This is the Russek viewpoint: "Repeal of the Dean statute would be in accord with the ultimate action we the repeal democratic congress sure to submit repeal of the 18th amendment and modify the Volstead act as the party platform demands." Texas has constitutional prohibition. Many states have repealed their state enforcement acts. It is said by those who claim to know that the new house of the Texas legislature will contain a majority of repealers and that a majority of the senate will declare for repeal. The farmer sits around and wonders where his customers have gone.

They blame economics and overproduction for lack of sales. If they advertised and packed and marketed like everybody else, they would not get left in the rush.

So long as the primary producers don't get together and advertise so long will they grain tell a hard luck tale. And so long will the world slump, p because, though we all like luxuries, we can only buy them May so long as enough of us earn the right to do it by selling the fruits of the sweat of our brow. AND THOSE WHO Dec SWEAT MUST LEARN TO SELL!"

Our regular proclamations for Thanksgiving days have since been issued by successive presidents,

issued by successive presidents, since 1863.

Some of us are giving a thought to Mr. Hoover, our retiring president, who fought for pacifism, and to our incoming president, Mr. Roosevelt, who pledged for industrialism.

Interest is aroused over the proclamation of the president for this Thanksgiving year, and wonder as to just what its content will be.

Each and every one who has a sound mind and a good body has ample reason to celebrate Thanks-giving day whether their table groans under the weight of the browned turkey, and generous foods, or whether the table holds simply a rose in a vase of water, a slice of bread, and a glass of milk.
