WORK IS HALTED UNTIL FORMS ARRIVE

C. Hickey, secretary of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation committee, announced that a check for \$715, representing one-third of the amount of the city of Ranger for the month of March, had been received, but that instructions had also been received not to disburse any of this money until after a meeting for Brownwood on April 10.

At the meeting in Brownwood the committee on the new set up included by Lawrence Westbrook, assisted by Governor Ferguson, will be given out and the way in which the relief work will be handled in the future explained. At this meeting is held and new forms received, no work can be done until explained.

A complete new set up has been explained and the registration of all the applicants for which number 925 in Ranger. A new supply of printed forms is to be sent out from Austin which must be used in disbursing the money and allotting the same. These forms are almost identical to the ones used in the past, but the old forms cannot be used in the future.
