Hart Donors to Boy Scouts of America

College Station, December 15—The basic question being decided by Texas cotton farmers in the December 15 referendum is: Will farmers who plant more land to cotton than their acreage allotments provide be required to pay a penalty on the cotton produced from the extra acreage?

That was the issue as laid down today by B. F. Vance, state director of the Production and Marketing Administration. Vance urged all Texas cotton farmers to vote on December 15 in deciding the issue, pointing out that every cotton farmer in the state will be affected by the outcome.

If cotton marketing quotas are approved by two-thirds of the cotton farmers in the U. S. voting in the referendum, this will be the situation, according to Vance.

Farmers who plant within their acreage allotments will be able to market all the cotton they produce without paying any penalty. They will be eligible for government loans at 90 percent of parity. They can receive conservation payments from the PMA (\$23,000,000 in Texas this year).

Farmers who plant more cotton than their acreage allotments will pay a penalty amounting to one-half the parity price on all cotton they produce in excess of their marketing quotas. A marketing quota is the cotton produced on a farm's allotted acreage. At current parity prices, the penalty would be about 15 cents a pound on all excess cotton.

Farmers who overplant their allotments will not be eligible for government loans on their cotton. Nor will they be eligible for government conservation payments.

If quotas fail to receive the necessary two-thirds majority, then they will not be in effect. Acreage allotments, however, will still be used. In the event quotas are voted down, this will be the situation:

The government will support the price of cotton at 50 percent of parity (instead of 90 percent). Farmers who plant within their allotments will be eligible for government loans at 50 percent of parity. They also will be eligible for conservation assistance payments.

Farmers who overplant their allotments will not be eligible for government loans on their cotton, and they cannot receive conservation payments. But they can market all of their cotton without paying any penalty.

Rev. Landtroop stated that the program would consist of a "Radio narration of the Life of Lottie Moon", an American missionary. The narration will be preceded by a Nativity scene presented by the beginner and primary departments.

Griffith Building Is Temporary Location of Wilson Grocery

The Wilson Grocery store is being moved into its temporary location in the former Griffith Grocery building just east of the Court House. The firm will conduct its business in that location until fire damage repairs, and complete renovation of the Wilson store building is completed.

According to an announcement by Raymond Wilson, manager, the fire sale will be continued in the new location and in addition a complete new stock of staple and fancy groceries, as well as fresh fruits and vegetables, will also be featured.

Tuberculosis Is Preventable

Do you know that tuberculosis is preventable? Curable? Not inherited?

Tuberculosis is contracted from another active case. It is a "catching disease." It is caused by a germ which usually attacks the lungs, but may attack other parts of the body, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Tuberculosis is spread from an infected person to others in several ways, some of which are: through nose and throat discharges, by coughing and spitting; through using dishes, linens and other articles soiled by an infected person. Tuberculosis infection usually is the result of continued close contact with an active case; therefore, it is a "family disease."

How do we know who has tuberculosis? Early TB is without symptoms. It is no respecter of persons. It occurs in all walks of life and at any age, but is least likely to be present in serious form between the ages of 4 and 14 years.

If coughing and loss of weight are present, the disease is well advanced, and a person has lost his best chance for complete recovery.

How can we protect our families? Go to your physician for an examination, including a chest x-ray. When the Mobile x-ray unit comes to your town, have a free chest x-ray. X-ray surveys have been conducted in 132 counties and 18 institutions during the past year and over 514,400 persons have been x-rayed. Protect your home from tuberculosis.

Shopping by impulse is a good way to get poor returns for the money, time and effort spent at the grocery store. It is better to plan your shopping duties—based on needs and finances.

To take a too-strong taste from lard, melt the lard and add 1/2 cup uncooked rice to each gallon. Heat until the rice is a golden brown, cool and strain.









AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS, REDEFINING AND RE-ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARY LIMITS OF THE INCORPORATED LIMITS OF SAID CITY, ESTABLISHING THE CORNERS THEREOF AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, there exists an uncertainty as to the true and correct city limits lines as defined and created by the original field notes of the corporation of the City of Dimmitt, Texas; and, WHEREAS, because of such uncertainty much confusion has arisen as to the true and correct boundary lines and as to the property that is actually within the City Limits; and, WHEREAS, the City of Dimmitt, Texas, has caused such original city limit lines to be surveyed and re-established as shown by the field notes hereinafter fully set out:

Therefore, be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, that the following is and shall be established as the true and correct boundary markings of said city and the city limit lines as follows, to-wit:

BEGINNING at a point 365 feet West and 280 feet North of the Southeast corner of Section No. 25, Block M-10-A, Castro County, Texas, which point is the intersection of the South boundary line of "South Street" with the East line of "E Street" as shown by the plat of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, of record in the Deed Records of said County; THENCE West with the South line of "South Street" 4915 feet to a point in the West line of Section No. 25, Block M-10-A; THENCE North with the West

line of said Section No. 25, 753 feet to a point, being the Southeast corner of Lot No. 10, Block No. 1, Carter Subdivision to the Town of Dimmitt, Texas; THENCE West 1650 feet to a point;

THENCE North 4195 feet to the Northwest corner of Block No. 5, Miller Addition to the Town of Dimmitt, Texas; THENCE East 1650 feet to a point in the East line of Section No. 26, Block M-10-A; THENCE North 30 feet to a point in the South line of Survey 23, Block M-1; THENCE East to the Southwest corner of Block No. 2, Wanona Addition to the Town of Dimmitt, Texas;

THENCE North with the West block line of said Addition to the Northwest corner of Block No. 4, Brown Addition to the Town of Dimmitt, Texas; THENCE East with the North line of Block No. 4 to the Northeast corner of Lot No. 1, Block No. 4, Brown Addition; THENCE North to the Northwest Corner of Lot 8 Block 2, Brown Addition;

THENCE East with the North Line of said Block to the Northeast Corner of Block 2, Brown Addition, THENCE South with the East Block line of Brown and Wanona Additions to the Southeast corner of Block No. 1, Wanona Addition; THENCE East to a point in the South line of Section No. 18, Block M, which point is 245 feet West and 280 feet South of the Northeast corner of Section No. 25, Block M; THENCE South approximately 5,000 feet to the place of beginning.

This ordinance shall be published in two issues of the Castro County News and shall take effect from and after its publication.

The fact that great confusion exists as to the true and correct boundary markings of the City Limits of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, creates an emergency and

a public necessity requiring the rules providing for three separate readings be dispensed with and they are hereby dispensed with and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its publication.



SPORTS AFIELD

If you're a real good fisherman, don't overlook this late season fishing. You won't get as many fish as you did earlier in the season—you may, indeed, get very few. But during no other part of the season are your chances of snagging into some really huge ones nearly so good. This holds not only for bass but for pike and walleyes. Very late in the season is the time to get really big pike.

Bass, after having been in shallow water for awhile, are now back in deeper spots. I generally have best luck finding them at sharp drop-offs with weeds at the edge. In the colder months, I've found them much less finicky as to what lure they'll take, just so it's fished deep and very slowly.

Now, you are likely to find them "bunting"—hitting the lure gently—so you can't hook them well. Jason Lucas, one of our best known bass anglers, suggests you use a very tiny plug of the sort that one would generally use for rather small crappies.

These remarks hold true of the extreme northern parts of the country during November. Farther south, they will apply in December, even January.

When winter really sets in and you must put your gear away, be sure you store your line properly. More lines have to be discarded because of improper storage in winter than because of wear.

A silk casting line must be dried very thoroughly before storing, and kept in a completely dry place. Otherwise it will be so weak by spring that it will be useless. We are told that nylon casting lines never need drying, but I prefer to store mine as carefully as my silk—it can do no harm.

Never leave your fly line on the reel all winter. Take it off, and keep it in a coil six inches or so in diameter. The simplest way to make a neat coil is to wind it onto a cardboard box or such, then slip it off over the end and tie it with string. Be sure the line doesn't twist as you wind it. Then hang the coil in a cool, dry place. It is a good idea to give the line a heavy coat of dressing before storage.







REFINISHING FLOORS
College Station—The job of refinishing floors in the home is one that is often neglected and when it is attempted always creates many problems. Research workers at the Rhode Island Experiment Station have just completed some experiments that may prove helpful and answer a lot of questions that you might like to have answered before starting on the job.

They say it can be done at home and it need not be an expensive undertaking that calls for outside help. They refinished 131 different floors including both pine and oak and as you would expect, the first operation was a complete sanding and cleaning

job. They used three finishes; shellac, penetrating seal and varnish.

The penetrating seal proved most satisfactory and required the least time and effort. The homemakers were all satisfied with the results. Results with the other two types of finishes proved that a better understanding of the common floor finishes are needed before they are used. Shellac and varnish form a film over the floor surface that will protect and beautify it, but they can be scratched or marred by grit carried in on the shoes and it's hard to prevent the patching from showing. The white spots sometimes noted on shellac finished floors are caused from moisture.



Run crackers and dates through

food chopper. Add nuts and marshmallows. Mix well, adding milk to moisten. Shape into a roll. Wrap in waxed paper. Chill 24 hours before using. Cut into slices and serve with whipped cream. Roll will keep in cold place some time. 20 servings.

MOM'S GOLD CAKE

10 egg yolks
1½ cups sugar
¾ cup butter
¾ cup milk
2½ cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream butter, sugar, and vanilla thoroughly. Add egg yolks which have been beaten until they are light and lemon colored. Sift baking powder and flour together. Add alternately with milk. Bake in tube pan at 325 F., approximately 45 minutes.


