So many news articles have called to our attention several accidents which have happened recently to our local farm people that Mr. Barber Eubanks, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Running Water Soil Conservation District, has felt it advisable to call to the attention of the public and farmers in particular that the week of July 24-30 has been proclaimed by President Truman as National Safety Week.

Within the last few weeks several accidents have come to our attention, a few of which are listed below:

A farmer breaks his arm on the steering wheel of a tractor.

A well-driller has to have his arm amputated as the result of an accident while working on an irrigation well.

A farmer cuts his hand seriously while fixing a wire fence.

A small child breaks his arm while playing on a local farm.

A farmer is fatally struck by lightning and is drug several yards before being found by neighbors.

A farmer seriously injures his hand on a plow point.

A farmer is seriously injured as the result of an automobile collision.

A farmer who formerly lived here is killed when his tractor over-turns on him.

Everyone in the United States is affected directly or indirectly by accidents to farm residents. Organizations having an interest in farm life, as are most organizations located in Dimmitt, can be greatly affected because of the economic upsets caused by accidents on the farm. The greatest grief and loss as the result of farm accidents, of course, are to the farmers themselves.

According to surveys conducted by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, there were around 859,000 accidents to farm people in 1948, resulting in a loss of approximately 17,000,000 days and a total cost of over \$36,000,000, not counting losses due to fatal accidents and those resulting in permanent total disability. Falls led all farm accidents in 1948, having accounted for one-fourth of the total. Accidents involving machinery and those involving animals each accounted for about an eighth. The remaining were caused from burns, shock, and other unclassified causes.

The thing that we should all remember, states Mr. Eubanks, is that most accidents can be prevented. Accidents don't just happen, they're caused. Different organizations which have conducted safety programs have proven that people can be taught to observe hazards and remove or guard against them before an accident happens. Mr. Eubanks suggests that every farmer, for his own safety and health, should inspect his farm home, his buildings, his equipment, and his operations to eliminate as far as possible all hazards which could cause accidents. Be careful today and be farming tomorrow. Observe National Farm Safety Week all year long.

Hereford C of C Wants Extension Burlington Line

Interested citizens of the Hereford area are trying to get an extension of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Line, which terminates in Dimmitt, to that city.

In an effort to get more adequate service than that which Santa Fe offers they have circulated a petition which has been presented to Burlington officials in the near future. Shortage of cars for shipping Deaf Smith products is given as the reason for the venture.

The proposed new line would be approximately 18 miles long, and would give this area connections from Dimmitt to Plainview, Sterley, Quitaque, Turkey and Childress, where the branch line joins the main Fort Worth and Denver Line.

Vegetable growers said that the new line would place produce from this area on Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston markets 36 hours sooner than offered through present facilities. Cattlemen also expressed interest in the line, especially for shipment of cattle into this area annually for pasture.

Circulation of the petition grew out of a meeting of farmers and shippers with the Hereford Chamber of Commerce recently. Shippers, receivers, growers and processors have affixed their signatures to the petition.

The Booklet discusses the importance of having the proper

amount of equity or risk capital in the business to assure stability and to provide a basis for borrowing from one or more of the sources of loan capital.

It also emphasizes the importance of managing the capital accounts in order to maintain a good balance between fixed and working capital. Several of the sources of capital most frequently available to small business are also discussed.

An addition to its usefulness to individuals planning new small businesses, the booklet will be of use to individuals who have recently undertaken new businesses, and to professional counselors. With two other publications of the Department — "The Small Businessman and His Financial Statements," at 15 cents a copy and "The Small Businessman and His Bank" at 10 cents a copy, the new booklet rounds out a valuable series of the more important principles of financial management, Miller said.

Good Summer Care Urged For Young Pullets About to Lay

It's pretty hard to say that one thing is more important than another when it comes to properly taking care of pullets that will be the egg producers this fall, says W. J. Moore, associate extension poultry husbandman of Texas A&M College, but plenty of tender green feed on the summer range is one of them. Good range furnishes the growing pullets with a supply of vitamins, minerals and other factors that just can't be supplied fully from any other source, continues Moore. Pullets should not be pushed too fast. It can cause trouble later on. They develop sexually before they develop physically and actually begin laying before they are mature. So it's best, says Moore, to keep the pullets growing in body and gaining weight as fast as possible before their combs and wattles develop. These kind make better egg producers.

Feeds containing soybean meal for protein, with small amounts of fish meal and meat scraps seem to be the best. The growing pullet should get this feed along with liberal amounts of grain and the best tender green range that you can give them. The addition of choice alfalfa leaf meal to the mash you're feeding is a good substitute when good range is not available.

It is important to supply the growing birds with plenty of shade, pure, cool water and keep them clean. Moore says, if the pullets are developed properly, they will be ready to produce next fall and winter when egg prices are best. The kind of birds that go into the laying house will be largely determined by the treatment they get this summer, and concludes Moore, now is the time to practice proper poultry range management.

New Dimmitt Street Lights Are Seen All Over Town Since Thursday

Visitors in Dimmitt will see the most modern, up to date street lights made which line the business and residential districts of town. The new lights, which were turned on last Thursday night, are a vast improvement over the old ones. Their light-blue glow has proven a very efficient factor in lighting the thoroughfares of Dimmitt.

The lights are controlled by an automatic device which turns the lights on with the approach of darkness and then shuts them off when daylight comes.

They are coupled with the approaching streetpaving and other municipal programs to make Dimmitt a more safe and beautiful place in which to live.

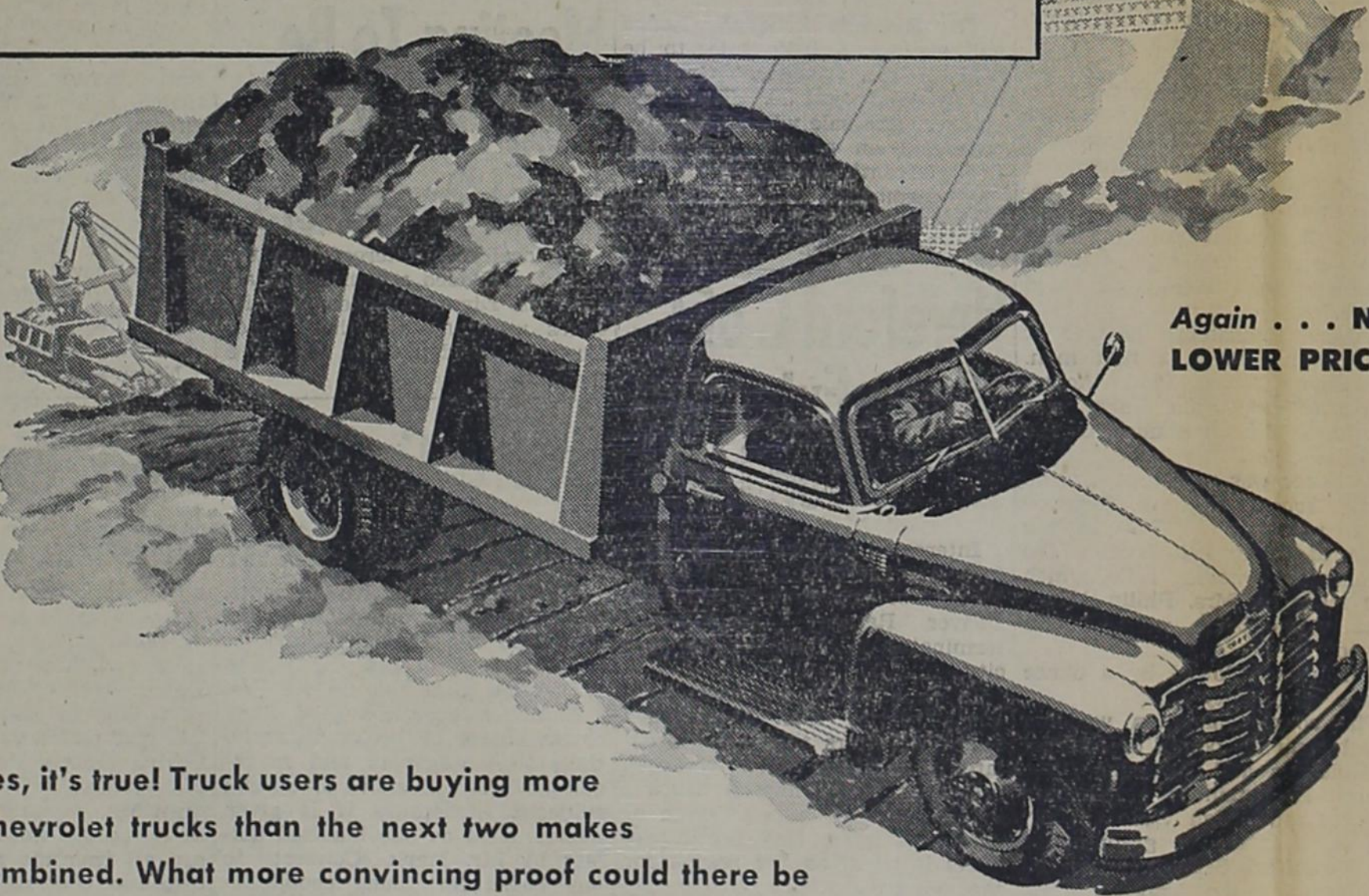

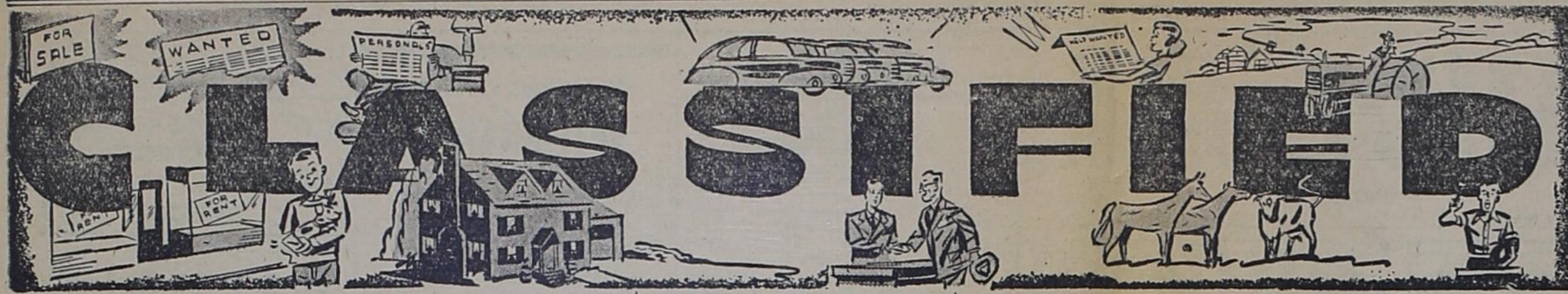

There is now available from the Children's Bureau, Federal Security Administration, a new publication on the growth and development of the child from 6 to 12 years of age. It should be of particular interest to parents who have children in this age group.

It is the first publication from the Children's Bureau on this age group, says Mrs. Elouise Johnson, extension family life specialist of Texas A&M College, and she recommends it highly. Recent Polio Campaigns

In most Texas weeklies lately have appeared stories dealing with the prevention of polio. This campaign has been carried out since the beginning of the warm season in an effort to stop the disease. The State Health Department, local civic organizations and the churches and schools of the state have been stressing prevention of this dread disease. All medias of public information, in short, have waged a verbal war against the disease.

Dimmitt so far has been extremely fortunate in suffering no deaths from this disease, but the danger is ever-present. If a clean-up campaign, spraying program, garbage disposal scheme or any other health measure could help retard polio, it would be well worth the trouble. The south part of the state has been hit harder than the Panhandle, but unless we keep Dimmitt clean, we won't be so lucky later on.

Right now Dimmitt is one of the cleanest cities in the Panhandle. Let's keep it that way!

New Street Lights

Have you noticed the new street lights?

Dimmitt looks somewhat like the movies we see of the big cities at night, except maybe for the noticeable absence of skyscrapers and street cars, not to mention traffic. The main streets are blanketed with a big blue carpet and one could set down in the middle of main street and read a newspaper. With the streetlights and approaching paving, we should have something here.

New Methodist Church

The new Methodist Church is nearing completion. The church, when finished will be one of the finest of its kind in the country. The Board of Stewards and congregation are to be congratulated on their fine building. It is something for Dimmitt to be proud of.

Prison Paper

We were looking over the ECHO, prison paper for the boys at Huntsville, a few days ago. It is a well-edited little paper and the printing is excellent considering the conditions under which it is done. If you should get hold of a copy, by all means read it and pass it on.

Five Highways

Here's something to think about. Dimmitt now has five paved highways leadin into town with four meeting at the square. And that doesn't count the farm-to-market highway from Earth which intersects with the Bovina highway 6 miles west of town. We just wonder how many other small towns in the Panhandle can boast of these facilities.

Castro County Goes On Big Home-Repair Spree

Repair expenditures for Castro County's non-farm homes will total an estimated \$44,000 during 1949 and will serve as an important factor in keeping both labor and business at high levels, according to a report just released by the Tile Council of America.

"Practically every trade in the community will benefit from home repair expenditures," declared A. T. Wintersgill, chairman of the Council's residential construction committee. Such work, he pointed out, is a vital stabilizing influence throughout the building trades.

Painting and redecorating will account for about \$39 of every \$100 to be spent in the South on home repairs, the report revealed. Roofing repairs will take \$25 to \$30, and work with stone, glass and clay tile about \$6.

Carpentry repairs will require approximately \$5.00 of the theoretic \$100, and installation of showers, tiling of bathrooms and replacement of plumbing will account for another \$4. Miscellaneous work will take the balance part.

"Production of such materials as finished hardwood flooring, clay tile for baths and kitchens, and cement reached an all-time high in 1948, and 1949 output for construction promises to be more than ample for both home building and repair," Mr. Wintersgill declared.

Most materials are available today in a much wider range than at any time since the war, he pointed out. Clay tile manufacturers, for instance, have added scores of new hues to color lines in recent months, he said.

Expenditures throughout the United States on home repairs will total between \$2,500,000,000 and \$3,100,000,000, the Tile Council estimated.

The cylinders, in the form of sleeves, may be replaced quickly and inexpensively, eliminating a major repair job if a cylinder wall becomes scored or dam-

aged. Easily installed without special tools, a relatively inexpensive new sleeve-piston and ring assembly results in "what amounts to a brand new engine," Reo said.

The new Reo engine has been designed for heavy-duty, high speed service, providing more speed and power with greater fuel economy, greater endurance and far easier maintenance, the Lansing firm disclosed. It "easily develops" 140 horsepower at its governed speed of 3200 RPM. Pistons and sleeves are all of standard size and interchangeable.

Result of a \$5,000,000.00, three-year program of engineering, testing and development, and the purchase of specially-designed precision production machines, the Gold Comet will power Reo's Model E-22 trucks and tractors with gross weight ranges of 17,000 lbs. to 38,000 lbs.

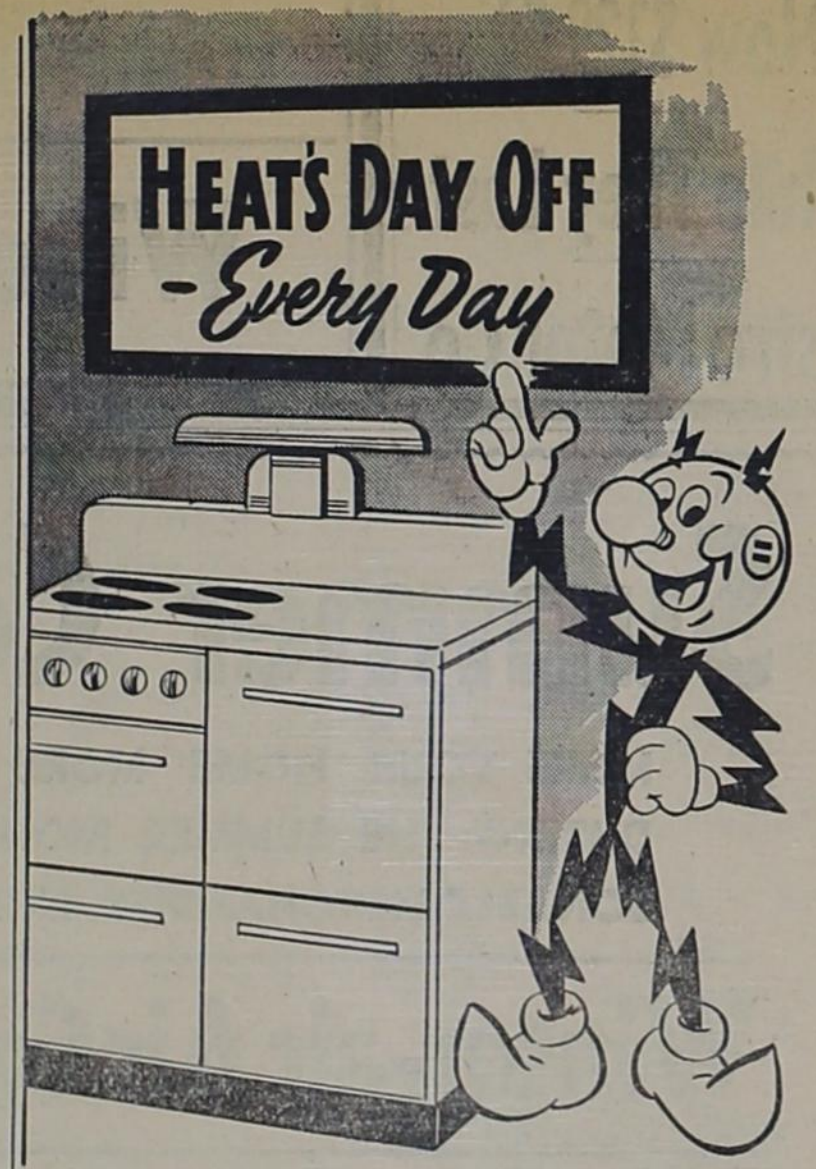

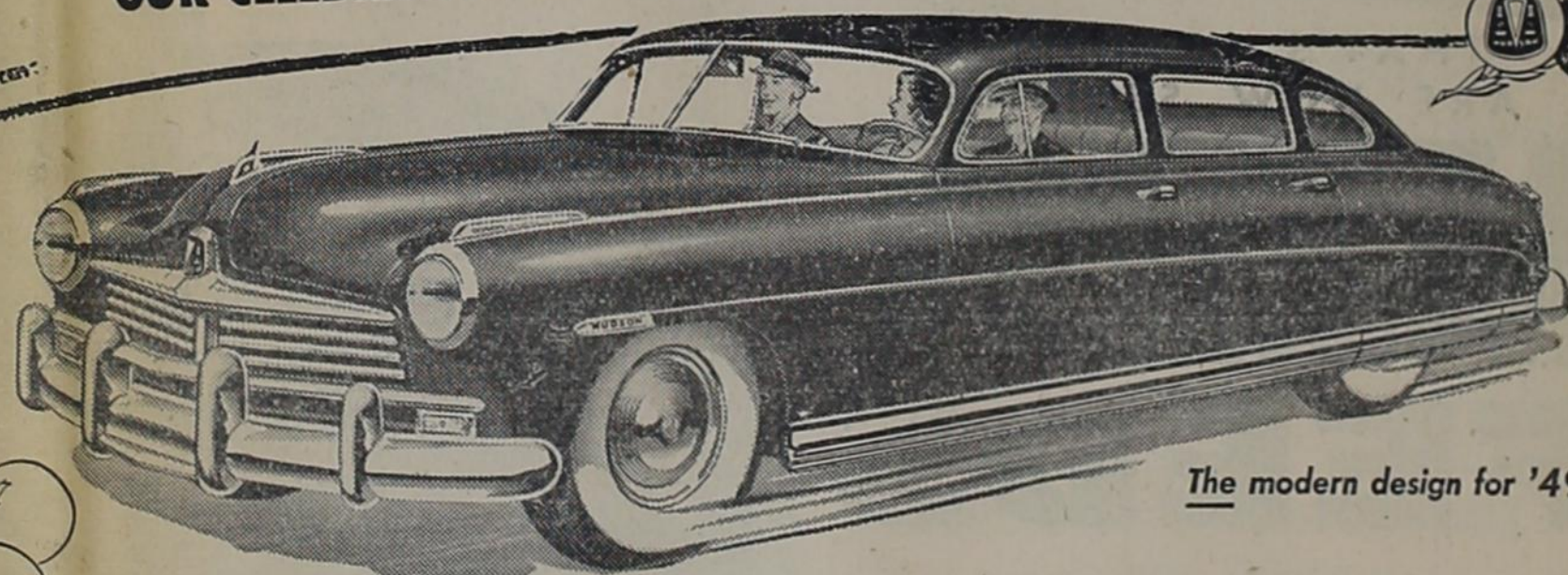

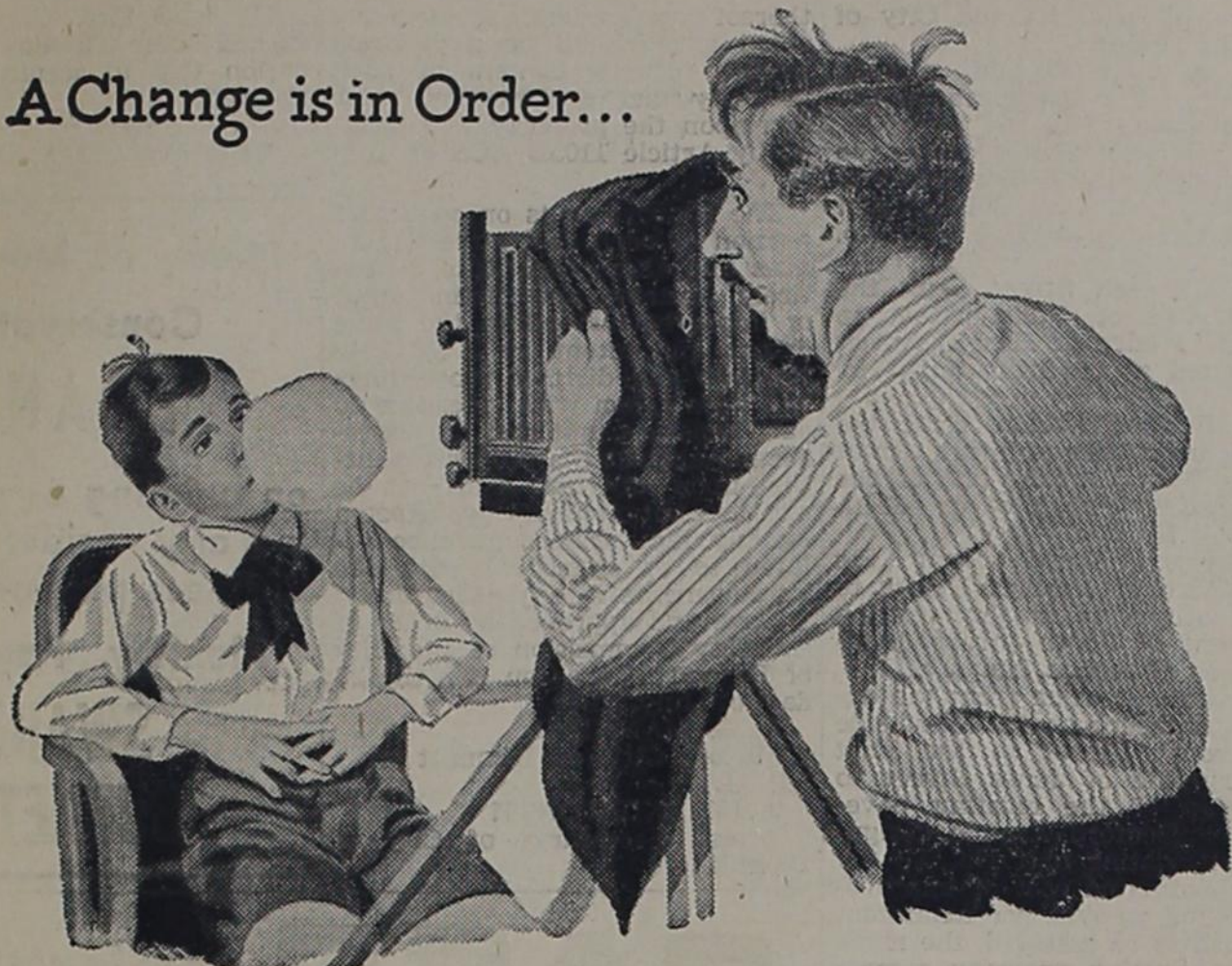

State Health Office Discusses Means Fly Eradication

During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as the Chambers of Commerce, many Civic Organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-round community sanitation the ultimate result, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

"The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed. Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome B. O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit, preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skillful operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

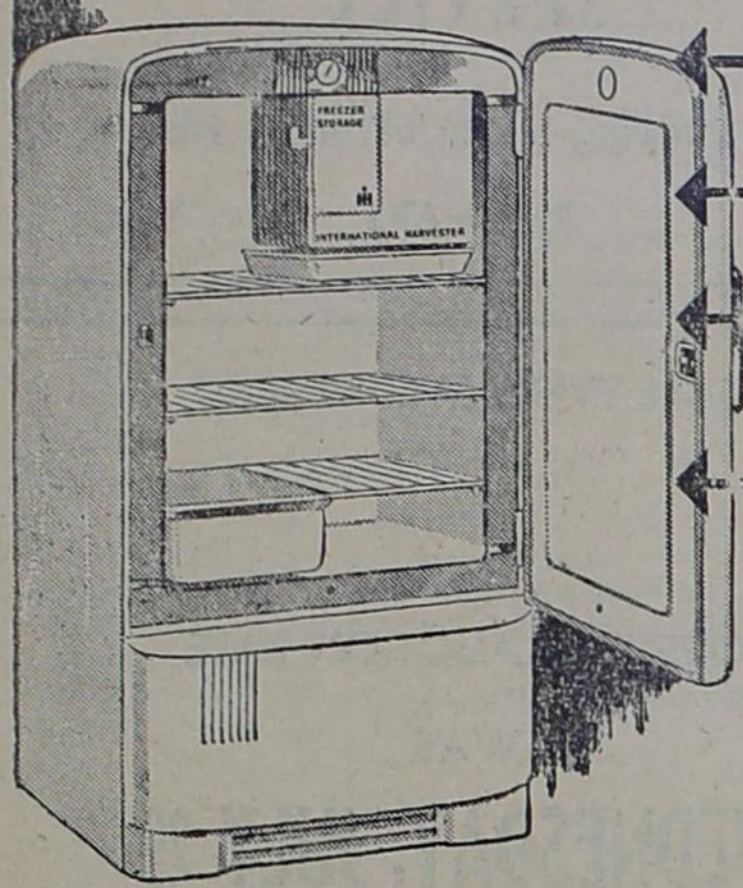

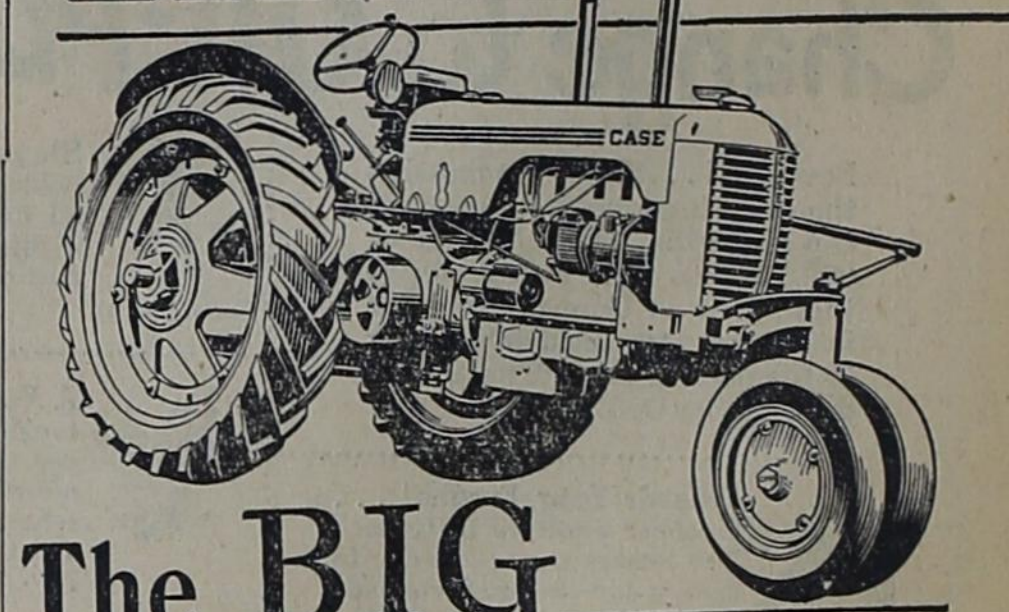
