Vegetable Processing Plant Razed By Fire

One of the most costly fires in the history of Dimmitt occurred early Saturday night when the Ed Lewis Vegetable Processing Plant in east Dimmitt was totally destroyed by fire of unknown origin. The flames, discovered about 9:30, quickly enveloped the large building destroying the building and all equipment. A Burlington refrigerated freight car was also burned. Although no definite estimate on the loss has been announced, it is believed that between \$75,000 and \$90,000 worth of property was destroyed by the fire.

The vegetable processing plant was equipped with modern machinery to handle the various types of vegetables produced in this area. The machinery was installed during the spring months by Mr. Ed Lewis, vegetable shipper. Other than the processing equipment, office fixtures and a sizeable quantity of supplies were also a total loss.

The large building, constructed by the Ft. Worth & Denver Railway Co., was especially built for a vegetable packing plant last year, and was enlarged during the past spring in order to handle the increased vegetable acreage in this area. The building, constructed of heavy materials, was 60x100 feet, with a 60x40 ft. loading dock on the north end and a 20x40 ft. loading dock on the south end. Attached to the north dock was a large cull chute and hopper.

Arrangements have been made with a Hereford processing plant for the handling of the balance of the lettuce crop being harvested by local growers. Mr. Lewis has established offices in the Rawlings Hotel building.

Although no official announcement has been made it is believed that the vegetable processing plant will be rebuilt and re-equipped as soon as possible. Officials of the Ft. Worth & Denver Railway Co., are expected in Dimmitt this week, when it is believed they will announce their plans concerning the rebuilding of the plant.

Cotton Seed Being Purchased By CCC

The Castro County P. M. A. office is now set up to start buying cotton seed from farmers in Castro County. The purchase price of this cotton seed is \$46.50 per ton. There is a representative of the Castro County P. M. A. office at the gin and all the farmer needs to do is just tell the gin bookkeeper that he wants the CCC to have his cotton seed. After the CCC has bought his cotton seed the farmer will need to contact the P. M. A. office and pick up his check for the seed.

This is a special program and the latest date that this purchase will be made.

There is also a government loan on cotton seed if the farmer will store it on his farm. The loan price for cotton seed stored on the farm is \$49.50.

The Castro County P. M. A. office does not want to see the farmers of Castro County get less than \$46.50 per ton for his cotton seed so all the farmer needs to do is tell the P. M. A. representative at the gin and he will receive this amount.

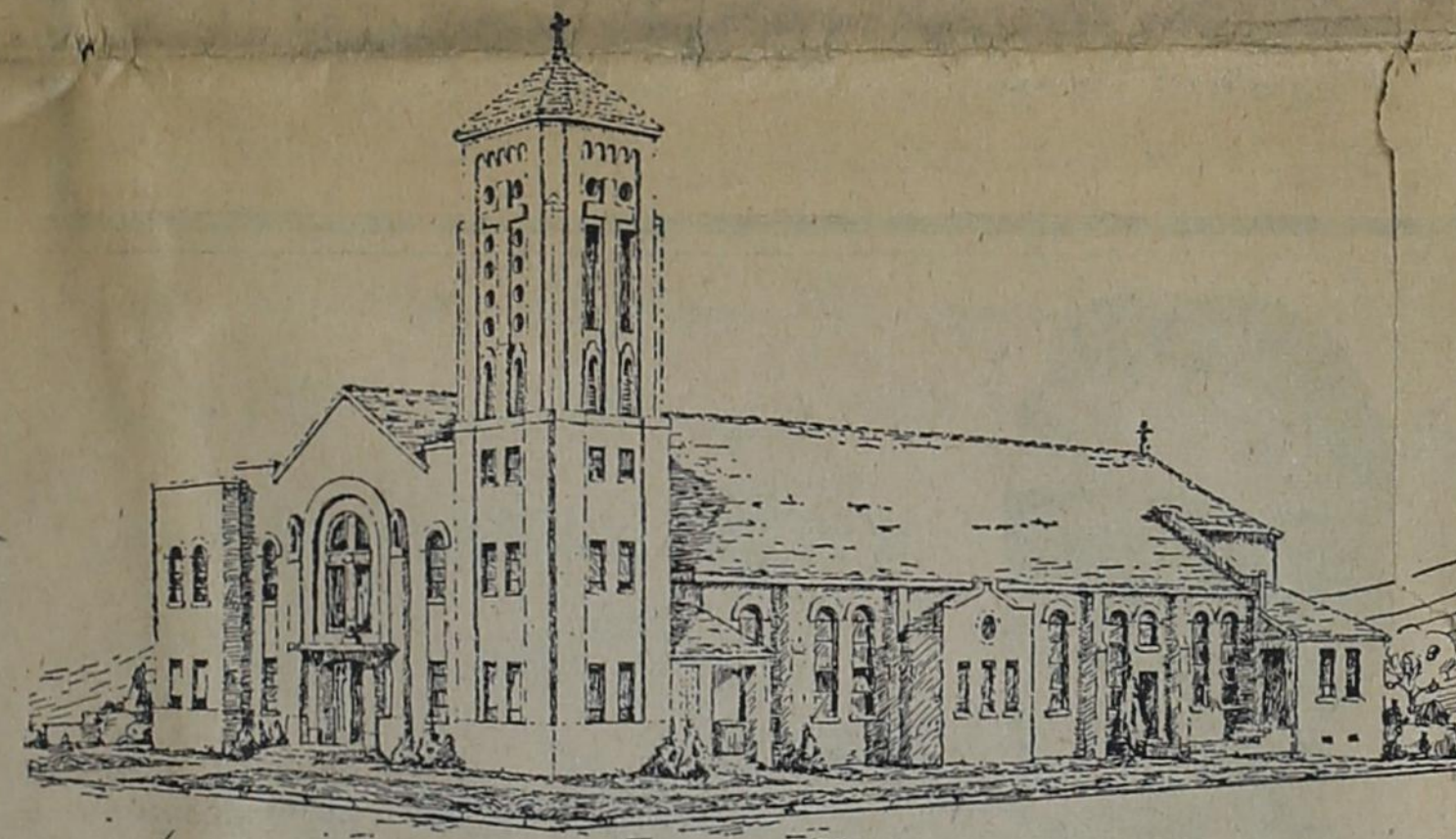

Catholic Church at Nazareth Will be Dedicated Sunday, November 9th

The new Holy Family Church of Nazareth, Texas, will be dedicated on November 9, at 10:00 o'clock a. m. by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Laurence J. Fitz-Simon, D. D. Bishop of Amarillo. The celebrant of the Mass, will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr F. J. Pokluda, Vicar General of the Diocese and pastor of St. Ambrose Church, Wall, Texas. He will be assisted by the Rev. Cyril Lange, O.S.B. as deacon, and the Rev. Frederic Hyland as subdeacon, both were ordained from this parish. Master of ceremonies will be the Rev. Edmund Hartigan of Rotan, Texas. Deacons of honor to His Excellency will be another former member of this parish, the Rev. Harold Heimann O. S. B. and a former pastor. The sermon will be preached, by the Rev. Alcuin Feldhues, O.F.M. of San Angelo, Texas.

The new church for the present at least is the largest in the Diocese. It is 150 ft by 63 ft. It will easily seat 640 and has a capacity for 720.

The members of the parish did the excavating, starting on March 1, and actual work on the construction of the building started on March 15. The cornerstone was laid on May 8, by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Laurence J. Fitz-Simon, D. D. in the presence of twenty one members of the clergy and a large crowd of parishioners.

The bell was blessed by the Rt. Rev. Msgr John Stenlage on Oct. 2 assisted by the Rev. Thomas Drury, and the Very Rev. G. A. Brockman.

The parishioners did all of the hauling of material and also performed much of the other labor. The plans were drawn by Mr. Leo M. J. Dielmann of San Antonio. The contractor is Mr. Claude Killingsworth of Wellington, Texas. The superintendent is Mr. Dex Vessel of Lubbock, Texas. Subcontractors were the Texas Roofing Co. of Lubbock, the tile floor was installed by Paul Graham Co. of Lubbock, the heating system and plumbing by the Howard Sheet Metal Works of Lubbock, the glass by the Pittsburg Plate Glass Co. of Amarillo, the electrical work by the Cooper Electric Co. of Tulia, the painting by Marvin A. Fann of Lubbock, the plastering by the Harper Brothers of Clovis, New Mexico, the brick work by Bob Oldham of Canyon, Texas, the pews by Joe Sievers and Son of San Antonio, Texas.

The Church Committee which was also the Building Committee consists of Arthur Klemm, Andrew Acker, John Litsch, Lawrence Huseman and Louis Schacher.

Specified Donations were given by the following; Communion Rail and gate for the baptistry by the Christian Mothers' Society; the Children of Mary gave the confessional; the baptistry font by the Juvenile Foresters; Lectern by the Catholic Daughters; Cornerstone by the Father Joseph Reisdorff 4th Degree Assembly; the bell by the Knights of Columbus and Catholic Foresters; holywater fonts by the St. Joseph's Society and American Legion; the ambray by Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Miller; the Infant

of Prague Shrine by Mrs. A. M. Heimann; sacrity bell by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Klemm.

Holy Family Parish was started on August 21, 1902 with the arrival of Father Joseph Reisdorff, he remained in Nazareth for three years and eight months. His successor was Father Bonaventura Binzegger, a Benedictine Father, who remained in Nazareth until July 1939 when it was over by the Diocesan clergy. Father, Bonaventura remained in Nazareth for two years and nine months. He was succeeded by Father Anselm Kaelin, who remained seven years and seven months. During Father Anselm's time, Father Peter Post also was in Nazareth for six months. Father Mathew Saettle built the church in 1917, which was in use up to the present time. He remained for only one year. Father Conrad Herda came in February 1918 and stayed till August 1923, and was succeeded by Father Andrew Quante who remained till May 1925. Father Justin Wewer served as pastor from 1925 till July 1929, followed by Father Fintan Kraemer who remained only ten months. After Thomas Buegler followed him staying for two years and eleven months. Father Alphonse Bock was the last of the Benedictine Fathers, leaving in July 1939. Father Norbert Wagener succeeded him who remained till January 20, 1942. The present pastor is the Very Rev. G. A. Brockman, who has been in Nazareth longer than any of his predecessors, a total of seven years and nine months.

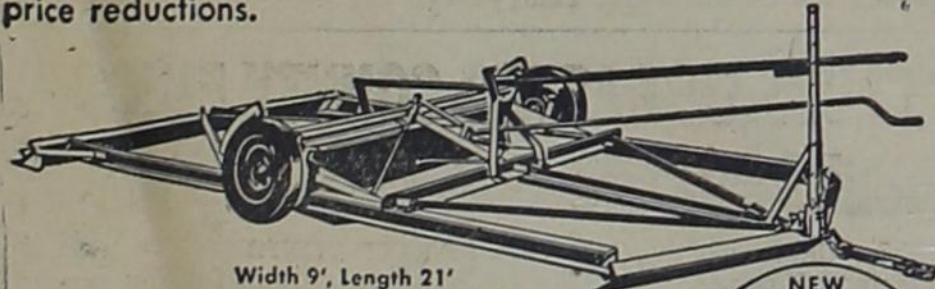

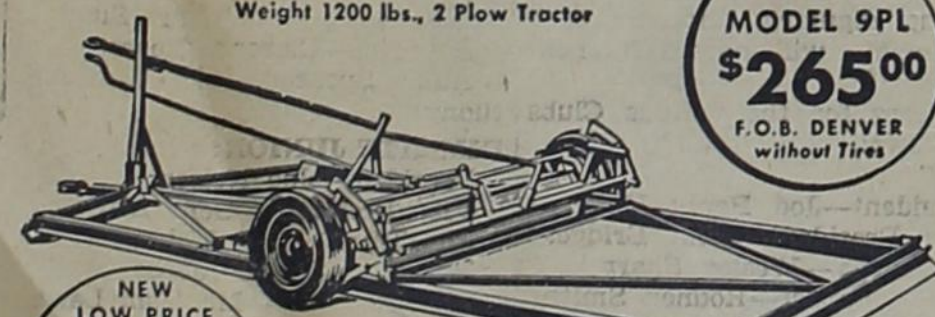

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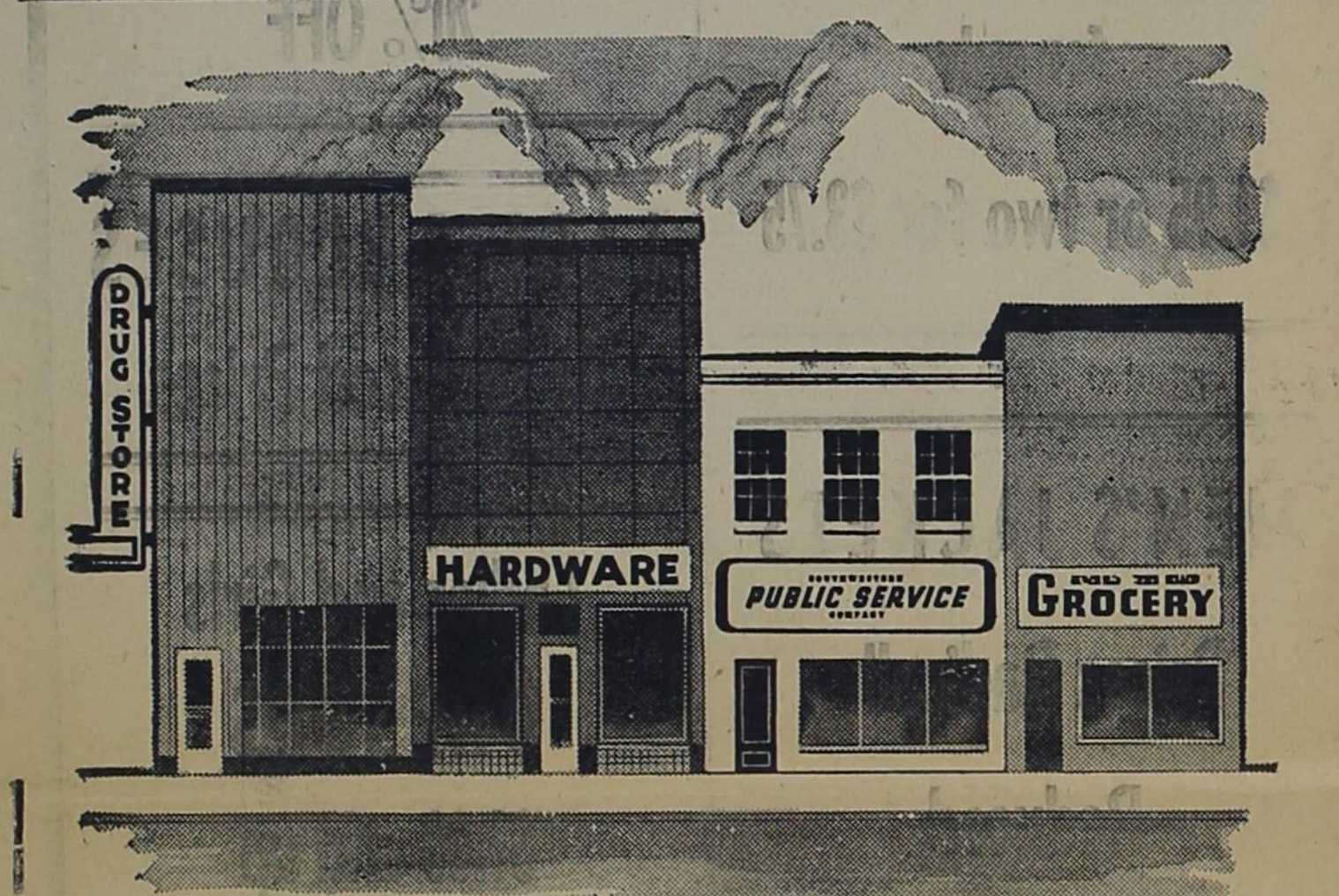

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AUSTIN, Texas—"Please pass the pork" is a familiar sentence around many dinner tables these days, as cold weather approaches. A juicy roast pork or pork chops are dishes that can't be beat, according to many connoisseurs of meat. However, pork can be dangerous if it isn't cooked long enough. So, be sure that pork passes the test of thorough cooking before you put it on the table. Otherwise, trichinosis may result, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Trichinosis is a big word, but the disease is easy to prevent. All you need to do is cook the meat until the pink color turns to white. When the change of color occurs, the meat is safe to eat. Farmers who raise hogs for sale as meat, and who feed them garbage, should cook the garbage first, or the meat may become contaminated. If butchered pork is stored at a temperature of five degrees above zero, Fahrenheit, for 20 days, trichinosis parasites should die, if there are any.

If a person eats a pork chop, for example, that contains trichinae, they are swallowed in the form of tiny capsules. In the intestines these capsules develop and discharge minute worms which are carried by the bloodstream to various parts of the body...settling in muscles, where after a period of time they become calcified and die.

What are the symptoms of trichinosis? Stomach upsets and muscular pains, a feeling of chilliness, sore throat, and sometimes considerable fever, are some of the signs. An acute attack of the illness lasts about one or two weeks. The disease has a low death rate, but recovery is fairly slow.

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Delay Predicted In Vet Land Purchases

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Oct. —Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Chairman of the newly created Veterans Land Board, said today that it was doubtful if any land purchases for Texas veterans would be completed before December 1.

"The first bonds will be offered for sale on October 26," stated the Commissioner, "and there is no reason to anticipate that money will be available for our actual use for at least another thirty days."

"The thousand of inquiries we have received," Giles continued, "and other necessary delays are making it later than we had anticipated. We ask veterans and land owners to bear with us until we have secured the money to complete transactions."

Giles also requests veterans considering making applications to "take cognizance of our regulations and policies relative to mineral rights."

The state creating the Veterans Land Program prohibited purchase unless 50 percent of the mineral rights were conveyed with the land. The Board, which is composed of the Governor, the Attorney General and Commissioner (es), ruled at its first meeting at a six-month priority would be given applications which included all minerals or not more than a one-sixteenth outstanding royalty reservation made before June 6, 1949.

"We are not approving transactions which the present owner is seeking to retain mineral interest at the present time," Giles said. "Applications which do not conform to this policy are delaying a program by requiring the attention which could be used toward completion of conforming applications."

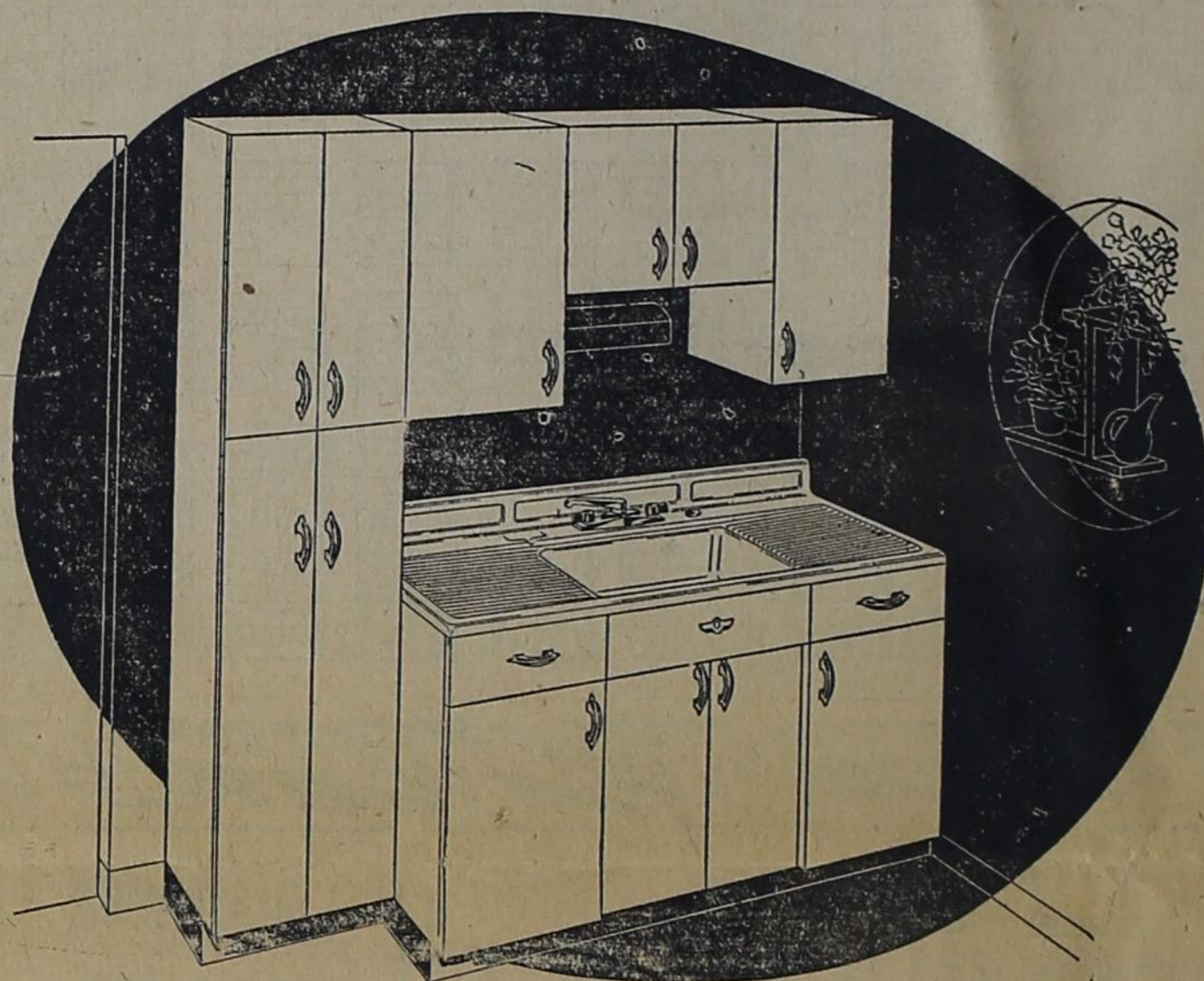

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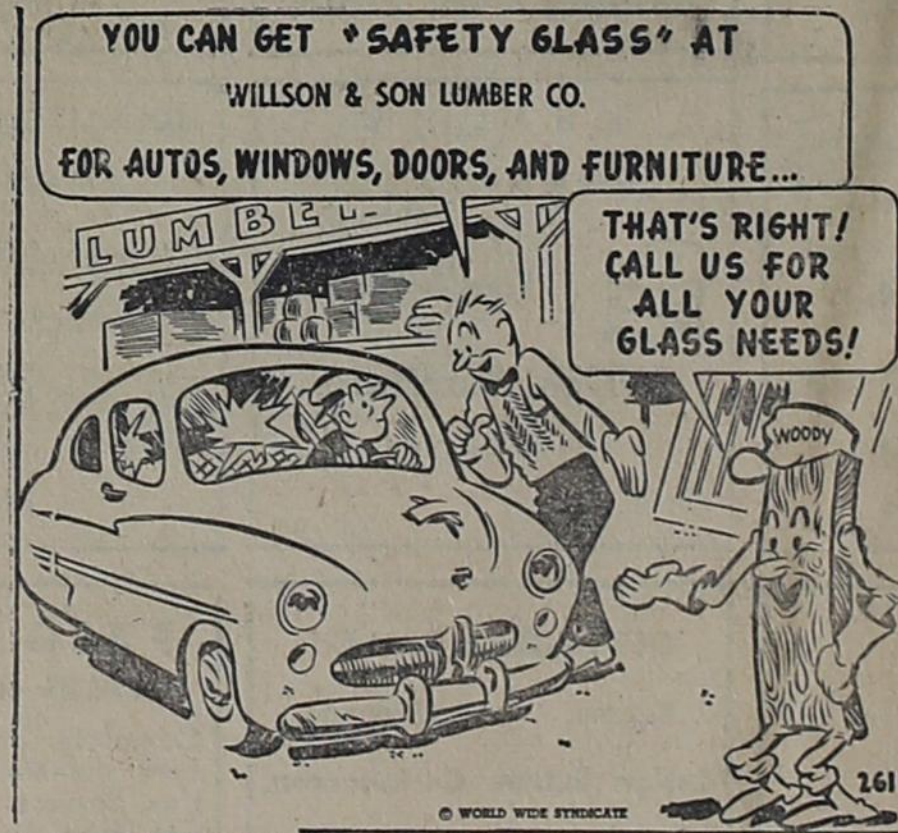
