HINES AND HIS DRASTIC PLAN OF ECONOMY

Gen. Frank T. Hines, administrator of federal veterans affairs, outlined to a joint committee of the house and senate his plan for the saving of nearly \$100,000,000 a year in veterans' benefits. All the plans and all the programs of the hour will be scraps of paper after the final adjournment of the lame duck congress. Then the live ducks will come in and the hacking and slashing and dodging as well as buck passing will be as lively and as grotesque and as time killing as ever. A representative always keeps his ear close to the ground. He listens to the crumblings from home. A senator who has six years ahead of him watches his fences as well as the "rising or falling "pulse" of his constituents.

A NATIONWIDE COAL COMBINE PLANNED

Rep. David J. Lewis of Maryland is a democrat. In this early years he was a coal miner. He is widely known in labor circles. He appeared before the annual convention of the American mining conference in the city of Washsington and advocated stabilization of the coal industry by limiting production. He spoke of a pending bill which he shad introduced in congress to achieve that end. He declared the measure was intended "to secure prices just to operators and consumers and fair living and working conditions for the miners." Under the Lewis proposal the supply would be limited to the demand and a fair share "of the market would be apportioned to each producing region and mine. If the output of the coal mines of Amer ica are subject to federal regulation, why not the acreage splanted to cotton and wheat and corn and other staples There are federal anti-trust laws. There are state antienttrust statutes. How would it be possible for the enactments of regulatory laws of production to get around the sweeping decisions of the supreme court of the United "States? This is a constitutional democracy. It is not a oneman government or a government of those who think and beyond the pale of the constitution.

SPEAKING OF THE 'INS' AND THE 'OUTS'

Uncle Andy, known internationally as the ambassador afrom the United States to the Court of St. James, spent Christmas at home. Before returning to London he may go to Washington for a conference with President Hoover on the war debt situation. While standing pat for a new review of the debt field, his disposition as seen at Washingaton is to leave the major negotiations for the incoming Roosevelt administration. Why not? Winston Churchill holds President Hoover responsible for the debt payment supheaval on the other side. Indeed, the noted Britisher says that the president gave a pledge to European diplomats and financiers that a revision would take place before payments were demanded. Herriot of France prefers "payment to dishonor," but many of his colleagues hold to the viewpoint that the Hoover moratorium to Germany placed the financial and debt paying nations of Europe upside down-first on their feet and next on their heads Now it is to be passed on to Franklin D. 




