CLAUDE, Texas, Dec. 16.—The Armstrong county jail was empty today. Its only two inmates escaped during the night.

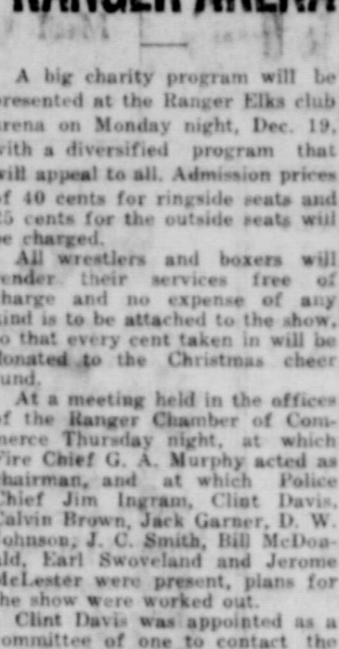

Machines Weighing Tons Break Atom

BERKELEY, Cal.—He's little, but plenty tough, is this fellow, Lithium Atom.

As tough, in fact, that Dr. M. Stanley Livingston, of the University of California, had to design machinery weighing tons to smash him.

Shooting atomic bullets from Dr. Livingston's machine with an energy of more than 700,000 electron volts, three University of California scientists, Dr. Livingston, Dr. E. O. Lawrence and Milton G. White, recently succeeded in breaking the atom into two alpha particles or ionized atoms of helium gas.

This confirmed work done by British physicists, who used low energy protons as the bombarding projectiles and found that protons shot at lithium atoms combined with them and released energy.

Not satisfied with handing the atom such a jolt, Dr. Livingston announced he had a larger machine containing one of the world's largest magnets, which is now producing hydrogen molecules with an energy of 3,600,000 volt-electrons.

TEXAS UNIVERSITY HAS PERMANENT FUND

AUSTIN.—The University of Texas has a permanent fund of \$29,291,007, the latest report of its bursar shows. This includes \$14,000,000 as the estimated worth of 2,000,000 acres of land it owns. The remainder is made up of \$15,767,408 oil and gas royalties; \$1,810,445 bonuses received for oil and gas leases and minor sums. The fund is growing at the rate of \$34,747 a month. That is what it received last month in oil royalties. By state constitution the \$29,000,000 fund may not be spent. It is invested in bonds and only the interest may be used.

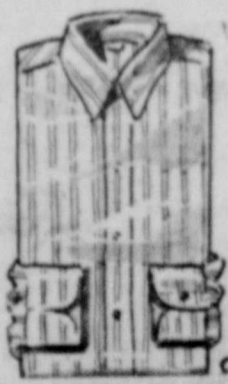

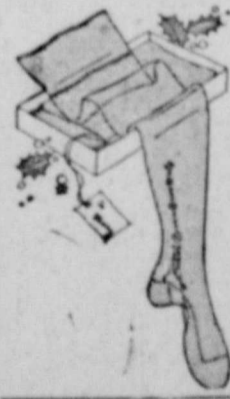

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Dec. 18.

The lesson of the quarter, dealing with the general theme "Christian Standards of Life," have brought the Gospel into the realm of life's daily, practical, and most important relationships.

Very appropriately the lessons have begun with emphasis upon the Christian's devotional life—that is, the spirit and attitude in which he meets all relationships to God and to his fellow men.

If a man has in his life no spiritual devotion, no sense of holiness, he will not have either high standards or any urge of conscience in living up to them.

Men may differ in their definitions and in their practices of devotion and worship, but the man in whose life there is no element of sacredness must inevitably be upon a low plane.

In putting religion into life what can be more important than the Christian's duty in relation to his own family? As child or parent, it is primary and which in some form confronts us all. Even an orphan, bereaved of all relatives, and growing up among strangers or in an institution, would depend upon influences properly molding character and life's relationships for a life worth while.

Life in the family means in a society like ours, life in the home. The mass of people are no longer nomads, living in tents or temporary habitations, but family life implies what in some sense may be called a home.

The fact that homes are too often associated with squalid conditions, with tenements or even with apartments of higher grade, only emphasizes the modern problem of home and family life. If under these modern conditions the home and family cannot be maintained with higher integrity and according to Christian ideals, both individuals and society are bound to suffer.

It is a sad fact that for masses of people today the homes in which they live are makeshifts and habitations of expediency rather than ideal dwelling places. The world with enormously increased resources ought to have the Christian vision and the Christian conscience to arrange these things more equitably and with sounder ideals of home and family life.

Our lessons have brought us into the larger relationships of promoting peace among nations that up to now have lived too much in the spirit of rivalry and war.

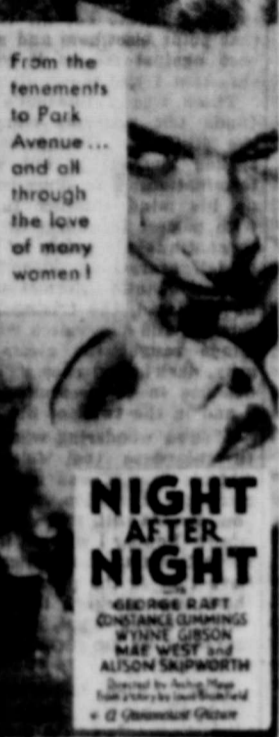
