Application Approved For East-west Bus Line Tue.

The application of Chisholm Trail Coaches, Inc., for a permit to operate a bus line from Wichita Falls to Farwell, through Dimmitt, was approved at a meeting of the Texas Railroad Commission Tuesday.

Application by the Chisholm Trail Coaches for a permit to operate a bus line over the proposed route was made several months ago. Following lengthy hearings of a vast amount of testimony the case was submitted to the Railroad Commission for a decision. Unavoidable delays postponed the final decision until Tuesday.

Twenty days will be allowed for filing of any objections or exceptions to the order, the commission said.

The route will go from Farwell by US Highway 60 to Bovina, then on State 86 to Estelline, US 287 to Electra, State 25 to an intersection with State 240, State 240 to Burk Burnett, US 281 to Wichita Falls.

The bus line will serve Farwell, Bovina, Dimmitt, Nazareth, Tullia, Silverton, Quitaque, Turkey, Parnell, Estelline, Carey, Childress, Kirkland, Acme, Quanah, Chilli-cothe, Tolbert, Vernon, Oklahoma, Harold, Electra, Pumpkin Center, Clara, Burk Burnett, Shepard Field, Wichita Falls and intermediate points.

Daily service of four schedules each day between Wichita Falls and Farwell, and three each way between Wichita Falls and Childress is proposed.

Celebrate 60th Wedding Anniversary



Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Dixon celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary, October 10, 1949, at the old home place south of Dimmitt.

Mr. and Mrs. Dixon were both born and reared in Brazos County, Texas. Mr. Dixon was born September 30, 1886, Mrs. Dixon was born July 29, 1872. They were married at Mullcan, Texas. Mrs. Dixon's maiden name was Ellen Irene Chenault.

They began farming in Brazos County on a 100 acre farm, asking no odds, only health and a chance to make good by the sweat of the brow. Twelve years were spent trying to accumulate enough to move the family west to new opportunities. During those years five boys were born; one dying in infancy.

1901 found Mr. Dixon on his way to West Texas. He landed in Colorado City, traveling the balance of the way by wagon, to Castro County. Convinced that he had found the land of his dreams, he purchased 640 acres of land from Robert Gollehon for \$1.00 per acre. That was the highest price that had been paid for land in Castro County up to that time.

In January 1902, Mr. Dixon sent for his wife and children. They established their home about half mile from the sight where the diamond anniversary was celebrated. Mr. Dixon began working, aside from his farming, for ranches over the country, building fences for the Y. L., Yellowhouse, Springlake, Flag and Starr and other ranches, being paid from \$10 to \$13 per mile.

In 1904 another son was born. Also this year Mr. Dixon ran for Tax Assessor, making his campaign by way of a good red mule, covering the present counties of Castro, Lamb and Bailey. The three counties together polling less than 200 votes. By the grace of God, his mule and a fiddle he was elected, serving four years.

Mr. and Mrs. Dixon have both enjoyed exceptionally good health neither of them ever having spent a day in the hospital and having a doctor at their home only one time.

To help this couple celebrate their anniversary, over 150 relatives and friends gathered from many points of Texas. After a bountiful barbecue dinner, a short program was rendered, consisting of short talks from the sons and old-time residents.

Nov. 6 Is CROP Sunday In Texas Churches

CROP Sunday in the churches of Texas is to be observed November 6, it has been announced by state chairman Dan C. Russell.

At that time the churches are being asked to bring the meaning of the Christian Rural Overseas Program to their congregations and to arrange participation in the program where this has not already been done.

Members of the Texas CROP Committee at their College Station meeting set the period of November 6 to 13 as CROP Week in Texas.

Counties and communities which have not already held their commodity collection drives are being asked to conduct them during this time along with receiving cash for commodities from those who do not have commodities or prefer to give cash.

Commodities being stressed in Texas include; cotton lint and products from cottonseed, wheat, rice, peanuts, dried peas and beans, dried powdered milk, etc.

The Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP) is a program through which commodities and cash for commodities are collected and turned over to established church relief agencies.

The distribution overseas by these church agencies is made to orphanages, institutions for the aged and ill, refugees and the hungry, irrespective of race or creed.

CROP is a church sponsored program and in Texas is endorsed by all the churches, one in cooperation with the other.

CROP Sunday was moved up to November 6 from the 13th to allow an earlier start on the assembling of commodities for Christian Carloads for the Texas Friendship Food and Fiber Train, Elmore R. Torn, State CROP Director, explained.

Spread meringue mixture in pie plate making rim at edge. Bake in very slow oven 250F. for an hour. Cool. Fill baked meringue with ice cream and sugared fresh or frozen berries.

Sweet Potato Pie—Southern Style
1 1/2 cups mashed sweet potatoes
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
3 tablespoons brown sugar
2 eggs, well beaten
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups rich milk or cream
2 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons lemon rind grated
1-8 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Line 9-inch pie pan with pastry rolled 1-8 inch thick, allowing 2 1/2 inches more than the diameter of the pan. Fold the rim of the pastry at the outer edge of the pan, using forefinger of the left hand to make crinkly edge, and breaking off the surplus pastry. Prick pie shell; brush with butter and set in refrigerator to chill. To the cold mashed potatoes add combined sugar, well-beaten whole eggs, salt, and milk, and blend until smooth. Now beat in the butter, lemon rind and vanilla extract. Turn mixture into chilled pie shell as evenly as possible and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven (350 F.) You may garnish the edge of pie with whipped cream; or top with a meringue.

Twelve words sum up the remarkable rehabilitation of a World War II disabled veteran who sacrificed as much as any man can possibly sacrifice and still continue to live. "I felt like I could do it and so I did it."

Those are the words of John W. Westmoreland of Batesburg, South Carolina, operator of a filling station—though blind—and proprietor of a short order lunch counter—though he has but one leg. Because he has had the courage to overcome a multitude of injuries and disabilities caused by war service and succeeded in a new field of endeavor, Westmoreland has been selected by the Disabled American Veterans as its "Hero of the Month."

The selection is part of a national program to honor each month a seriously disabled veteran who has successfully rehabilitated himself. Westmoreland left his job as a physically fit loom tender in a textile mill to join the 23rd Infantry Division in the fall of 1942.

One June 16, 1944, near St. Lo, France, enemy fire felled him. Shrapnel struck both eyes and his right leg.

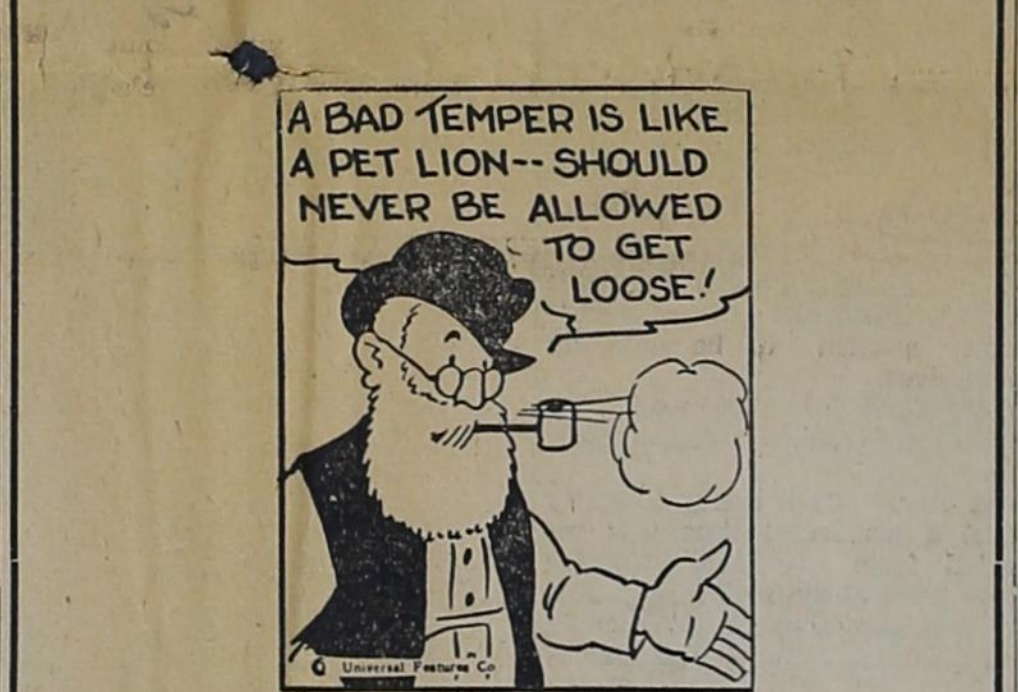
Pvt. John W. Westmoreland was discharged following hospitalization with the Purple Heart, Arrow Head, and Bronze Campaign Star—but without his sight and his right leg. Upon discharge from government hospitals, Westmoreland was given special instruction by the Vocational Rehabilitation and Education Division of the Veterans Administration as an operator of a filling station.

Today, at Batesburg, he has his own place of business and has added a short lunch counter to his gas station. He has a thriving business. During the recent state department convention of the Disabled American Veterans—which adopted a resolution recommending his as a "Hero of the Month"—Westmoreland "out jitterbugged" every disabled veteran at the convention dance.

He has been introduced before the House of Representatives of the South Carolina legislature because of his remarkable comeback.

Westmoreland is 29 years old and single. His philosophy: "I felt like I could do it and so I did it" is an inspiration to other seriously disabled veterans.

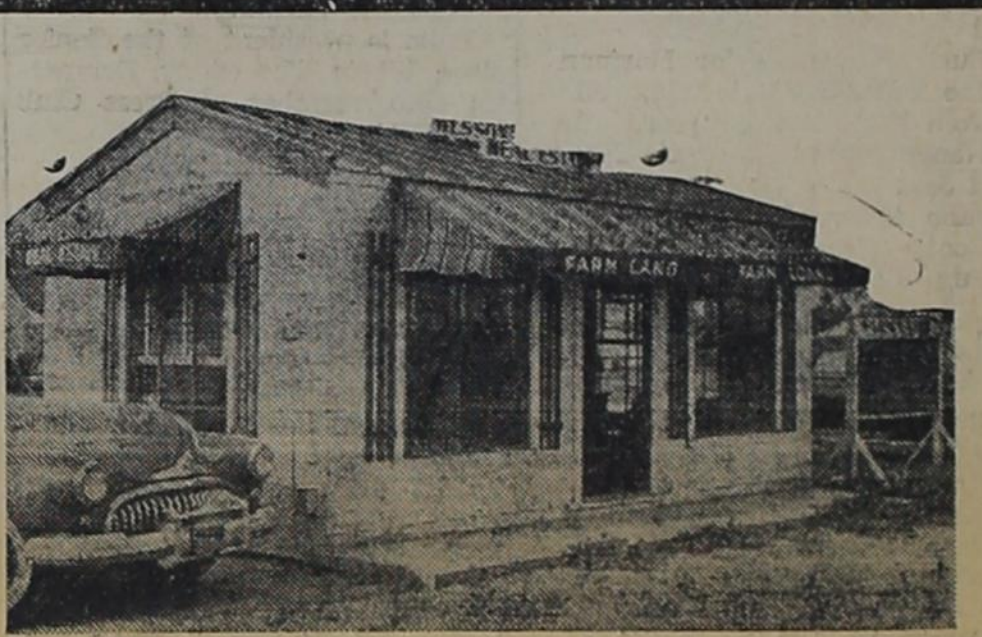

Dangers of Scarlet Fever Pointed Out by Health Officer

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Scarlet fever is one of the most disabling and dangerous diseases usually

associated with childhood, although actually it is confined to no age limit, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. While only six cases were reported in the state during the week ending September 24, it brought the year's total to 911

cases. The Doctor described scarlet fever as an acute infectious disease, the onset of which is sudden. The first symptoms including sore throat, vomiting, fever, and headache, may appear in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by the distinctive red rash which gives this disease its name, Dr. Cox stated.

Complications may cause prolonged disability or death. Children suffering with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middle-ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys, and heart may become involved, causing life-long invalidism or crippling.

"A child with any kind of a sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly," Dr. Cox asserted. "If scarlet fever is present, the treatment recommended will do much to alleviate discomfort and reduce the possibility of serious complications." Dr. Cox stated that children under ten years of age are most susceptible, and that those persons who fail to contract scarlet fever until grown stand an excellent chance of never having the disease.

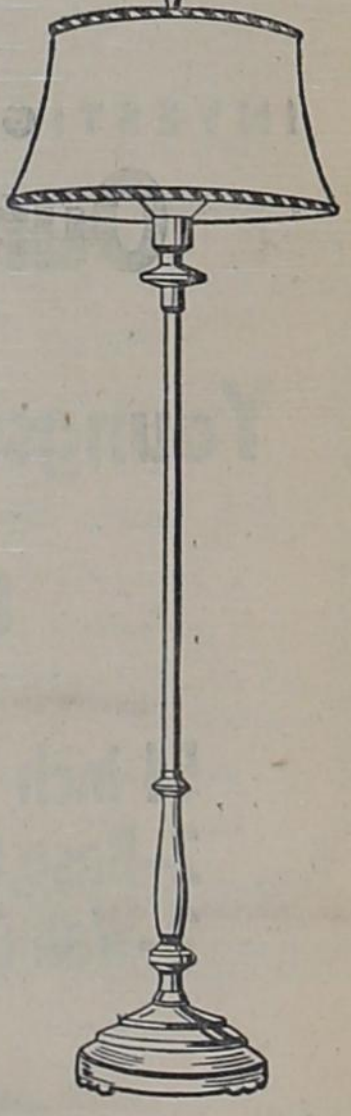

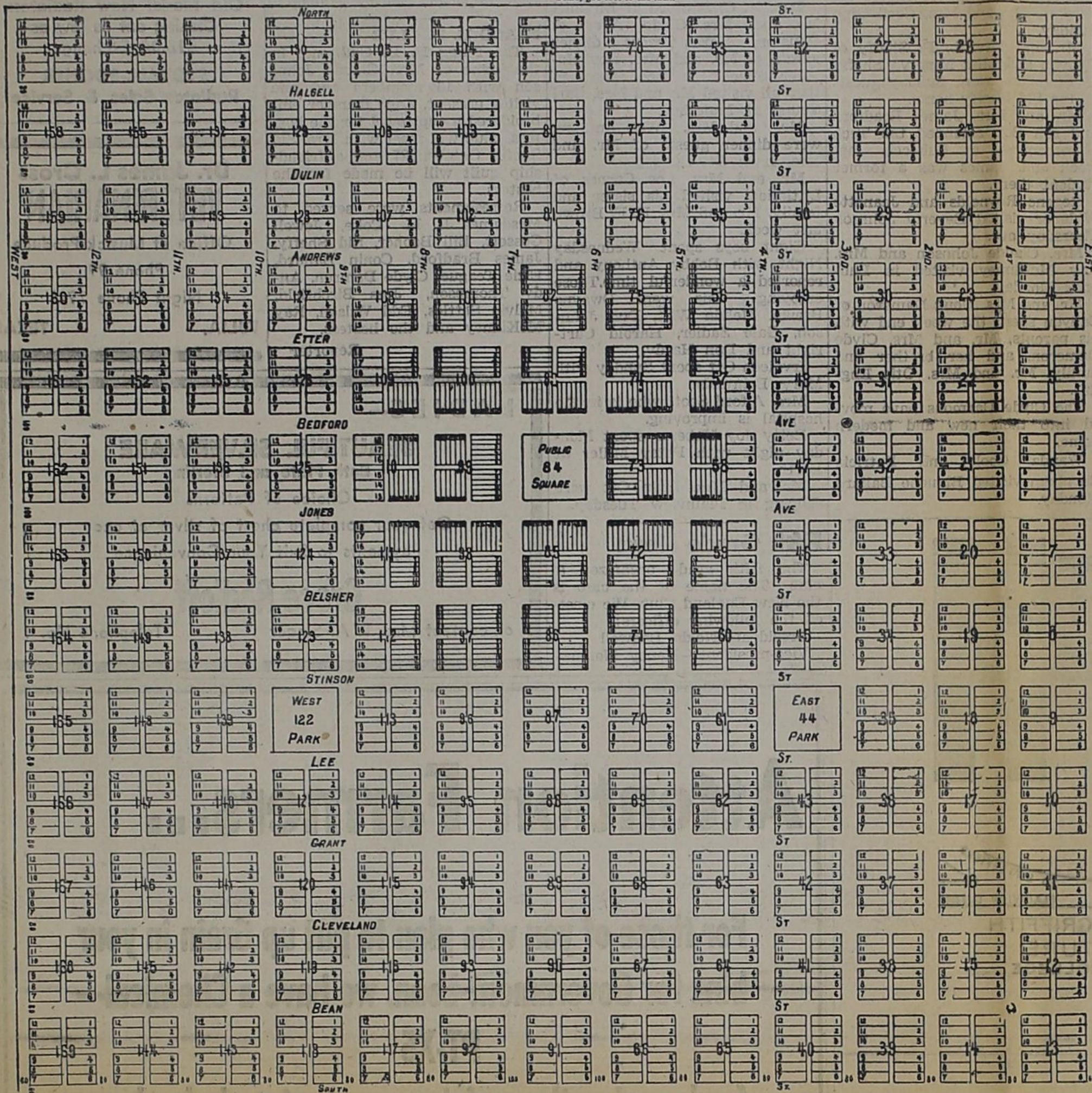

a certificate of approval for the oyster beds he uses, provided health department officials find the beds are free from pollution, and the shucking houses are clean and well-kept. Otherwise, no certificate.

Each shucking house (where oysters are opened) must have a certificate showing all employe-es are free from communicable diseases, especially typhoid fever. The certificates are issued annually.

The Federal government cooperates with the State by keeping a list of all certified shippers in Texas. If a shipper isn't certified his oysters can't be shipped in interstate commerce. And since Texas has some fine oyster beds, Dr. Cox says the interstate commerce ruling is an incentive for oyster shippers to adhere to sanitary practices. Otherwise they miss the out-of-state market.

That's the situation on oyster sanitation from a man who knows. So don't look at the calendar when you order oysters. Ask the seller if his product is certified by the proper public health officials.

Oysters Easy Contaminated

Austin, Texas, October 20, 1949.—Some people claim oysters are good only during the months which have R in their spelling.

But the Texas State Health Department says oysters are not safe any month, with or without the R, if the seafood has not been cultivated, shucked, packed, and shipped under sanitary conditions.

Texas' veteran state officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, says oysters have much to commend them as a source of food.

"They have protein of good quality, iron, and copper (important as a protection against anemia), iodine, which is essential to proper working of the thyroid gland, and a fair amount of vitamins," Cox says. But he adds emphatically, "Beware of uncertified oysters."

According to the doctor, each oyster grower in Texas is given

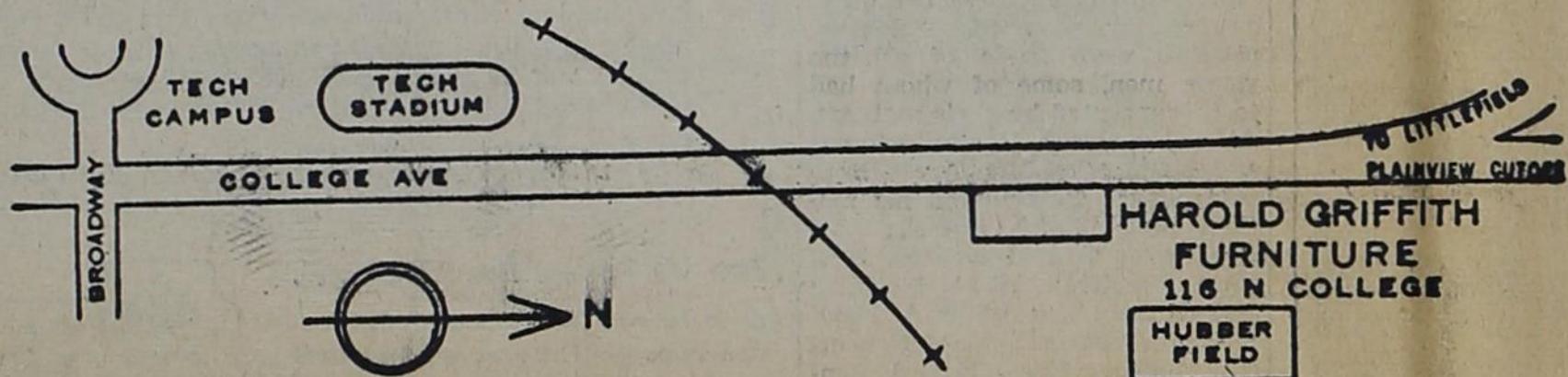

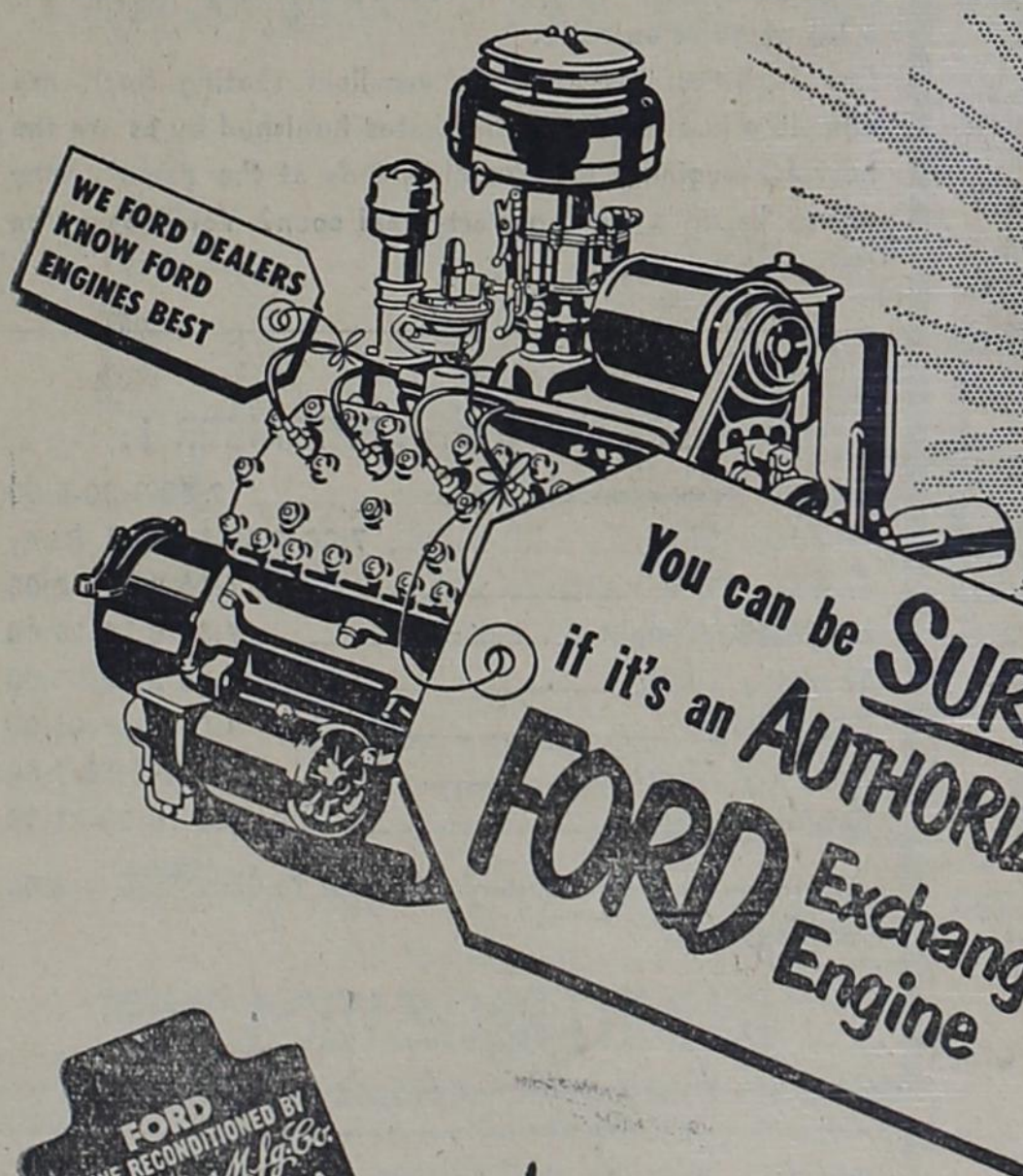

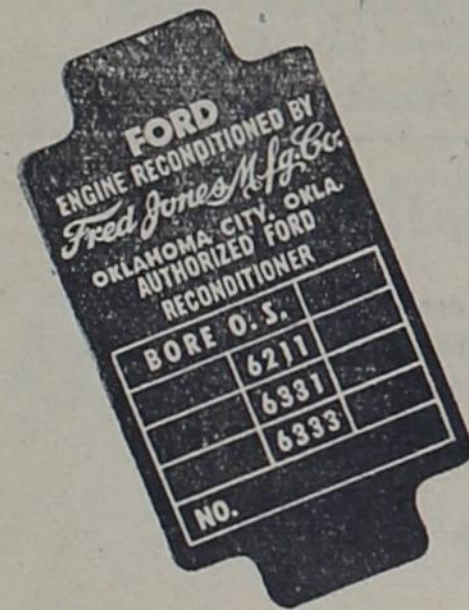
