There is something new under the sun, after all! A football team with nine of its players playing an entire quarter in their stocking feet on a frozen slippery field certainly will qualify as the freak of the 1932 football season!

It happened in the University of Washington-West Seattle Athletic Club charity game in Seattle, which Washington won, 66 to 0.

Coach Jimmie Phelan of the Huskies tried out stadium field the afternoon before the game. His players could not stand up—cleats

would not "take hold" on the frozen turf. He saw they would be useless.

Phelan ordered 40 pairs of rubber-soled gymnasium shoes at a downtown store the morning of the game. Athletic officials at Washington—protecting a lean budget—would not okay the purchase. Phelan paid for the shoes from his own pocket.

At game time Saturday his men were shod in rubber-soled shoes. They skipped over the frozen turf, while the West Seattle Athletic Club boys couldn't get a footing.

The game started and Phelan's first stringers ran 19 points without apparently trying. The second stringers—also shod with rubber-soled shoes, went in for Washington in the second period. Halfback Ahonon raced 65 yards, then again 80 yards. West Seattle was desperate, as it vainly tried to catch the rivals.

Right Tackle Pautzke of the club team took off his shoes after the fifth touchdown. He raced down the field after his team kicked off, and made the tackle. Eight other players followed, and six of the 11 club players played in their stocking feet. That was courage plus—running on a hard, jagged, frozen turf in stocking feet!

End Pete Antocien of Washington kicked off over the goal line with tennis shoes. Jay Hornbeck converted two goals after touchdowns when similarly shod.

During the half time intermission, the club team hustled together some gymnasium shoes. There were no more scores.

Phelan said the rules provided players could put on any type of shoes. After the game Phelan presented the shoes to the boys with his compliments. Then he flew down to the Conference meeting at Los Angeles. Later he continued to the coaches association meeting. It probably will be his last game as head coach of Washington—if he lands a good contract in the middle west or east. Chicago and Fordham are mentioned as possibilities for him.
