eluded: "Andy Rogers must use a six-row political tractor!" The Senator acknowledged the praise-filled evening with ob-vious humility. He spoke humbly, too. of his "close personal friend" —Lewis B. Taylor of Austin and Waco—who had been stricken with a fatal heart attack there a few minutes earlier. To the series of "thank you's" which had been expressed during the evening, Rogers responded: "What's been accomplished, you've done. The credit belongs to you, to my parents, and to my wife who have all supported me so strongly. I really feel like I owe you all an appreciation dinner."


