Youngsters Elect Candidates for Honorary Sheriff, Mayor, Judge

Miss Charlene Vaughn, Stanley Nelson and Don Moke will assume the offices of County Judge Bob Estes, Mayor Joe Cowan, and Sheriff Jack Cartwright, respectively, for Saturday, July 19th.

These "one-day" officials were elected by the Teenagers at the Teen Can-Teen Saturday evening, July 12th. The three officials were members of the "Pioneer" party. Their opponents, members of the "City-Slicker" party, were in the order above mentioned, Jack Sharp, Carl Moore and Jerry Morris. The margin of voting was very close with not more than five votes difference.

Immediately following the announcement of the winners, each newly elected officer was introduced. Judge Estes, Mayor Cowan, Sheriff Cartwright and City Marshal W. W. Jones personally commended the youth on their new program of the youth-behavior of the entire county.

Plans Made to Pipe Water Mile From Town to Cemetery

Dimmitt Cemetery Association has asked for bids for constructing a 3 or 4-inch plastic water-line from the southwest city limits to the cemetery about a mile out of town.

The decision to try watering the cemetery with city water came after studying cost proposals from drillers on installation of a pressure system. Cost of a water well would be about the same as the plastic line, but it is often difficult to obtain a well on the first try in that area which would make the well excessively expensive if another hole had to be drilled. Also the cost of operation of a well over a period of years is expected to be considerably higher than the cost of a similar amount of city water. The Association

feels that the best interests of the cemetery would be served by a plastic pipe.

Bids on the 5,500-foot plastic pipe should be mailed to the Dimmitt Cemetery Association, Box 35, Dimmitt, Texas. Bids should be in by July 23rd, and construction should begin as soon as possible. The Association hopes to have the line completed by latter August.

The water facility fund of the Association has risen greatly during the past few months. It has been contributed to by friends and relatives in memory of persons buried at the cemetery. Previously water had been obtained from a windmill at the cemetery, but it has dried up and is useless.

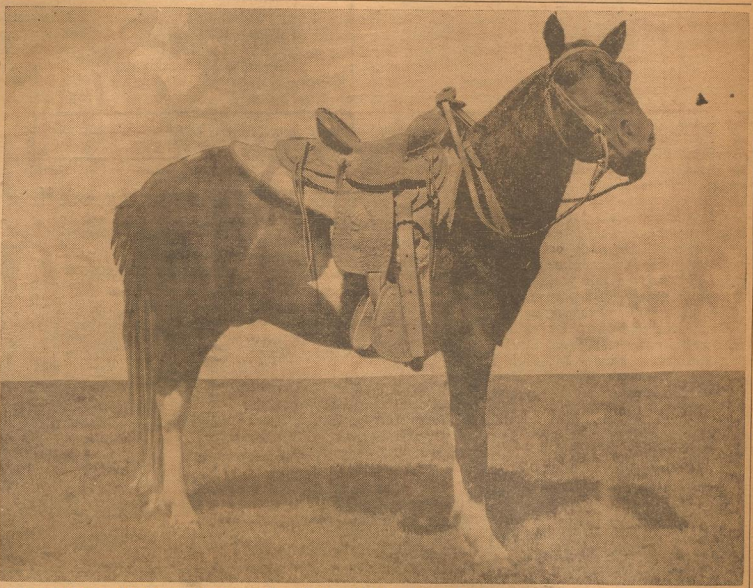
H. B. Thomas Elected New Legion Boss

H. B. Thomas has been elected Commander of Greer H. Estes Post No. 445 and will take over the office next month.

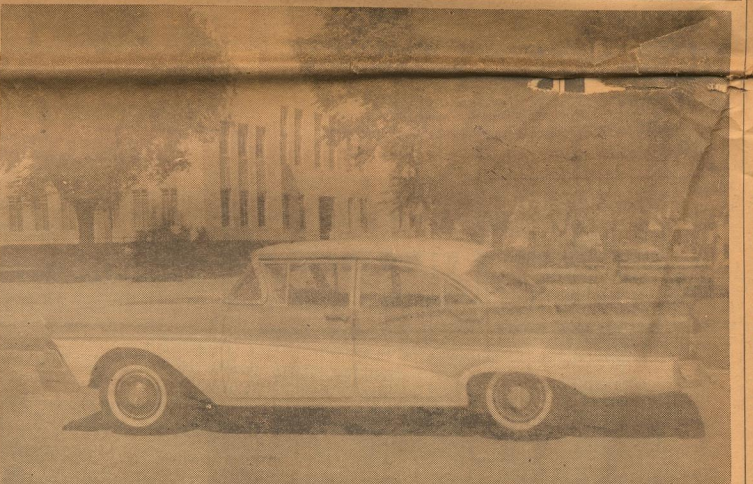
Retiring commander is Jim Cleavinger.

Suicide Takes Life Thursday At Highway Park

The body of a 36-year-old man was found lying beside a 1955 Mercury automobile at the roadside park one mile south of Dimmitt about 3:15 Thursday afternoon.

Local Sheriff J. Armstrong, who was taking his own life because of despondency over personal problems. A new .22 caliber revolver was found near the body.

Armstrong's body was found by James Burnham and Floyd Copeland. They apparently arrived only moments after the incident occurred since Armstrong had been seen alive about 3 o'clock.

He was born in Memphis, Texas on November 17, 1921 and at the time of his death was employed as dispatcher for Ferguson-Steele Transport Company of El Paso.

He is survived by his wife, Mary, of El Paso; a daughter, Genevieve, 15, and son Richard, 12, both of Amarillo; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Armstrong of Hart; five sisters, Marie Marlar, Lorenzo; Irene Lilley, and Nell Brooks of Dimmitt; Mozelle Lilley, of Sunnyside; and Jo Hankins of Hart; 2 brothers, Deward of Hart and Charles of the U. S. Navy.

A Dennis Funeral Home ambulance brought the body to Dimmitt. No funeral arrangements were known late Thursday afternoon.

Castro County Commissioners Court Monday approved officially August 26th as the date for holding a bond election proposing the construction of a new County hospital.

The election will propose a new brick, tile and concrete hospital to replace the present structure which was bought as war surplus in the middle 40's.

Campaign activities have been carried on for several years but this is the first positive action that has resulted in the work towards a new hospital.

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Knife-Throwing's Easy If You Know How It's Done

W. W. Jones is pretty good when it comes to throwing knives.

In fact, he is probably the knife-throwing champion around here.

Jones, who is presently city marshal, once made his living throwing knives with the Tom Mix circus. He can outline people with the things, chop a swinging string in half, cut cigarettes out of people's mouths, and do other things without ever once missing his target or hitting anybody.

He has been throwing knives as a hobby ever since he quit making his living that way in 1937. He spent three years with the circus, from 1935 to 1937 and then for 12 years years was a professional boxer on the West Coast. This is the first time he has held a job as a City Marshal.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones have presented a few knife-throwing acts since he quit the circus, mostly before rodeos. Now their daughter Lovette, who has grown into a young lady, insists on being outlined and holding the folded paper to be chopped in half when daddy practices. She is quite calm about the whole thing and has considerable faith in papa's knife-throwing ability.

The knives themselves are a rare sight. They are actually just long slender, unsharpened triangles cut by Jones from one-eighth inch sheet steel. They bear about as much resemblance to darts as knives. "Any knife thrower can throw a hunting knife or dagger

the same way," Jones says, "but since they're always cutting the thrower's hand we all use this type."

The knives are left fairly blunt. The tremendous force behind the knife is enough to drive it through a 2-inch board. The knives weigh

about a pound each and Jones throws hard. If the knives were sharpened in any way they would bury you in the board and be hard

to remove. As it is they go in about an inch and it takes a good sizes yank to remove them from the board.

Jones learned the art of exhibition knife throwing from a Mexican when he lived in California during the early 30's.

While the most awe-inspiring act to watch is when Jones outlines someone standing in front of a board, probably the trick calling for the greatest skill is chopping into the string holding a ball that is swinging back and forth. Since the 12-inch knife is not sharpened only a direct hit will cut the string.

Another good trick is chopping in half a rolled-up piece of paper held about six inches from the board. The paper is neatly clipped into and the knife is stuck into the backboard on a successful throw.

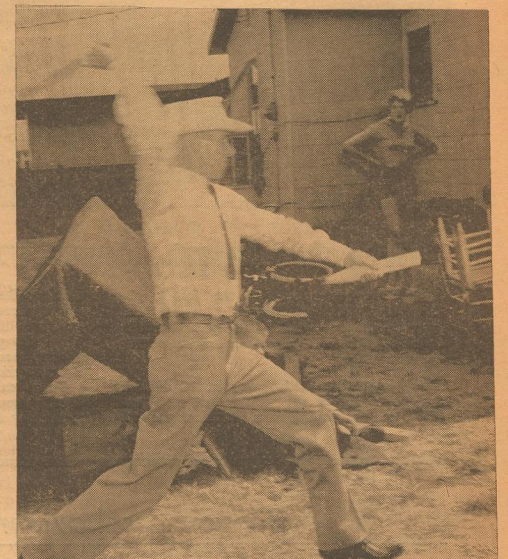
Jones will probably give a few performances in this area soon. He will start Tuesday with a demonstration at the Lions Club in Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church.

Although he has thrown thousands of knives awfully close to his assistants, he hasn't hit one yet. That takes considerable skill.

Soil Conservation District News

The importance of legumes, grown in proper rotation for the maintenance of soil fertility and the increase in yield of succeeding crops is too well known to necessitate lengthy explanation. When properly inoculated, the legumes are able, through the action of the legume bacteria in the modules on their roots, to use in their growth free nitrogen from the air.

Due to this, these crops are not only able to secure indirectly from the air most of the nitrogen to the soil. Therefore, even when the legume forage is harvested for feeding, the nitrogen content of the soil will be increased, or at least there will be much less depletion of soil nitrogen than a non-legume is grown. The yield of succeeding non-legume crop is consequently much higher as a rule than when no legume crop is grown in the rotation.

This is just a reminder that it will soon be time to seed vetch, winter peas, or Madrid clover. The legume seeding equipment is still available through your soil conservation district supervisors. The present district supervisors are Elvis Burch, Fred Axe, M. L. McFarland, Gardner Sanderson,

and Wade Mills. It is commendable to see the increase in the numbers of farmers that are growing soybeans this year. This is a legume crop we hope will work profitable in a conservation crop rotation. A few of the farmers growing this legume this year are Lawrence Wagner, Francis Wilhelm, Billy Ayers, Howard Scogging, M. L. McFarland, and Wade Mills.

Andy Rogers may be defeated some day. He may not run for re-election. At least he has not announced. But win, lose or draw, Andy Rogers has something to remember that is fine and wonderful. His most memorable moment must be the Appreciation Dinner and program given Monday night at Tulia.

I have never seen anything like it in my life. I do not think anyone who attended has ever seen anything like it.

-Mr. and Mrs. N. D. Rogers, along with Georgia Ann and, of course, Andy must have felt wonderful Monday night. And still do.

The idea for the Appreciation Dinner did not originate in Childress. In fact, as far as I know, Childress residents did not have anything to do with it.

And when Andy heard about the proposal, he said that it could not be done.

Andy was wrong. And I imagine right now he is happy that he was wrong. I would be.

A dozen leaders in the district were programmed to speak. They, typically, represented a cross-section of Plains life.

One was the Senator's pastor. He lauded the honoree for his fight against liquor, narcotics, and lewd literature. "Senator Rogers is always on the right side of every moral issue," said the churchman. "He wants and works for a high moral atmosphere to prevail."

A county teachers' association president called attention to Senator Rogers' work in behalf of public education. A Memphis druggist related that Rogers has always had an "open ear" for the small businessman.

A district judge praised the quality of legislation introduced and supported by the Senator. A mayor and insurance man emphasized the value of Andy Rogers' fight against corruption in Austin, particularly in connection with the insurance investigations.

Said an official of one of the veterans' organizations: "Andy told us for a long time there was serious trouble in the veteran's land program. He was right. And when this was cleaned up, Andy worked hard to see that this good program was not scrapped."

A newspaper editor and publisher, a former president of the Panhandle Press Association, observed: "This is the first time I've ever heard of people traveling so far just for a state senator. But it's fitting," he added, "for Andy Rogers for a job well done."

Spokesmen for the major farm organizations expressed approval of the Senator's record on farm-to-market roads, local ownership of underground water, rural electrification, and other legislation of concern to agriculture. Said the farm spokesman who rounded out the program:

"In view of all Andy Rogers has done for agriculture, I'm amazed to hear from the other speakers here this evening that he's had time for such effective work for so many others, too." The farmer concluded:

"Andy Rogers must use a six-row political tractor!"

The Senator acknowledged the praise-filled evening with obvious humility. He spoke humbly, too, of his "close personal friend" - Lewis B. Taylor of Austin and Waco - who had been stricken with a fatal heart attack there a few minutes earlier.

To the series of "thank you's" which had been expressed during the evening, Rogers responded:

"What's been accomplished, you've done. The credit belongs to you, to my parents, and to my wife who have all supported me so strongly. I really feel like I owe you all an appreciation dinner."

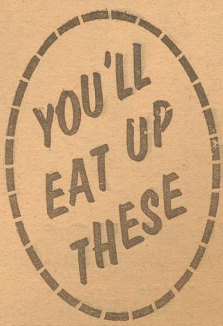

How is it with you? Do you love swine more than you love Christ? Many are trying like the Prodigal, to satisfy their souls with that which the swine eat, rather than the Word of God. What is it with you—soul or sausage? Christ or Mamon?

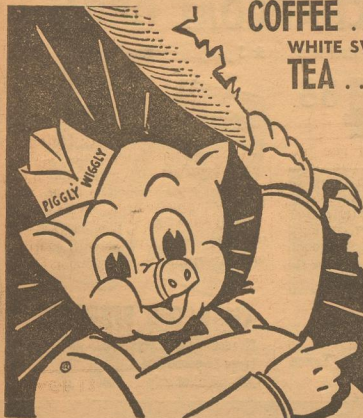

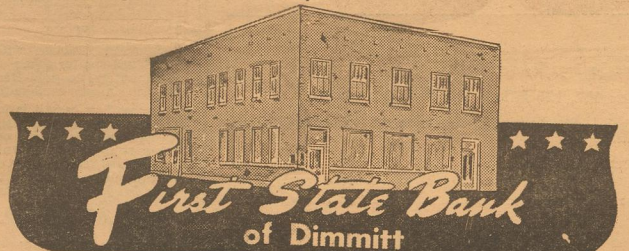
