### DEBT REVISION RESTING WITH CONGRESSMEN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Great Britain today rested before the jury of American public opinion its new appeal for war debt revision and postponement of its \$95,000,000 Dec. 15 payment.

### THE BULLDOGS have been fortunate, after the Weatherford game, as far as injuries are concerned. Only one season player and Anderson were hurt in an automobile accident, then Gray broke his leg, but since then no player has been out of the game more than a few minutes with injuries.

### HOWEVER, the elimination of Gray this year, though it was a serious handicap to the backfield, has not made as serious a change in the backfield as was expected. True it took much of the speed, but the Bulldogs have managed to stay on top. With Gray there is no telling where they would have gone.

### EVERY PLAYER in every play is Coach Schmidt's idea of how a team should function. If one of the players falls down on his assignment the whole play is ruined. Every play is a potential touchdown and would result in one if every man was perfect on his assignment. Perfect plays, however, are rare.

### SOME OF the stores and shops in Ranger are to be closed during the game, but the Retail Merchants association voted against closing all the stores for a couple of hours during the game. Some said that they were going to be closed anyway.

### AND THAT reminds us that the Breckenridge American notified us last Saturday that they were going to close up shop for the afternoon and the entire forenoon was coming down to the game, pulling for the Bulldogs. And some said Breckenridge was sore.

### NOW THAT game time is drawing near many more fans are of the opinion that the Bulldogs "if they play as they did in the Abilene game" have a good chance of defeating the Sandstorm from Amarillo. In the first game of the season the Bulldogs had new material in the game, but so did Amarillo.

### DARK tomorrow will tell the tale and the winner of the bi-district game will have another, and probably tougher, game on the schedule when they meet the winner of the Austin-Sweetwater game, which Sweetwater is hoped to win.

### INTERSCHOLASTIC football has raised the standard of the teams in the past ten years to the point where the winner of the state championship is a team that could probably compete favorably with many of the junior college and minor conference teams in the state. The winner tomorrow may go far in the state race.

### EVERYTHING points to a good crowd, at least as large as the Breckenridge game on Thanksgiving Day, when 4,986 paid to see the encounter and the seating capacity of the stadium was taxed more than in any game in the past two years, larger, even, than the Cisco game in 1931.

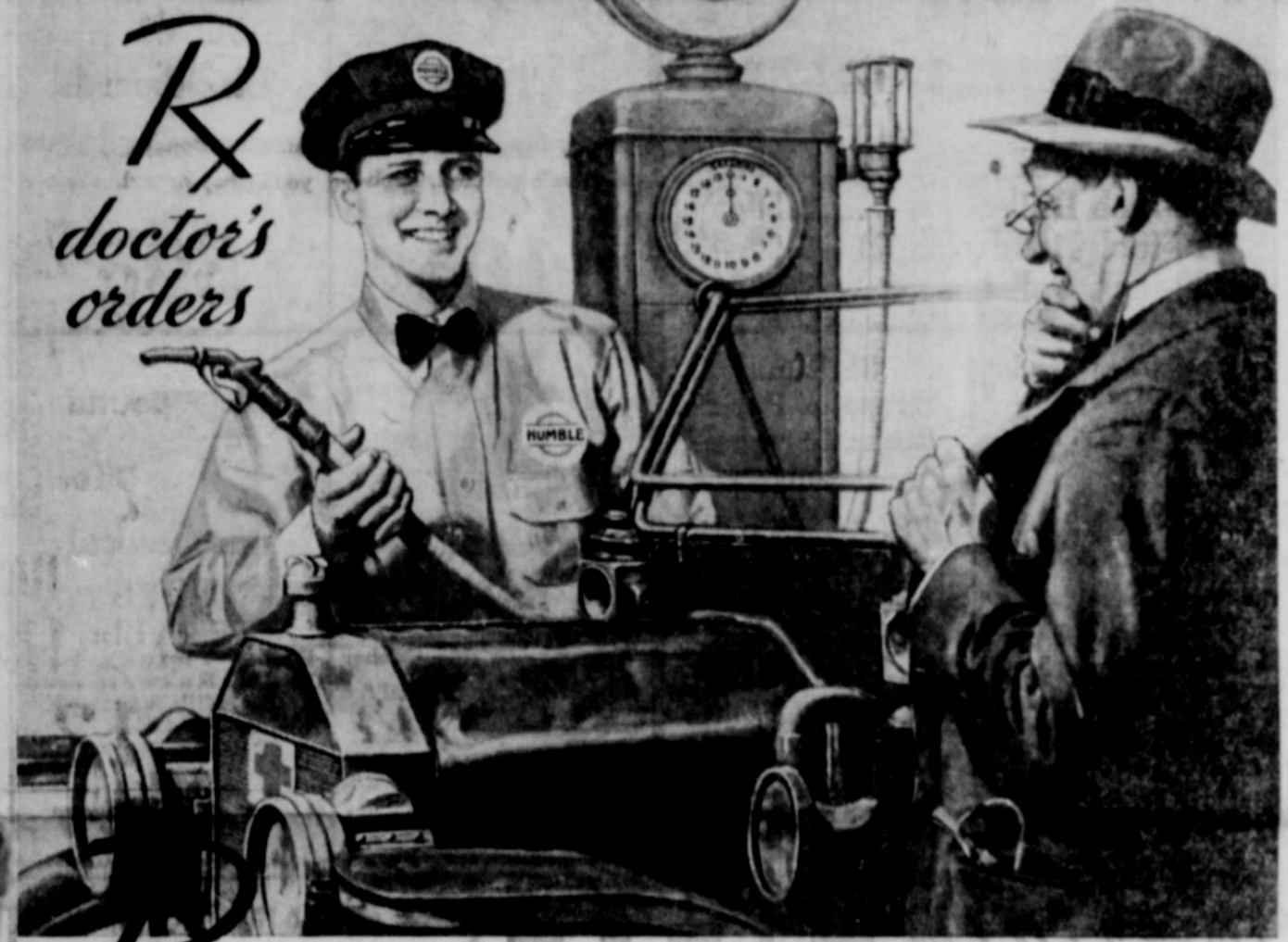

### Mongolia Gets Express Trains

PEIPING, China.—Inner Mongolia, which has been inaccessible to travelers and tourists because of poor transportation in the past, has been brought within 24 hours of Peiping as the result of enterprise on the part of railway officials.

Through express service has been inaugurated between Peiping and Paotouchen, via Kalgan and Kweihsia, over the lines of the Peiping-Suiyuan Railway, in cooperation with what remains to China of the Peiping-Mukden Railway.

Paotouchen, 504 miles northwest of Peiping, is in the heart of Inner Mongolia and north of the famous Ordos Desert. It is typically Mongol in character and there may be soon the descendants of Chinghis Khan living under what are still primitive conditions.

Inauguration of express train service to Inner Mongolia also indicates that officials here, appointed by Marshal Chang Hsueh-liang, do not anticipate any threat to his control from the northwest, by the event of fear that General Fenz Yu-hsiang, popularly known as the "Christian General" and who now is living at Kalgan, might be planning a coup against Peiping.

The authorities here will not release their rolling stock for service into the far reaches of Inner Mongolia.

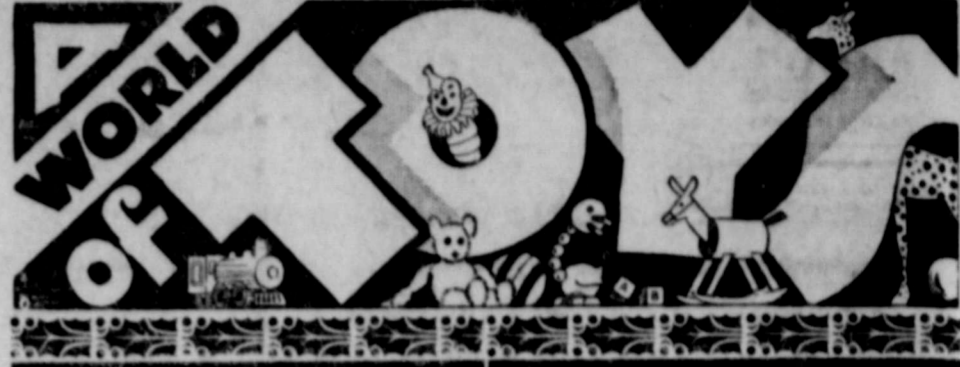
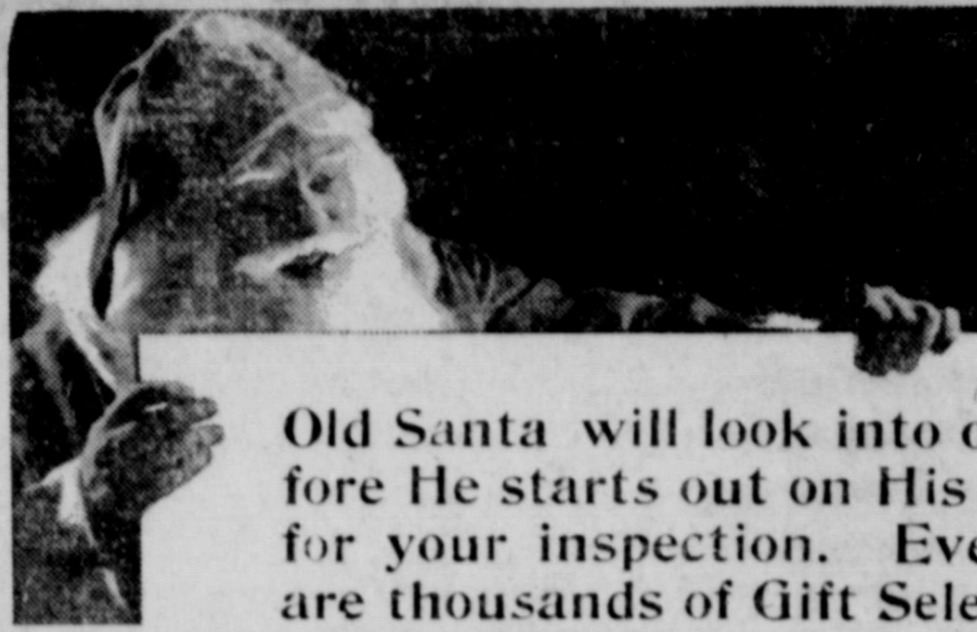

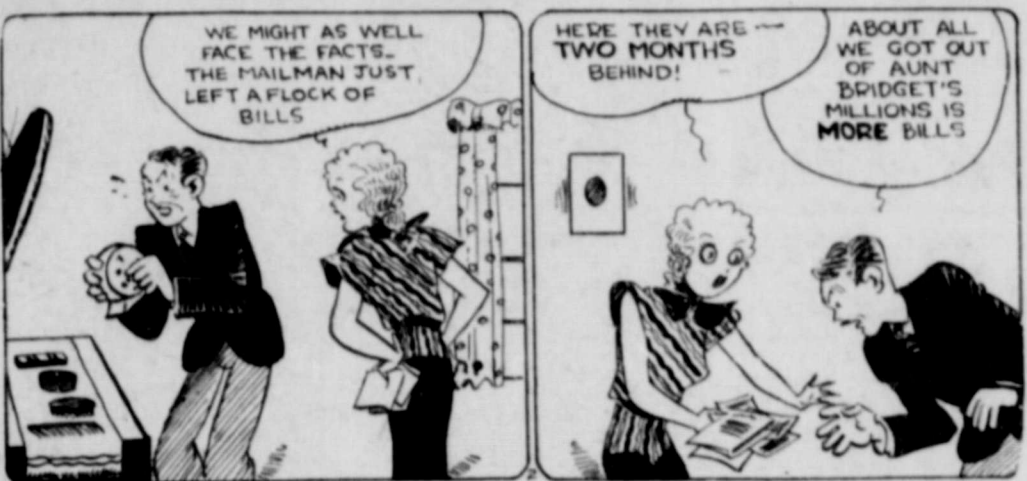
