SALES TAX IS PLACED BEFORE TEXAS HOUSE

By United Press.

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—The 3 per cent sales tax bill was formally introduced in the Texas bouse of representatives today.

The measure, calculated to yield \$45,000,000 a year levies the sales tax as an occupation tax, based upon gross receipts. One-fourth of all occupation taxes go to pub-lic schools. Occupations are divided into

groups of associated activities. Some of the groups are mining, manufacturing, retail selling printing and publishing, advertising including radio, and distrib-uting natural gas.

The tax is specifically made to take the place of the present ad valorem tax for general state purposes. The bill provides there shall be no ad valorem tax for statewide purposes other than the ad valorem taxes provided in the state constitution for schools and Confederate pensions:


