#### GOV. ROLPH READY TO PARDON DRY VIOLATORS

Gov. James Rolph, Jr., of California will issue pardons to a thousand persons held in California prisons and jails on charges of violating the state prohibition law. California had a drastic pro enforcement law known as the Wright act. It was repealed by a vote of 2 to 1 Nov. 8. Now the taxpayers of the gold commonwealths will not be compelled to pay out their good money for food and shelter for those who have been convicted of violation of the act. It is said that in the grape growing sections of Californla the voters abandoned their dry stand of years and plumped wet or repeal ballots for a change or repeal of all laws. Michigan had one of the most drastic laws of all the American states. Michigan voters cast ballots for its repeal, and the repealers won by a large majority. Now Governor-elect Comstock, a democrat, will walk in the footsteps of the California governor and liberate all the violators of the act repealed now heldi n the jails or prisons of Michigan. Governor Paul McNutt of Indiana, another democrat, has announced that after he has taken the oath of office he will turn the violators loose to hustle for their own food and sheltering place. Another version of Finnegan's famous wire to Flennegan: "Off agin; on agin; gone agin."

#### FEDERAL JOWER COMMISSION CURBS STOCK ISSUES

In advance of the coming of President-Eelect Robsevelt and a democratic congress the federal power commission has adopted a resolution providing that no licensee which is a public service corporation SHALL ISSUE ANY SECUR-ITIES WHOSE MATURITY DATE IS MORE THAN ONE YEAR WITHOUT FIRST RECEIVING APPROVAL OF THE COMMISSION. Furthermore, the resolution introduced by Commissioner McNinch provided that the company submit to the commission satisfactory evidence in support of such securities issued. Notice of the proposed issue must be given the commision at least 30 days beforehand. Are the people the masters at the ballot box? For 11 years the federal power commission has been in existence. Nov. 8 the nation thundered its verdict. In the wake of that verdict the federal power commission resolved itself into a regulator of holding companies and securities they issue. Public opinion behind a nation-wide mandate makes office holders as well as lawmakers come out of a trance and do quick thinking.

#### GOV. BILL MURRAY SHOWS HIS HAND

Governor William H. Murray is insistent that no more oil wells be dug within the Oklahoma City limits. According to an Oklahoma news story the governor was unaware of the city council action in blocking the move to extend the drilling zone to the very heart of the downtown district. Then it was the famous Alfalfa statesman declared he would renew a military order if new wells increased the peril for business homes and inhabitants. This native son of Texas and adopted son of Oklahoma is one of the best political showmen in the nation, as well as one of the best cory makers for the correspondents and magazine writers.

#### NEW JERSEY GRAND JURY HAS WHIPPING POST

Little Delaware has the whipping post punishment for incorrigible law violators. Now a grand jury in New Jersey has recommended that the New Jersey legislature adopt a law permitting the establishment of whipping posts as the method of punishment. All this for the sake of economy and to create a respect for "organized society and family relations." New Jersey is one of the original 13 colonies. Delaware is another. Why not firing squads for incorrigible law breakers? It is more humane and finishes the job.



### Sorghum Syrup Is Aiding Farmers

LINCOLN, Neb.—The depression has brought about the revival of one of the cornbelt's most flourishing pioneer industries that of making sorghum on the farm.

Faced with the problem of reducing the grocery bills as much as possible in view of low farm produce and grain prices, the farmers have turned to their fields of tall sorghumess.

farmers have turned to their fields of tall sorghum cane as one method of making "ends meet."

Sorghum mills that were stored in the hayloft many years ago when the manufactured syrups came on the market, have been taken apart, cleaned and put to work.

J. F. Grimm urged farmers who lived about him to plant fields of sorghum cane which he promised convert into syrup on shares. Grimm now is operating his old sorghum mill, converting tons of cane into sorghum for his neigh-bors, keeping his share and sell-

ing it.

And farmers wives are helping find a way to use up the surplus sorghum by canning many fruits with it rather than buying sugar.
