Nearly a million dollars in checks to Southwestern farmers were sent out last week by the Dallas regional office of the crop production loan division of the department of agriculture. Loans so far were averaging about \$70 each. More than 18,000 checks were mailed to county clerks in Arizona, New Mexico. and Texas for distribution to farmers. Applications received at the Dallas regional office totaled \$26,618 as compared with less than 9000 at the corresponding time of the loan season last year.

FARM CREDIT AGENCIES CONSOLIDATED

President Roosevelt is a very rapid traveler. He has drafted an executive order for a consolidation of the several governmental agricultural agencies in the first step of his plan for a wholesale federal reorganization, According to Washington advices this sudden move came as a preliminary to a program to refinancing the debt burdened holders of farm mortgages which will be submitted to congress probably to be followed shortly by a program for revising the national transportation system. There are eight separate credit agencies in the depart ment, including the farm board and the farm loan bureau, as well as the different loan agencies of the department of agriculture. All will be consolidated under one head and saving of two million dollars estimated by the president to result from the unification plan.




