A number of persons from adjoining states attended this very enjoyable affair. States represented included Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado and Texas. Guests from Levelland, Friona, Hereford, Crowell, Vernon and Castro County also attended.

Following the meal, guests had an opportunity to see the progress being made in converting the old school house into a community center. Up to date the floors in the six rooms of the building have been sanded and re-finished, the walls painted and rooms converted into dining room, nursery, and play rooms. Shuffle board, table tennis, "42", and washer pitching were enjoyed by a number following the banquet.

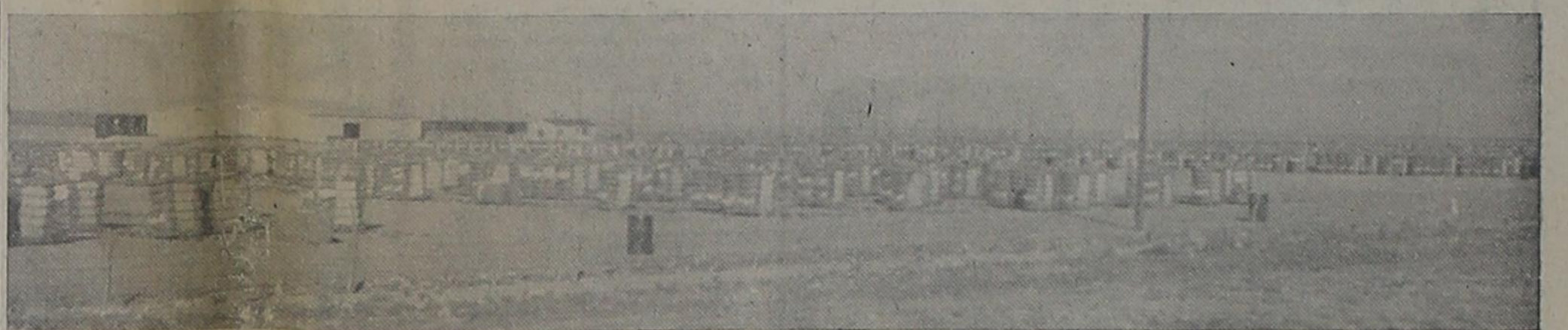
Other progress being made by the community includes the digging of a pit to take care of the old community junk pile. Thirty families have ordered mail box signs with their names on them. Forty-four road signs have been painted and will be up soon. Various roads in the community have been named and after the signs have been erected it will be easy for strangers and others to find their way about the Jumbo community.

Other work being planned for the next few months is the landscaping of the community center and remodeling the auditorium. The Jumbo Home Demonstration Club under the leadership of the club president, Mrs. H. H. Smith, served the banquet and all proceeds will be used in improving the community center.

Also shown in the picture are a number of Fort Worth & Denver Railway cars on the trackage built to serve the compress and warehouse company. According to a report Wednesday morning by Mr. O. L. Giles, superintendent, the local warehouse has handled 32,093 bales of cotton to date, with only 400 to 500 bales being placed in the government loan. The warehouse is receiving approximately 1,000 bales of cotton per day.

Giles is assisted in the compress and warehouse office by Mrs. Giles, Mrs. Elvis Burch, and Mrs. George E. Ray. Mr. D. Doyle is the weigher for the concern. A total of 43 employees is kept busy in the various operations of the huge cotton handling plant. Cotton has been received at the local storage plant from gin in Deaf Smith, Swisher, Farmer, Lamb and Castro Counties.

The Panhandle Compress & Warehouse Company of Lubbock purchased 97 acres adjacent to the east line of the Dimmitt townsite last spring and have equipped the entire acreage with fire fighting and other cotton storage facilities.

**ORGANIZATION OF THE 83rd CONGRESS:** The nation's Capital is rife with rumors as to possible fights in the organization of the 83rd Congress. Most of the rumors concern the Senate. There was discussion for a time as to whether or not the Republicans would be able to take over and control the organization since Senator Wayne Morse, of Oregon, refused to say whether or not he would join with the Republicans in the organization of the Senate. Actually, there is no doubt but that the Republicans will organize the Senate because if Senator Morse does not go along with the Republicans in the organization, they will still have a majority because the Vice-President will cast the deciding vote. The chances are that Senator Morse will stay with the Republicans in the organization of the Senate, although he has been non-committal when the questions were put to him. Everyone here recognizes this fact and the parties are conducting their business at the present time on such assumption. If there is a fight, it will be within the Republican Party as to who will be the majority floor leader. I sincerely hope that such a fight will be avoided because it could cause delays and obstacles in getting on with the work that must be done by the Congress. Such a fight would re-open many of the wounds of the convention that grew out of the Taft-Eisenhower fight. Many of these wounds have measurably healed and it would be silly for them to be reopened and aggravated. General Eisenhower is the duly elected president of the United States, and it is the duty of everyone, regardless of party or faction, to lend all possible assistance to a speedy and peaceful organization of the new Congress. Some sources here think that Eisenhower may use his influence to name a floor leader with whom he is friendly and closely related. However, the senators who are most likely to take over this job have stated that they do not expect the president-elect to intervene. Some of their statements have gone far enough to indicate that they would consider it undue interference by the presi-

A move was started to promote Representative Charles Halleck, of Indiana, for the speaker's job, Both Mr. Martin and Mr. Halleck are fine gen- tlemen and able representatives, and could ably fill the Chair. The move behind Mr. Halleck origi- nated because Mr. Halleck was one of the earliest supporters of General Eisenhower. Representa- tive Martin was a strong support- Speaker. However, this could ease- a change within the next few weeks. Organization of the House, both on the Republican and the Democratic side, should be peace- able and the House of Representa- tives should be about its work soon after it convenes.

**THE BIG HEADACHE:** How to cut the budget is the big prob- lem that is facing the incoming administration on the domestic front. If this country is to op- erate on a balanced budget, there must be some trimming. The present budget is in excess of the in- come of the Federal Government. Therefore it follows that a cut in the budget does not necessari- ly mean early reduction of taxes. A sizable cut in the budget is an indispensable predicate, not only to balance the budget, but to create a means of eventual tax reduction. The budget must be cut to around 60 billion dollars before there can be any tax reductions.

Tax reductions brought about by reducing the budget to 60 billion dollars would not be much help to the individual. The tax reduction would actually be less than ten percent. There could be sizable cuts in the budget without any appreciable tax reduction to the lower income groups. That is, the over-all tax structure could be reduced by the reduction of certain phases of that tax structure applicable to the higher in- come groups and the corporations. If such policy was followed, it would mean that the lower in- come groups would get very little or no benefit from such reduction. It has been my hope and desire that the first tax reductions go to the lower income group, as they are certainly sorely in need of it. The fastest way to obtain this result is to increase the per- sonal and dependent exemptions. I introduced a bill last session of Congress that would do this, and I intend to re-introduce the bill in the coming session of Congress.

**AN INTERESTING SIDE- LIGHT:** I have just had a visit with a gentleman who has returned from an extended tour of Con- tinental Europe, the near East and Northern Africa. He tells me that the use of an oxen and a horse for plowing in Europe is not because the farmer can't get two oxen or two horses. The horse and oxen team is used for a definite reason. The horse keeps the fur- row and the oxen does the pulling. The same thing is true in the use of a camel and a horse or donkey in plowing in Northern Africa.

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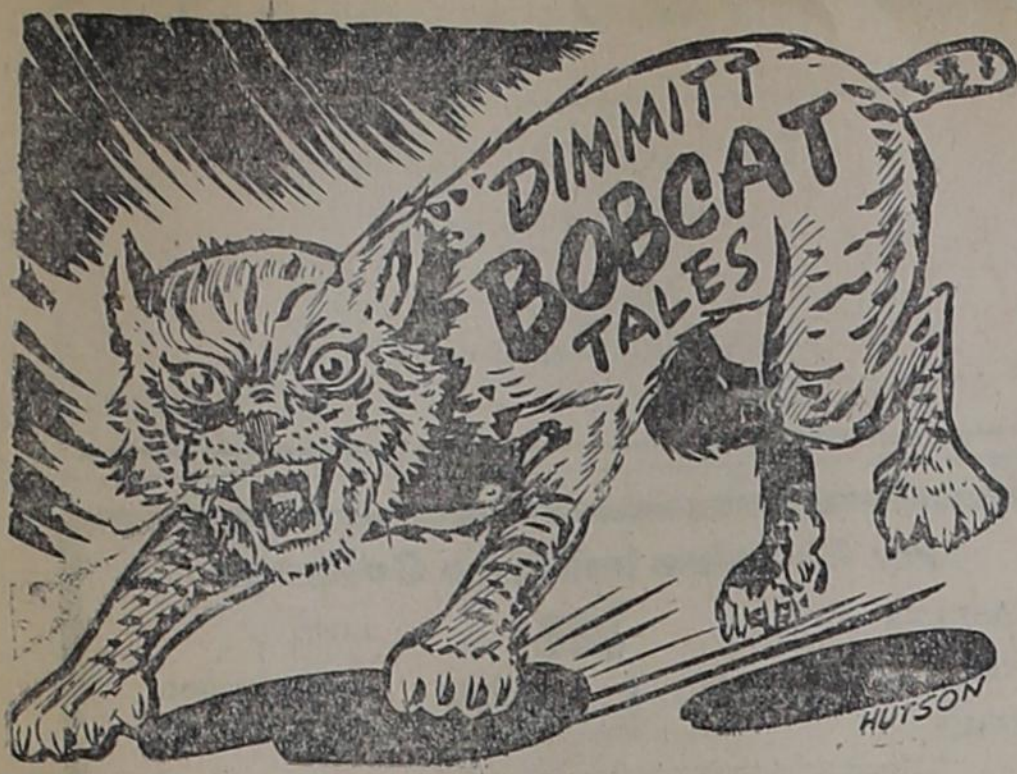

### Reserve Officers Training School to Open in Amarillo

A Panhandle-wide invitation has been issued by Colonel John W. Buswell, Commandant of the 4163rd ORC School in Amarillo, to all reserve officers to participate in this newly activated unit.

Pointing out that both active and inactive reserve officers would benefit by attending the school, Colonel Buswell said, "The armed forces are a very important part of our lives now. And they will continue to be. They affect our economy, our government, our entire way of life . . . and the Organized Reserve School is an interesting way to keep up with what's going on."

ORC Students will be maintaining their commissions, and at the same time can accumulate retirement points, which are necessary to retire with pay. Colonel Buswell emphasized the fact that membership in the ORC School would not alter anyone's status of possible recall.

Students will have their choice of courses in many branches, such

as military government, command and general staff, artillery, engineers, finance, ordnance, infantry. Beginning in January, 1953, the 4163rd ORC School will meet two or three Thursday evening each month at the ORC Armory, 112 NE 2nd Street, Amarillo.

Specially trained instructors will head up the courses, which are designed to be of practical value. The latest training equipment will be used, including motion pictures, tape recorders, actual weapons and machinery—as well as cut-away versions. The training itself originates in various active duty stations, where continued experimentation and study makes the latest information available.

Colonel Buswell has been active in the Organized Reserve since he retired from active duty in March, 1946, after five years service. He served in the European Theater, and was awarded the Bronze Star Medal and the Croix de Guerre. Now employed as Production Superintendent at Proctor & Gamble defense plant, he holds a B. S. degree in business administration from Boston University.

Since that first Thanksgiving, the mode of transmission of many diseases has been discovered and the known preventives of diseases have become common knowledge. Yellow fever, plague, and cholera have almost ceased to exist. Smallpox, diphtheria, and typhoid fever can be eliminated as a cause of death if a person takes advantage of immunization. Malaria and other diseases can be controlled if the public demand for their control, as a part of every day activities of the government, be insistent enough.

We have much more to be thankful for, in the matter of health, than did our Pilgrim forefathers, so let us in our individual Thanksgiving be reminded of the strides preventive medicine is making in improving health conditions in Texas.

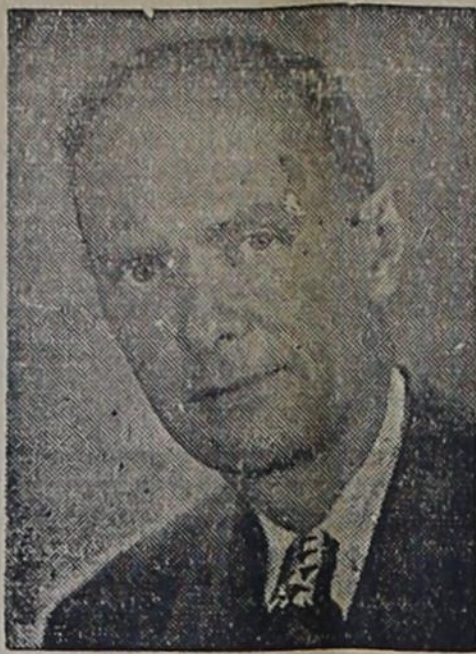

**THE POW SITUATION IN THE KOREAN TRUCE TALKS:** The major obstacle in reaching a truce in the Korean conflict appears to hinge on the question of forced or voluntary repatriation of prisoners of war. From the lack of progress that has been made in the solution of the issue, it would seem that an irresistible force has met an immovable object. Russia and her satellites have taken the position that all prisoners of war on both sides shall be returned to the sources from which they were captured, irrespective of the desires of the prisoner. The position of the United Nations is that these prisoners should be thoroughly screened and that those sincerely and desiring to remain under the jurisdiction of their captors should be dealt with by the captors and not the opposition forces. It will be remembered that subsequent to World War II many tragic stories came out of Europe and Russia concerning the great efforts and in many cases suicidal attempts of prisoners of war resisting their return to Russia. This would leave little doubt as to the type of harsh punishment employed by Russia in dealing with returning POW's, and it can be safely assumed that the same procedure would be employed by North Korea and Red China, who follow so closely the Russian scheme. What actually happened to these returned POW's is still somewhat of a mystery because of the rigid censorship behind the Iron Curtain.

Several plans have been advanced to solve this tough problem. One of these before the United Nations calls for the formation of a neutral screening commission to separate the sheep from the goats. Another plan receiving some consideration calls for a return of all POW's upon commitments from the country receiving them that they will not be mistreated. Such agreement would call for periodic checks on the status of each returned prisoner. Should the Reds yield from their present arbitrary position and accept the first of the above solutions, much progress could be made towards a quick and final truce. However, it must be remembered that out of this solution would come other serious problems. Number one would be the location of a country that would give these POW's asylum. Number two would be the question of jurisdiction over these POW's; that is, whether or not they would be under the jurisdiction of the UN or the country in which they sought asylum. Should they be under the jurisdiction of the UN, they would still be indirectly under some control from Russia since Russia is a member of the UN. If a separate protectorate of the UN should be set up to provide asylum for these POW's, it would mean that Russia would still have some control in their government. If they were permitted to take citizenship in the country to which they were

removed, the question of control would be settled. However, it is doubtful that many countries would be willing to take on a substantial number of the prisoners. Certainly I would not want them in the United States because it would afford Russia an opportunity to infiltrate this country with more Red spies. I am sure that many of the other countries would take the same position. If these prisoners were returned to the country of their origin under the second proposal above referred to, it would be administratively impossible to keep up with them because of the rigid censorship behind the Iron Curtain and the further fact that most of the information we could obtain on them would be highly questionable. I do not believe that Russia would agree to this second proposal. If she agreed to the first proposal, I would entertain great fears that she would attempt to infiltrate UN countries with Red spies by this medium.

One of Russia's prime objectives is to bring about a major breach in the NATO organization. She obviously thinks that her best chance lies in causing friction between France and the other NATO countries. It presently appears that should a truce be concluded in Korea, the Red Chinese will promptly move men and supplies to the Indo-China front for stepped up action against the French. This will require France to call for immediate all-out aid from the UN or permit Indo-China to fall into the hands of the Reds. Russia figures that such action on the part of Red China will force

the UN to move into Indo-China, as they did in Korea, or refuse to France the all-out aid that would be necessary. She figures that in the latter event, France would be forced to commit practically all of her forces to the salvation of Indo-China, and that even though she was able to prevent the Red menace from taking over, she would break with the NATO countries and at the same time measurably weaken herself at home. On the other hand, if the UN does move into Indo-China

and stops the Red menace there, Russia can always return to Korea to keep the fire smoldering, truce or not truce. She is in the position similar to a checker player in the double corner. The problem of the United Nations is

to get her out of that double corner without permitting a third world war to start. An effective prohibition against these new starts by Russia must be devised if the purpose of the United Nations is to be realized.

## Health Talks

A modern American craze is putting coins in slots to get something out: gum, candy, cigarettes, music, telephone service, or any variety of products. However, if you put things into the ear "slot" that don't belong, you're likely to get only one thing out: trouble.

The ear was made with the idea that it was not to be meddled with, and as long as it's healthy, that's the best advice to remember. For example, how should a baby's ear be cleaned? With an ordinary wash rag, and then not very energetically. The wash rag should be placed around the finger, not twisted and stuck into the ear. The same rule for cleaning the ears applies to adults: Nix on cotton tips, hairpins, toothpicks, broom straws, and the many other ways man has thought to torture the poor ear.

Many people are too particular about cleanliness of their ears. They consider wax dirty and work constantly to get rid of it, failing to realize it is a natural protection against objects which might accidentally get into the ear. Only when the wax forms a plug that cuts down the hearing should it be removed, and then a doctor should do the job.

Even if it sounds silly, the way you blow your nose has a lot to do with the health of your ear. There is a tube leading from the middle ear to the part of the throat just behind the nose. This "Eustachian tube" has as its main purpose to make equal the pressure on each side of the ear drum. It is made so that ordinarily drains secretions from the middle ear to the throat, a very important help. However, if there are germs in the throat, say from a cold, and one side of the nose is held while the other is blown, it is easy to send the germs into the Eustachian tube and on to the middle ear, often causing infection there.

When you blow your nose, be careful that both nostrils are open and that you blow gently so not much pressure is put on the tubes leading to each middle ear. It's better to let discharge from the nose drop into the throat, where it can be spit out or swallowed, than to send it where it doesn't belong: into the Eustachian tube and on to the middle ear. You shouldn't make an airplane flight if you have a cold, sore throat, or other infection of the respiratory system. A change in the air pres-

sure during the time you are going up or coming down (more often the latter) can cause an infection of the middle ear if the Eustachian tube is blocked.

What if something gets into your ear by accident? It will make a difference what that something is as to how it should be removed. If water is used to wash out a bean or pea, the bit of vegetable may swell and be impossible to remove without hurting the ear canal. If an insect gets into the ear, it may have to be drowned with oil or water to keep it from clinging to and tearing the walls of the ear canal or ear drum.

Certainly much damage has been done to ears and the hearing by clumsy attempts to remove foreign bodies. In some cases a small piece of gravel or a wooden splinter has been driven through the ear drum into the middle ear, to set up trouble there. The doctor's "know-how" means that the foreign object will be removed as painlessly as possible and with a minimum of damage or no harm at all to the ear.

In the South, where swimmers go into warm waters, fungus infections of the ear are common. Some medical experts have recommended that ear plugs of cotton, rubber, or other material be used to stop up the ears. This precaution also might save the diver from hurting the ear drum if he hits the water in such a way as to build too suddenly the pressure on the outside of the drum.

Swimmers need to learn the correct way to breathe—that is, to breathe out while the face is in the water, waiting to breathe in until the face emerges. The right breathing method means that germs from the throat or possibly in the water itself will not spread to the middle ear.

It is recognized that too much noise can be a source of ear trouble. Three methods for controlling noise in industry have been tried: (1) controlling noise at its source (insulating noisy areas, using noiseless machines such as "silent" typewriters), (2) changing the worker who is known to be especially sensitive to noise to a job in less noisy surroundings, and (3) reducing noise at the ear of the worker by ear plugs.

If you are bothered to the point of sleeplessness by noises at night in your neighborhood, your best and least expensive bet perhaps would be to stop up your ears with cotton or rubber plugs.
