

RAILROADS DEMAND TAX RELIEF



Delhi was founded by Shah Jehan, builder of the beautiful Raj Mahal at Agra and of the imperial palace at Del-hi, this latter a reminder of that glorious time when the city was the capital of the great Mogul em pire, boasting a population of 2 000,000. In the audience chambe of the once-famous palace, stood the splendid Mogul throne, sur-mounted by a fully-spread pea-cock's tail studded with precious tones and estimated at \$30,000, 000. These dead wonders of the past add a great deal to the mod est splendor of the present. Delhi is more cosmopolitan than most of the Indian cities, looking forever toward commercial and educational progress. Is it any wonder that men should take a stand for a land with India's possibilities, he traditions, her memories, he hopes . . . ?

It's just part of the game, to wonder, to advance, to believe and not to know.


