Nazareth voters approve bonds

Voter turnout throughout most of Castro County was sparse, with the exception of Nazareth.

In Dimmitt, voters went to the polls in a specially called city election to fill an expired term in District 3. Bill Potts defeated Henry Rivera, 27-7.

For the contested seat on Dyer polled 66. the Dimmitt ISD board, incumbent David Schaeffer prevailed over Jay W. Lindley, 31-25, in the Place 2 election.

Emilio Nino was unopposed in Place 1.



Due to the problems encountered with a few of these children, we are instituting a program of restrictions for children under 13 effectively immediately. We will not admit any unaccompanied child without written parental permission and contact phone number for any film rated PG-13.

Any child who is admitted and causes problems for our other patrons will be ejected from the theater immediately. and their parents contacted.

The film that opens next week is rated R.

Absolutely no children under 17 will be admitted without their parents or adult guardian. We will require proof of guardianship.



The press is the Lummus Premier Dor-Les, with a capacity of 60 bales per hour. The press uses an 18-inch lower ram with a 10-inch upper double-acting cylinder along with 2500 gallons of hydraulic oil to run the pumps. The electricians are now installing the conduit in the floor before we pour the concrete.





The first game of the best-of-three series was played Friday afternoon at Randall High School. The young Bobcats let the error bug on the field and came away with a 17-1 loss. 
Prom plans under way

The Swifts retired the first two batters in the third, then Acker gave up a single to Mario Munoz. Munoz was the third out when he was






