

#### Scientists Seek Creation of Life

By SIDNEY B. WHIPPLE United Press Staff Correspondent (Copyright 1933 by United Press) NEW YORK.—Scientists, pa-tiently scrutinizing tiny bits of liv-ing matter beneath their miscro-scopes in widely scattered laboratories, are trying to piece to-gether scraps of knowledge into a

pattern of creation.

Their goals, probably never to be realized in their own generation, are two—the creation of life; the perpetuation of life. Bay by day, with infinite and wearisome repetition, they are conducting exrepetition, they are conducting ex-periments in New York, in Cleve-land, in Moscow, with living tissue and with dead tissue mysteric revived by their salts and solu-Their methods vary but their

Their methods vary but their experiments are headed in one direction—to create or keep alive the pulsation of cells, spelling life. Although, in cold scientific phraseology, "no recent results from experiments with auto-synthetic cells warrant new deductions," the work of Dr. George Crile and his assistants in Cleveland hold a grount place in the land hold a front place in the Dr. Crile has produced cells re



#### **GOVERNOR BRYAN PERMITS BEER BILL TO BECOME A LAW**

Gov. Charles W. Bryan of Nebraska permitted a bill to legalize 3.2 beer in dry Nebraska, effective next Aug. 9, to become a law without his signature. He furnished the generous alibi: "I feel it is my official duty to permit the bill to become a law without my approval subject to the setion that those opposing the bill may feel it their duty to take."

Cox for president in 1920 sent the heart of the "prince of peace" to the grave after he had declared that the democrats had named a presidential nominee on a beer keg platform. Governor Bryan would like to go to the senate of the United States to fill the vacancy caused by the death of R. B. Howell, republican, months ago. Nebraska has managed to get along with one senator since the passing of Ranger Monday. Howell. After the adjournment of the Nebraska legislature, the governor may resign. A democratic lieutenantgovernor will take his place and then perhaps Brother harlie will be given the right to sport a senatorial toga.
