be enhanced by a break in the monopoly held by U. S. players on their own national championship.

And this was not because any of them liked Johnny Goodman less but the game more.

Actually Somerville's ultimate victory was that of a dark horse. Before the tournament started (as is the case, of course, before all tournaments) the writers made their own lists of possible winners. A chosen few were named first.

Then, as a means of protection against a possible oversight, a list of "others who might come through" was made. Somerville's name was generally found fairly well near the bottom of such lists.

Bobby Jones was one of those who early predicted that Somerville would reach the finals, and named Sandy as a likely winner.

Now that the long line of U. S. triumphs in the American amateur has been broken, it will be reasonable to expect heavier entry lists of dominion players.
