Prof. John Dewey, known to Washington correspondents and the American world as president of The People's Lobby, has sent a new taxation plan from his workshop. He has asked the president to recommend that "congress impose an annual tax of at least one per cent upon the full assessed value of all taxable lands in the United States, exclusive of sub-soil wealth, or improvement on and in land."

**Harvest of 11,000,000 Fish Is Expected**

HELENA, Mont.—A harvest of between 11,000,000 and 12,000,000 game fish is expected shortly at spawning stations and hatcheries of the Montana fish and game commission.

In 1932 approximately 35,000,000 game fish were hatched from fish eggs taken by artificial means at the spawning stations. Experts take the fish from the water, strip them of their eggs, fertilize them, and rush them to one of the state's battery of 15 hatcheries. Graying—found only in Montana, Michigan and Alaska—rainbow trout and brook trout then are planted in lakes and streams of the state.

Experts said the trout run this year at Georgetown Lake, where the largest trout egg taking station in the world is located, would be particularly large.

**Japan Watches U. S. Plans For a Greater Navy**

 TOKIO.—Japanese are concerned at reports from Washington that a strong movement is under way to build the United States navy up to the strength permitted by the naval limitation treaties.

The Japanese see the United States building program, if it finally is adopted, as aimed directly at them and consider it an additional threat to their security. The presence of the American fleet in the Pacific, despite reassuring statements from Washington, always has been considered here as dangerous to Japan. If that fleet is to be increased in size and modernized, the more responsible elements of the Japanese population fear they will face new demands from their own militarists for additional increases in the Japanese navy.

Preparations of the new budget estimates will be started in a few months and Japanese taxpayers look forward to them with dread. They fear the ministry of the navy, utilizing reported American naval plans for propaganda, will start a campaign to convince the people the "Yankee sea menace" is increasing and that therefore the Japanese navy's budget must be increased so that it may be ready to repel any danger.

**Doctors Plan Discussion Of Economic Ills**

 MILWAUKEE, Wis.—Economic difficulties facing the medical profession will be one of the important topics discussed at the 92nd annual meeting of the American Medical association here June 12 to 16.

An attendance of 6,500 physicians and surgeons from all parts of the United States, Canada and Europe is indicated by advance registrations.

The House of Delegates of the association will consider measures of far-reaching importance. Among them are encroachments upon private practice by state medicine and insurance schemes, recommendations made in the last year by the national committee on the cost of medical care, and problems brought on by the depression, such as charity calls.

Leading members of the profession from many parts of the world will read papers at the scientific sessions. Latest medical and surgical discoveries and practices will be explained.

Ten halls of Milwaukee's civic auditorium will be used as classrooms daily with every phase of medicine and surgery scheduled to be discussed. A scientific exhibit will fill the main area of the auditorium, while in the basement commercial houses will set up exhibits.

The association golf tournament will be June 12, at the Blue Mound Country club.

The Medical Women's National Association and the National Women's auxiliary of the Medical association will hold joint conventions.

**LARGE LIQUOR SEIZURE LIVINGSTON, Mont.**

Federal prohibition agents made what was reported to have been the largest confiscation of illegal whisky ever seized in Montana when they took 6,292 gallons of assorted liquor from an establishment here. Don Johnson was arrested as the alleged proprietor of the place. Prohibition officers said the seizure closed up one of the main sources of moonshine in southern Montana.

Oberlin, the Ohio college town where the Anti-Saloon league was founded, is now permitting the sale of 3.2 beer. Fifty years the rallied against beer; now they fight themselves against the rail.

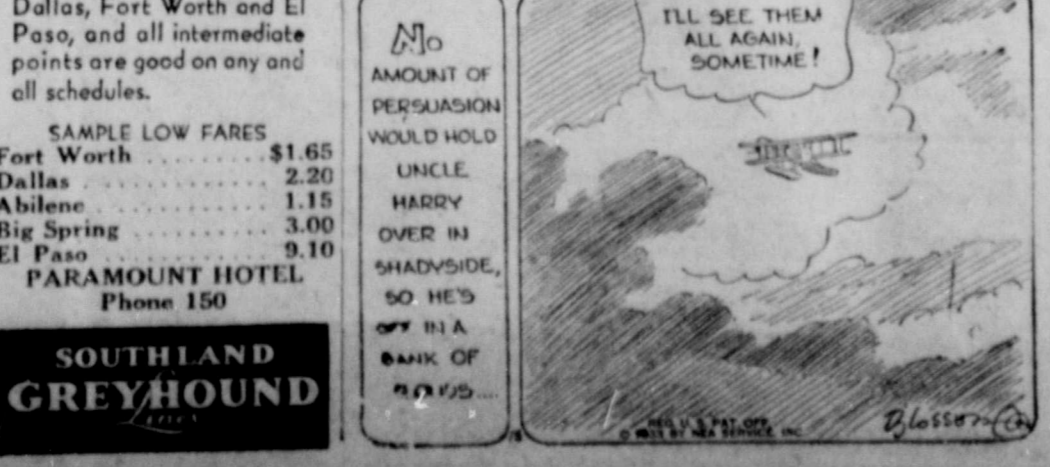
