#### TEXANS PAY BIG SHARE OF FEDERAL REVENUE

Texas with 4.73 per cent of the total population of the republic, according to a Washington correspondent, paid 1.18 per cent of the internal revenue taxes collected by the United States during the fiscal year ending June 30. They contributed \$18,302,288 of which \$17,449,444 was income taxes and the balance miscellaneous taxes. Now why shouldn't Texas get something in return for their money? Why shouldn't the harbors and rivers be recognized very generously when appropriations are made? Why shouldn't the federal aid highway fund in a large slice, if additional appropriations are to be made, be taken over by the builders of Texas and matched dollar for dollar? Texans are doing their part in the support are doing their part in the support of the federal government. They pay huge gasoline taxes to the state and the nation, and the system of highways in Texas should be made the most complete to be found the nation over. Of course, the federal budget must be balanced; the state budget must be balanced; the county and municipal budgets must be balanced; but forms of government should not be crippled in the taxation method employed or in the assessment of property values by those designated to do the work.

#### HENDERSON OF YALE AN EXPERT

Yandell Henderson is a professor of applied physiology at Yale. He appeared before the congressional committee on modification of the Volstead act. 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


